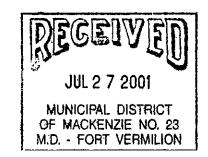

Director of Operational Services Report August 21, 2001

- 1. Field trips to review construction on local roads (shoulder pulls, Friesen Road, 94 Ave East extension) and the Savage Prairie Road.
- 2. Reviewed urban designs with Doug Schuler, GPEC Engineering Services on August 2, 2001. Mr. Schuler has assured me that he will have all potential projects reviewed with cost estimates for each one. He will be at this Council Meeting to review various items regarding these projects.
- 3. The Savage Prairie Road reconstruction project is substantially complete.
- 4. Two shoulder pull crews are in operation. One will be north of the river and one will be south of the river.
- 5. Gravel hauling operations are complete in the Tompkins pit area, the Fitler Pit area and on the Zama Road. The contractor has depleted his gravel stockpiles in the Ward/Knelsen Gravel Pit. He has started his gravel crushing in mid-August. He expects to complete gravel hauling operations from that pit in early September. This will complete our regravelling program.
- The road maintenance work on the Zama Access Road has been ongoing.
 Because of larger vehicles and heavier volumes of traffic the work is pretty well
 continuous. The calcium chloride section will, as planned, require some reworking.
- 7. Renegotiated tender prices for the Dyck (94 Ave extension) and the Friesen Roads. Tenders were well above the estimated costs originally presented to Council. The Friesen Road was renegotiated within the terms set by Council. The 94 Avenue East Extension item is a part of this Council package and is discussed more thoroughly there.
- 8. Staff have prepared a plan showing the proposed development of the walking trails in La Crete. We will continue to assist the La Crete Walking Trail Committee to meet their goals.
- 9. Met with the Fort Vermilion Walking Trail Committee. Staff have also prepared a plan showing the proposed development of the walking trails in Fort Vermilion. We will continue to assist their committee in meeting their goals as well.
- 10. Negotiations with Little Red Air regarding them assuming operations of the Fort Vermilion Airport are slowly proceeding. To date the busy schedules of both parties preclude formal negotiations. Allan Cronkhite has had some informal discussions with Mike Nanooch, Economic Development Coordinator for the Little Red River Cree Nation.

- 11. Inspected drainage concerns of Mr. Lyman Brewster with Chris Kelland, Agricultural Fieldman. I told Mr. Brewster we would get measurements regarding the profile to show the drainage on the various road ditches Mr. Brewster had concerns with. I also confirmed with Mr. Brewster that if any work other than normal maintenance was required in the roadside ditches he would be responsible for obtaining the appropriate drainage license from Alberta Environment.
- 12. Tenders were opened for the Highway 88 Connector. Details are included in the Committee of the Whole package.
- 13. To eliminate large, rowdy parties at the Tompkins Gravel Pit a gate was erected on the road leading into the pit. In early August vandals used a cutting torch to destroy the gate. Police are investigating the matter. The gate will be replaced.
- 14. Met with John Engleder, Helen Tetah-Wayhoe and Michel Loosier, Alberta Transportation on August 3, 2001 and discussed various issues.

BACKGROUND / PROPOSAL:

Mackenzie Housing Management Board has requested that the 50 km/hr speed limit be changed to a 30 km/hr speed limit in the Alberta Housing subdivision in Fort Vermilion along 50th Avenue from 45th Street to 43rd Street, along 43rd Street from 50th Avenue to 52nd Avenue, along 52nd Avenue from 43rd Street to 45th Street, 44th Street Cul-de-sac off of 50th Avenue, and 51st Avenue Cul-de-sac off of 43rd Street.

DISCUSSION / OPTIONS / BENEFITS / DISADVANTAGES:

MHMB is concerned with the number of children playing on or close to the street as well as the number of pedestrians. We also received a letter from a number of Fort Vermilion residents requesting speed zone signs to be posted at the Head Start Family Center on 5109 - 43rd Street.

To change the speed limit in any given area the M.D. speed limit bylaw must be changed accordingly.

Mackenzie Housing Management operates 37 rental units on the loop of 2nd avenue, 2nd street and 3rd avenue. These units are rented to low-income families, and there are a large number of children living in this area. At any given time there are children playing on the street or close to the street, mothers pushing strollers and young children on bikes and riding toys. Many of the residents have expresses concerns about speeding vehicles in this area and we have brought the concern to the attention of the RCMP. The speed limit in this area is 50 km per hour but because of the number of children playing it would be safer to have a 30 km an hour speed limit. The RCMP officer agreed that a lower speed limit would be safer but they could not enforce anything under the posted 50 km per hour.

On behalf of the residents in the above mentioned area I ask that Council approve changing the speed limit from the 50 km an hour to 30 km per hour.

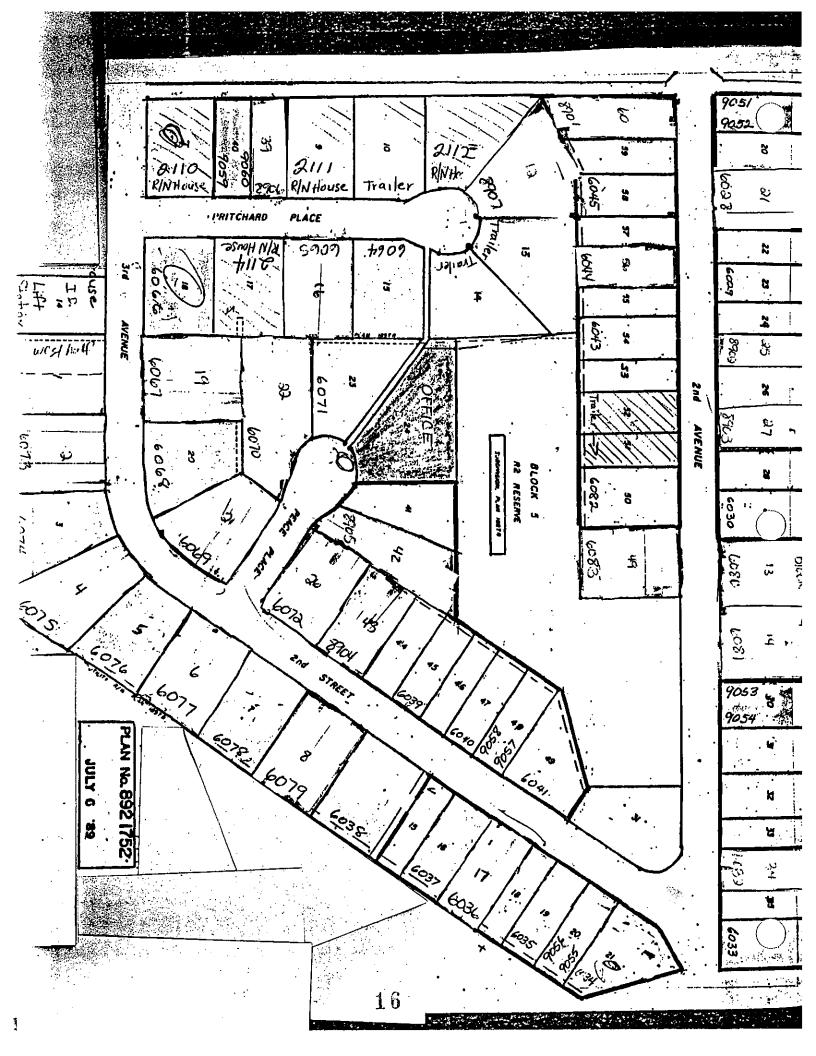

BYLAW NO. 273/01 BEING A BY-LAW OF THE MUNICIPAL DISTRICT OF MACKENZIE NO. 23 IN THE PROVINCE OF ALBERTA

TO ESTABLISH MAXIMUM SPEED LIMITS THROUGHOUT THE MUNICIPALITY

WHEREAS, provisions of Section 14(3) of the Highway Traffic Act, being Chapter H-7 of the Revised Statutes of Alberta, 1980, and amendments thereto, authorize the Council to establish maximum speed limits of less than eighty (80) kilometers per hour for highways under its control; and to establish a maximum speed limit in excess of eighty (80) kilometers per hour for all or any highway under its control.

WHEREAS, provisions of Section 14(4) of the Highway Traffic Act, being Chapter H-7 of the Revised Statutes of Alberta, 1980, and amendments thereto, the Council of the Municipal District of Mackenzie No. 23 may prescribe a maximum of not more than one hundred (100) kilometers per hour for a highway that is not a primary highway.

THEREFORE, the Council of the Municipal District of Mackenzie No. 23, in the Province of Alberta, duly assembled, enacts as follows:

- 1. That a maximum speed limit of fifty (50) kilometers per hour be established in the hamlets of Fort Vermilion, La Crete and Zama, except in designated school and playground zones.
- 2. That proper speed limit signs be placed at the boundaries of those hamlets mentioned in Section 1.
- 3. That a maximum speed limit of one hundred (100) kilometers per hour be established for the Secondary Highway 697.
- 4. That a maximum speed limit of eighty (80) kilometers per hour be established for all rural gravel roads within municipal boundaries.
- 5. That a maximum speed limit of thirty (30) kilometers per hour be established in the hamlet of Fort Vermilion for the following location: along 50th Avenue from 45th Street to 43rd Street, along 43rd Street from 50th Avenue to 52nd Avenue, along 52nd Avenue from 43rd Street to 45th Street, 44th Street Cul-de-sac off of 50th Avenue, and 51st Avenue Cul-de-sac off of 43rd Street.

Option 7 is not a feasible alternative, as traffic operations along Highway 697 will be adversely affected.

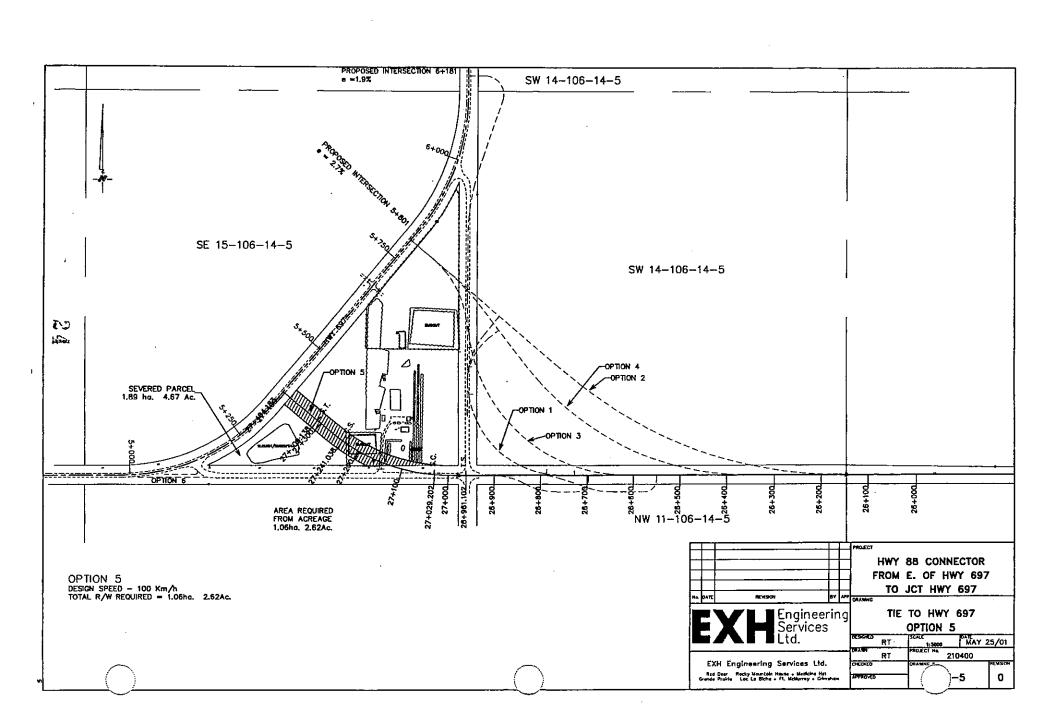

BACKGROUND / PROPOSAL:

Last year we applied for funds from the Resource Roads/New Industry Program for two projects along the Highway 88 Connector. Project No. 2 (11 km on the west end) was approved.

DISCUSSION / OPTIONS / BENEFITS / DISADVANTAGES:

Tenders were opened for the Highway 88 Connector project on July 31, 2001. Four tender packages were received, with the lowest bid being from High Level Construction at \$1,178,310. The highest bid was \$1,321,850. Total costs are expected to be \$1,502,503 and includes construction, 10% contingency, engineering, potential bonuses like site occupancy and signing, and 3% GST.

Construction is going to start as soon as the contract is signed between High Level Construction and the M.D.

This project was approved in the 2001 budget for \$1,700,000.

BACKGROUND / PROPOSAL:

During the July, 2001 Council meeting Administration indicated that a Storm Sewer study for the hamlet of La Crete was going to be undertaken and that it was estimated that storm sewer costs for the proposed 100A road and gutter project could be in the range of \$75,000.

DISCUSSION / OPTIONS / BENEFITS / DISADVANTAGES:

Administration is bringing forward some options for Council to consider in order to fund the future costs for the 100A Street and other areas where storm sewers will be required.

1. Council would authorize a Storm Sewer reserve similar to what we have done for roads. As an example, we would put aside \$250,000 per year to the reserve. This of course would have an impact of increasing our municipal tax rate. Or, in order to maintain a stable tax rate we would have to decrease expenditures in other areas by the corresponding amount.

2. Create a new off-site levy to be paid by the developer. This would require a bylaw amendment and I would assume the cost of any increases in off site levies paid by a

developer would be passed on to the land buyer.

3. Establish a policy whereby owners (residential/commercial/ industrial) are required to fund a portion of the local improvements adjacent to their properties. This could be similar to the road improvements policy recently implemented for commercial and industrial areas.

4. Fund project(s) through a combination of current year tax revenues and general capital reserves.

BACKGROUND / PROPOSAL:

Northwestern Health Services Long Term Care Continuous Quality Improvement Team is requesting the construction of a walkway between the Continuing Care Centre and Heimstaed Lodge in La Crete (see attached). The walkway would simplify the evacuation of residents in the event of an emergency to either building, should this be required.

DISCUSSION / OPTIONS / BENEFITS / DISADVANTAGES:

Ivan and myself met with the Manager of Mackenzie Housing and the Director of Health Services to review the proposal. Having access to a walkway of this nature would assist staff at both the Heimstaed Lodge and Continuing Care Centre as well as emergency personnel in the event of an evacuation of residents from one building to the other. In favorable weather conditions evacuated residents could either walk or be wheeled along the walkway rather than transporting each one by motor vehicle, thus providing for a much quicker as well as convenient evacuation.

One issue is that the majority of the proposed sidewalk would be on NWHSR property as there is no utility lane adjacent to the east boundary of NWHSR property (only about 20 meters of the walkway would be in the utility lane). Upon discussion with NWHSR they would be willing to authorize the construction of a public walkway on their property as it would be a benefit for them as well.

OPTION 2

That M.D of Mackenzie permit the construction of the walkway in the utility lane and pay for the cost of the sidewalk within the utility lane. NWHSR pay for the portion of sidewalk on their property.

OPTION 3

That M.D of Mackenzie permit the construction of the walkway in the utility lane and split the cost of the sidewalk with NWHSR.

OPTION 4

That M.D of Mackenzie permit the construction of a walkway in the utility lane and pay for the complete cost of the sidewalk.

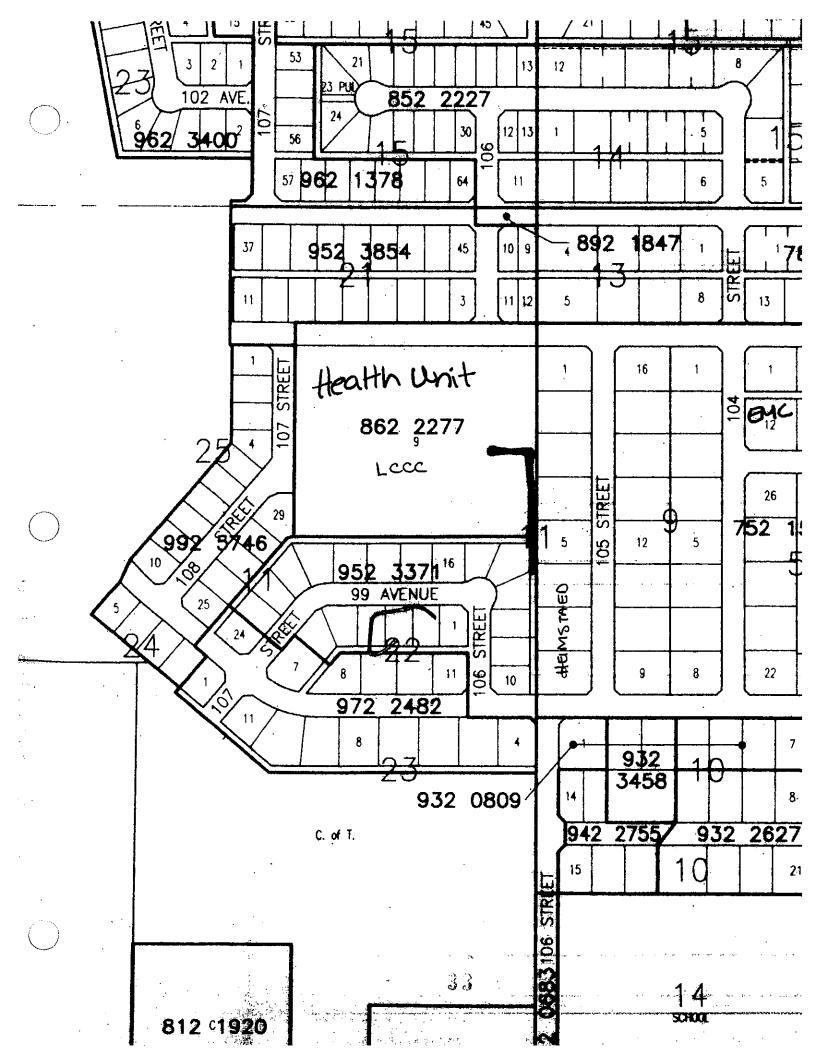

PLANNING

- MMSA has drafted portions of the revised Land Use Bylaw for our review. Hoping to have a complete draft document available for Council review by end of 2001.
- The requests for Land Use Bylaw Amendments have slowed down.

EMERGENCY SERVICES

- The La Crete Firehall addition is 95% complete, minor deficiencies remaining.
- The contract for concrete work at La Crete Firehall and sidewalk to Bernie Fehr Centre is completed
- Aeromedical Emergency Services as of August 1st, 2001 has stationed two medics in Zama.
- We are holding an Emergency Medical Responder (EMR) course in Fort Vermilion for the Fire Department.
- We met with Apache to discuss EMR's in Zama. Apache will be training 16 people to the EMR level by spring, 2002. When the training is complete and the EMR's are registered provincially we will meet with Apache to establish the possibility of them assisting with Zama EMS.

ENFORCEMENT SERVICES

- The gate into Tompkins Gravel Pit was vandalised (cut into pieces).
- The dock at Tourangeau Lake was broken from a vehicle driving on it.
- The Special Constables have been quite busy patrolling all our communities.

DIRECTOR'S REPORT AGRICULTURAL SERVICES AUGUST 13, 2001

Main activities since the last Directors Report, July 09th, have been:

River Road Culvert Washouts

Tenders have been opened. The low tender was the local contractor, Forest Trotter, at \$149,000. The other bid was from K.Mosure and Sons, Keg River, \$315,650.

Funding from Drainage Reserves for the River Road project will be sought at the August 21, 2001 Council meeting.

Habitat Management and Navigable Waters Protection of the Federal Gov't. will not need to be contacted, as our activities should impact neither fish habitat nor navigatable waters.

Other Drainage/Water Management Projects

The Henry Zaccharias/Jake Wieler and the Peter/David P. Wiebe projects have been constructed.

The next major roadside project will be the John W. Driedger project. Land ownership and backsloping agreements have yet to be settled before construction can start.

Allan Kronkite and I will be preparing a map similar to the road projects one showing locations of existing and proposed flood control projects, as well as the new requests for drainage improvement applications (some are small, some are large projects).

Repairs to High Level South still will have to wait until a crop has been taken off to allow access.

Mr. Lyman Brewster

Mr. Brewster has requested backsloping and drainage improvements to correct works constructed two years ago. The inadequate outlet for previous works is presenting problems, and since the M.D. was involved in the construction of the project, we will be working to solve problems.

Total Vegetation Management

Roadside mowing for weeds and brush should be completed by the end of this week. Some areas where the ditches have been too wet may be mowed after the ground freezes. Spraying will continue for another two or three weeks. Over the next two weeks, we will complete a map for the heavier roadside brush control.

Intensive Livestock Operations

The recent announcement from the provincial government to take responsibility for ILO approvals and monitoring, has left us reevaluating the role of the ILO Task Force. We are looking at September 10 to 13 for the first ILO Task Force meeting. Provincial ILO engineer Vince Murray and NADC's Senior Northern Development Officer, Colin Needham, will be invited.

Crop Pests

Diamondback moths and grasshoppers are the main insect pests that producers are concerned with this year. Complaints about both grasshoppers and weeds have been received. Resolving these is difficult with the economic situations and beliefs of some producers.

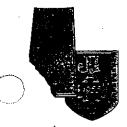

Subject: Summary of Activities - August, 2001

During the month of August some of the major items undertaken by the Finance department were as follows:

- 1. I have invested some of our excess cash requirements with the Alberta Treasury Branch. I purchased a \$6,000,000 30-day guaranteed investment certificate with an interest rate of 4.11% and a \$3,000,000 60-day guaranteed investment certificate with an interest rate of 4.04%.
- 2. We have had some downtime problems with our Internet service provider I-net out of High Level/Edmonton. This has impacted on providing e-mail and Internet service to staff and outside contacts. We are trying to determine if we have the problem (e.g. trying to push too much through our dedicated phone line; equipment problem) or whether there is problem with our service provider. I will keep you posted on the matter.
- 3. Ernest and Young have completed a GST review. I asked them to review the 1998/1999/2000 calendar years to determine if we were using the appropriate accounting methodology and procedures for calculating and remitting GST. They uncovered some weaknesses in the handling of holdbacks for construction projects and how we handle GST on selected inspection permits and services. We have implemented revised procedures in these areas.

On the positive side, if you recall, Administration took a "hit" for a prior year GST adjustment of approximately \$50,000 in 2000. As part of this three year review, I have applied for a variety of adjustments to the Canada Revenue Agency and if they concur with our finding we will be receiving an additional \$20,000 for prior year (s) adjustments.

- 4. Compass Assessment has completed their linear audit review and has submitted the following findings to Municipal Affairs.
- a. Request that approximately 152 lines that were assessed as non-operational to operational status. The assessment appeal amount totals \$6.7 Million.

- b. 18 wells assessed within the MD boundaries actual belong to various First Nation Reserve boundaries. A reduction in our assessment of \$1.8Million.
- c. 51 wells were missed and 15 wells require change to operational status. The assessment appeal amount totals \$7 Million.

Net assessments that the MD has appealed total \$11,900,000.

Purpose

To reimburse employees for the use of their personal vehicle for municipal use.

Policy Statement and Guidelines

Based upon the completion of a Vehicle Costing Analysis, it was noted that it would benefit the municipality to allow the option of certain employees to use their personal vehicles for municipal business.

The Chief Administrative Officer shall review and authorize which employees shall use their personal vehicle for municipal use.

The Chief Administrative Officer (CAO) shall, using the previous years kilometres incurred by the employee for municipal use, determine the kilometre range for the individual employee.

The CAO shall authorize payment of fixed bi-weekly rates to be paid as per the following kilometre ranges (proposed rates exclude fuel consumption):

25,000 - 35,000	\$ 356.00
35,000 - 45,000	\$ 480.00
45,000 - 55,000	\$ 534.00

If the employee exceeds the annual pre-determined kilometre range the employee shall be reimbursed the difference to the appropriate kilometre range the employee actually used.

If the employee incurs less kilometres than the pre-determined kilometre range the employee shall be dropped to the appropriate kilometre range and the difference will be taken off the new determined kilometre range to reconcile what the employee actually should have been paid.

The employee shall provide the municipality with a BUSINESS USE insurance policy with the following minimum requirements:

- \$2,000,000 Public Liability and Disability
- use for transporting passengers (6A Endorsement)

The municipality shall ensure M.D. #23's insurance policy includes "non-owned automobile insurance" for employees using someone's personal vehicle for municipal use

The employee shall be responsible for all expenses incurred with the use of their personal vehicle for municipal use with the exception of fuel.

The municipality shall provide the employee with a fuel card and cover the fuel expenses incurred by the use of the personal vehicle for municipal use.

The CAO shall review the rate structure and the pre-determined employee ranges prior to January of each year.

The CAO shall enter into agreements with the designated employees for the use of their personal vehicle for municipal use.

Thank you for your recent letter regarding discussions between the province and the Beaver First Nation (BFN). These discussions were prompted by concerns that culturally and ecologically significant sites within the F11 Forest Management Unit (FMU) should be identified and projected for the benefit of those who work and live in this area. In association with Alberta Energy, our department has agreed to undertake a study of these significant sites to ensure that future logging or oil and gas activities do not negatively impact them.

The province of Alberta has not signed a Memorandum Of Understanding (MOU) or Letter of Agreement with the BFN at this time. As part of the province's current discussions with BFN, it is recognized that an MOU may be the most appropriate tool to carry out joint cultural and ecological studies in the Hungry Bend – Sandhills area. If such an agreement is signed in the future, it will not override any current timber allocations which exist in the F11 FMU.

Letters have been sent to local Regional Health Authorities informing them of the dates for the Fairs. If they are interested, they are asked to book booths for their recruitment purposes. If you feel that your community should be recruiting physicians, I encourage you to participate in the Fairs along with your Regional Health Authority.

Physician recruitment remains an important issue for many communities in Alberta. The Fairs provide a valuable opportunity for you and your Regional Health Authority to meet medical students, family medicine and specialty residents interested in change.

Many physicians and physicians-to-be do want to practice in Alberta - and in rural Alberta. However, local communities and regions have to be prepared to actively recruit. Here are some important points to remember about physician recruitment:

Know what your physician needs are now and in the future. Not all physicians are looking for a practice right now. Many of the individuals you will meet at the Fairs will be looking for a practice location for next July or later. Be prepared to let them know what is currently available and what will be available in the future.

Be prepared to offer recruitment incentives. Many communities and Regional Health Authorities are already offering incentive packages. Before the Fairs, you should consider what incentives are necessary to recruit to your region.

Be sure to follow up. At the Fairs, it is important to obtain names and addresses of potential recruits. After the Fairs, remember to keep in touch. You have to make them realize that your region and community wants them.

Having someone there who can answer medical questions is important, but equally important is the ability to respond to what physicians want to know about the community and the region. WHEREAS:

- A. Mackenzie is a Municipal district within the Province of Alberta and High Level is a town located within Mackenzie;
- B. High Level exists as a service centre within Mackenzie partially because of the energy sector and other economic activity carried on in Mackenzie;
- C. Few permanent residents of Mackenzie use municipal services in High Level but certain transient residents of Mackenzie, particularly those employed in the energy sector, may make temporary use of municipal services in High Level;
- D. The Act permits but does not require sharing of tax revenue between municipalities;
- E. In recognition of the fact that High Level has provided and will continue to provide certain municipal services to temporary or permanent residents of Mackenzie, Mackenzie has agreed to share certain revenues with High Level on certain terms and conditions.

NOW THEREFORE, THE PARTIES HERETO AGREE AS FOLLOWS;

1. Definitions:

In this Agreement, the following words shall have the meanings outlined below:

- (a) "Act" means the *Municipal Government Act*, S.A. 1984, sM-26.1 as amended from time to time;
- (b) "Assessment" has the same meaning as this term is defined in s. 284(1) of the Act;
- (c) "Assessment within the Town's Sphere of Influence" for any Year means the total Assessment for all Property, within the Town's Sphere of Influence as shown on the assessment roll of Mackenzie for that Year and/or as determined in accordance with paragraph 3.land 3.1.1 of this Agreement;

- 3. Determination of Assessment Within Town's Sphere of Influence, Revenue Sharing Factor and Revenue Sharing Base Amounts
 - 3.1 The Assessment within the Town's Sphere of Influence shall be calculated in each year of the Term by the Consultant and provided to the parties.
 - 3.1.1 For the purpose of calculating Assessment within the Town's Sphere of Influence, and at the earliest date reasonably possible, Mackenzie shall provide the Consultant with the total Assessment for all Property within Mackenzie prepared in accordance with the Act and Regulations and such information as may be provided by the Province of Alberta each Year.
 - 3.2 When Mackenzie receives the Assessment within the Town's Sphere of Influence in accordance with paragraph 3.1 hereof, Mackenzie shall calculate the Revenue Sharing Factor by dividing the Assessment within the Town's Sphere of Influence for that Year by the Base Year Assessment.
 - 3.3 Once the Revenue Sharing Factor for the Year is calculated in accordance with paragraph 3.2 hereof, Mackenzie shall calculate the Revenue Sharing Amount by multiplying the Revenue Sharing Factor for that Year by \$______, being the Revenue Sharing Base Amount.
 - 3.4 The Revenue Sharing Amount for 200_ is \$_____.

4. Sharing of Revenue:

- 4.1 During each Year of the Term, Mackenzie will pay High Level as High Level's share of the Assessment within the Town's Sphere of Influence for that Year, the Revenue Sharing Amount for that Year calculated and determined in accordance with clause _ hereof as follows:
 - (a) One half (1/2) of the Revenue Sharing Amount shall become due and be paid on ______ of each Year of the Term;
 - (b) One half (1/2) of the Revenue Sharing Amount shall become due and be paid on ______ of each Year of the Term.

- 4.2 The Revenue Sharing Amount for a Year paid pursuant to paragraph 4.1 hereof shall be the total revenue sharing amount paid by Mackenzie to High Level and shall be deemed to include all payments for capital contributions and revenue sharing for the Year.
- 4.3 The parties acknowledge and agree that the payments outlined in this clause 4 hereof constitute a voluntary sharing of Assessment and resulting tax revenue and that the Assessment within the Town's Sphere of Influence is and shall remain the assessment and revenue of Mackenzie and not the assessment and revenue of High Level. While Mackenzie has agreed to pay the Revenue Sharing Amount for each year of the Term, nothing in this Agreement shall oblige Mackenzie to continue to pay the Revenue Sharing Amount or any amount to High Level after the end of the Term.

5. Dispute Resolution:

In accordance with the requirements of section 55(2) of the Act, the 5.1 parties have agreed to a dispute resolution mechanism as follows. In the event of a dispute or disagreement between the parties about the interpretation of any term of this Agreement, prior to making application to a Court, either party may request that the matter be referred to a single arbitrator. The request to appoint an arbitrator must be in writing and made to the other party and, if such a request is made, the other party must respond in writing within five (5) Business Days of receipt of the request to arbitrate, naming three (3) persons that party would accept to have act as a single arbitrator. If the party requesting the arbitration finds one or more of the persons suggested as arbitrators as acceptable, that party will inform the other party in writing of which arbitrator or arbitrators they find acceptable and, in this event, the parties shall proceed to arbitration in accordance with paragraph 5.2 hereof. If the party requesting the arbitration finds none of the arbitrators suggested by the other party acceptable, then within five (5) Business Days of receiving the list of persons, the initiating party will respond in writing naming three (3) alternative persons that it would accept to have act as a single arbitrator. The other party must, respond within a further five (5) Business Days. Both parties must act reasonably throughout. Only after the above efforts to agree on an arbitrator have been exhausted, then either party may proceed on application to the Court of Queen's Bench of Alberta to have the dispute or disagreement decided by a justice of the Court of Queen's Bench.

5.2 If the parties have elected to have their dispute or disagreement settled by arbitration in accordance with paragraph 5.1, hereof, then they shall appoint one of the arbitrators chosen in accordance with paragraph 5.1 within five (5) Business Days of receipt of the name or names of an acceptable arbitrator or arbitrators. Once the arbitrator has been appointed and has accepted the appointment each party will provide the arbitrator and the other party with a written submission outlining that party's position within two (2) Business Days of the appointment of the arbitrator. Each party may, within two (2) Business Days of receipt of the other party's submission, provide the arbitrator with a rebuttal in writing. Thereafter, if the parties agree, the arbitrator may hear oral submissions.

Within ten (10) Business Days of receipt of the rebuttals or, if oral submissions are provided, within ten (10) Business Days of the conclusion of such oral submissions, the arbitrator shall deliver his decision which shall be final and binding on the parties. The costs of the arbitration shall be paid equally by both parties unless the arbitrator determines that one party should bear all of the costs of the arbitration and so indicates in his decision.

5.3 Notwithstanding paragraph 5.1 and 5.2 hereof, nothing in this Agreement shall prevent the parties from utilizing such other method of resolving the dispute as the parties may agree to.

6. Option to Renew and Early Renewal:

6.1 Either party may, at its option, give notice in writing ("Notice to Amend") to the other party at any time on or after January 1, 2006 that it wishes to amend the terms of the Agreement. The Notice to Amend must reference the terms of the Agreement which the party wishes to amend and that party's suggested amendments to these terms. On receipt of a Notice to Amend, the other party must, within ten (10) Business Days provide the first party with the other party's position on the proposed amendments. If the parties agree, then this Agreement will be amended in accordance with the terms of the parties' agreement for the remainder of the Term. If the parties fail to agree to the proposed amendments— then this Agreement shall remain in full force and effect and unamended for the remainder of the Term.

6.2 This Agreement may be renewed for such further term as the parties may agree.

7. Entire Agreement

It is understood and agreed between the parties that the terms and conditions set forth herein, together with any schedules annexed hereto, are all of the terms and conditions of this Agreement entered into between Mackenzie and High Level and supercede and take the place of any and all agreements or representations of any kind, written, oral or implied, heretofore made by anyone in reference to the sharing of revenues. If any provision of this Agreement is illegal or unenforceable it shall be considered separate and severable from the conditions of this Agreement and the remaining provisions shall remain in force and be binding as though the said illegal or unenforceable provision had never been included.

8. General Clauses

- 8.1 This Agreement is only assignable by either party with the written agreement of the other party.
- 8.2 This Agreement shall enure to the benefit of and be binding upon the parties hereto and their respective successors and permitted assigns.
- 8.3 Any notice given under this Agreement shall be duly and properly given if delivered addressed as follows:

- 8.4 Time shall be of the essence in this Agreement.
- 8.5 This Agreement shall be construed and governed by the laws of the Province of Alberta.
- 9. Amendment or Termination Only by Written Agreement

This Agreement may be modified, amended, assigned or terminated during the Term only in a written instrument, duly executed by the parties. Nothing in this Agreement precludes either party from providing the services referred to under this Agreement to other parties.

10. No Waiver

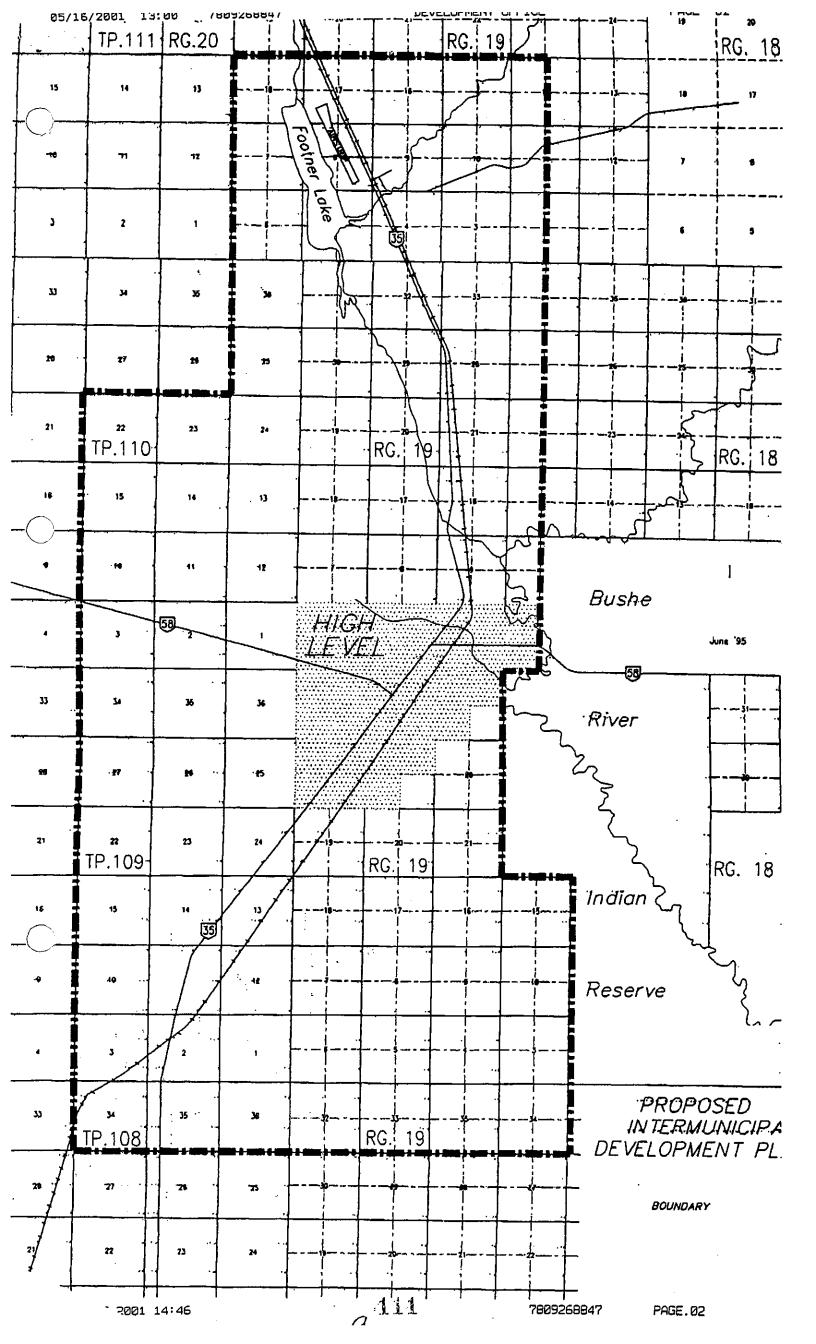

Dear Bill:

I have received your letter of July 19, 2001. I apologize for my tardiness in answering.

I also apologize for choosing the word "comprehensive" in describing the criteria of our negotiations. It seems to have confused the issue. Perhaps I should have used the word "interdependent" instead as each of the four agreements: Service Sharing; Inter-Municipal Development Plan, Joint Economic Development Initiative and Revenue Sharing are all dependent on each other and therefore are "interdependent".

For instance, I see a problem with having both parties agreeing to jointly fund REDI and then, because there is no Inter-Municipal or Revenue Sharing Agreement in place, the Town needs to protect its interests and opposes development adjacent to the Town. What a waste of time and effort! I believe a Joint Economic Development Agreement can not be done in isolation of the other agreements. Another example is having Cost-Sharing Agreements. The Town will not have any further borrowing capacity once the Water Treatment Plant is constructed, therefore, should there be an unexpected event or a large unplanned expenditure (i.e. the need for a new fire truck), the Town may not be able to meet its obligations under these agreements. Please do not misunderstand me, it is the Town's expressed intent to fulfill the obligations of these agreements, but must have the financial ability to do so. (As you are aware, we have never cancelled an agreement with anyone and do not intend to do so.)

In other words, we need to address all agreements as each has a direct impact on the other agreements. The above examples are what I meant by a "comprehensive" agreement. Unfortunately, Mr. Maddison and I were unable to explain this "interdependency" due to the inadequate time allotted and the barrage of irrelevant questions posed to us.

The Town is also concerned that any Revenue Sharing agreement be "palatable" to the rural taxpayers. It is for this reason, we did not propose any sharing of the oil and gas revenues even though it is acknowledged that the Town of High Level is the regional

service center and is significantly impacted by this type of activity. I suggested that the Revenue Sharing agreement be based on the assessment, excluding residential and farm assessment, within an agreed radius of the Town. This a compromise on the Town's previous position and one that indicates our willingness to negotiate agreements both parties feel are "palatable".

The Town accepts its role as a regional service center and often makes tough financial decisions based on this role. A case in point is the construction of a new regional hospital. This hospital will provide services that currently both MD and Town residents have to travel 300 to 800 km to obtain. However, this has not come without a cost to the Town. To date, the Town has transferred enough land to not only ensure that the Northwestern Regional Health Authority will have ample land for the proposed facility, but will have adequate room for the next 20 years. This decision was made with the needs of the region in mind. Also, in order to secure this facility for the region, the taxpayers of the Town will be contributing approximately \$700,000 to the development of the hospital with full recognition that the Hospital will not be paying taxes to the Town. The Town is prepared to support these types of regional services through higher taxes but also feels that the MD should be supporting the growth of the region through a revenue sharing formula with the Town.

I response for your request for the Town to quantify our request, I cannot see the merits of getting another expensive study to gather more information. I believe the facts are obvious to both parties. The strong regional economic and population growth is having an impact on the Town of High Level. Some of the impacts have been positive but others have been less so. The Town will be looking at ways and means of living within its fiscal capacity but without the support and involvement of the MD, slowing our growth may be our only option. I do not believe that this approach would be in either of our best interests.

Bill, it is imperative that our communities strike an agreement ending this longstanding and damaging stalemate. My goal is to achieve agreements in the areas mentioned prior to the Municipal elections. I know that this a bold plan, but I believe that if we can shift our focus from the past to the future, both the tax payers of MD and Town will benefit. These agreements will be historical documents and a significant step forward for our communities. The challenge is up to both our Councils to come willingly to the negotiation table. I believe our two Council's can do that and through our vision and foresight ensure the future prosperity of the entire area.

Deputy Reeve Rosenberger welcomed Ken Boutillier, Assistant Deputy Minister, Neil Reddekopp, Executive Director of Aboriginal Land Claims, Dan Wilkinson, Director of Northern Operations, and Ken McCrae, Regional Manager for the Boreal Forest, to the meeting at 1:10 p.m.

Ken Boutillier, Neil Reddekopp, Dan Wilkinson, and Ken McCrae discussed the status of the Memorandum of Understanding between the provincial government and the Little Red River and Tall Cree Nations and the letters of intent as well as the negotiations of timber on F11.

Neil Reddekopp gave a summary of the history of Land Claims stating that treaties were based on population. There are three types of land claims: comprehensive claims when there is an absence of treaties, specific claims against federal government for treaty land entitlement and treaties established within the provinces. The first nations in northern Alberta were fully established in 1912, with the first being Beaver First Nation followed by Tall Cree and Little Red River First Nations. At the time, reserves were set aside at 120 acres per person. The First Nations population was underestimated. The land set aside for the First Nations were an obligation of the federal government and the province received an annual subsidy. A 1929 agreement

transferred land and resources to provinces; provinces transferred back unoccupied land to meet treaty obligations.

To gain land entitlement a claim must be filed through the Specific Claims process or proceed with litigation. First Nations do the research, which is funded by federal government loans and later paid back. Indian Affairs sends the claim to the Federal Department of Justice who then make a recommendation to Indian Affairs. This process takes at least four years. The federal government invites the province to participate in negotiations at this point. Settlement agreements are made under treaty and the Constitution.

Where lands affect a third party the third party's interests are protected throughout the process and meetings will be held as required to address municipal concerns. Land will not be taken for a claim where the third party's interests are not protected. Municipal land will not be expropriated. Actual terms are being negotiated due to unequal value of land from the 1912 to the present as well as the difference in population. The majority of settlements are in the form of cash compensation from federal government. Once these settlements are reached, Alberta is released from further obligations. There are currently three claims asserted within the M.D. of Mackenzie boundaries; the Beaver First Nation submitted a claim to Ottawa 1-2 years ago and is in it's first year of research; Little Red River Cree Nation is asserting a number of claims under litigation and are still in the early stages. They have not submitted any claims to Ottawa. The Dene Tha First Nation has entered into litigation but the province has not been named as a defendant.

Ken Boutillier discussed the obligation of the federal government stating that claims are filed against the federal government but that the provincial government has an obligation to provide crown land to the federal government for the purpose of land claims. Third party interests will be protected and municipal land will not be expropriated. The province tries to keep municipalities involved. If claims remain unsettled, development is halted such as forestry and economic activity. To get the province to take action, the Court must make a decision or the federal government must make changes in the constitution.

Mr. Boutillier defined "third-party" as someone who has a legal interest in the land such as a disposition, timber allocations and oil and gas, although sometimes organizations such as snowmobile clubs become involved as well. There are currently three claims within the M.D. of

Mackenzie; the Beaver First Nation's claims is that they originally received inadequate land; Little Red River First Nation have a continuing claim to provide for future growth. It is not a provincial policy to provide for future growth in a land claim. The Dene Tha First Nation's claim is based on the criteria that if there was a shortfall of land per population in the 1912 negotiations, then land claims must now be settled based on current population. All these claims have been filed less than 2 years ago and only the Dene Tha have a legal document.

Ken Boutillier stated that the need of a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) arose from the First Nations concern over lack of consultation regarding resources and is not part of any land claims. The MOU provides a better way of consultation with bands and forest allocation rights; there is no transfer of authority. The Province will seek to improve communication with the municipality. The MOU does not transfer rights, authority, etc, but grants involvement to interested parties. The MOU Board is advisory only. Different Canadians have different rights and the rights must be defined. Currently the rights are unclear in the constitution. The Federal government can infringe on rights but it must be justified.

Harvey Prockiw suggested that the Integrated Resource Management is more balanced than the MOU process, as it does not have one party that is in control, but all parties have a voice. This process is backed by the provincial government.

There is no MOU with the Dene Tha, but letters of intent have been received by the province. Industry and the province agreed to give funding to the Dene Tha and are now evaluating the project. Anyone is able to intervene with claim applications. The Little Red River Cree Nation MOU expired in March 2001 and has not been renewed however the direction is to extend agreement for another 2 years.

Regarding F11, the Beaver First Nation have not submitted any land claims yet and there are no timber allocation on table as of now. There is a lot of oil and gas in that area.

Councillor Driedger left the meeting at 2:31 p.m.

Council asked why logging permits were postponed in F11. Ken McCrea stated that permission was given to log the permits in F11 but the local mills chose not to. They have a legal right to go on crown land.

Councillor Driedger re-entered the meeting at 2:35 p.m.

The owner of Precision Lumber stated that the local sawmills had done due diligence and consultation with the Beaver First Nations to identify spiritual areas etc., but industry was still prevented from logging F11. The Beaver First Nations threatened they would do everything the their power to stop the logging process.

Council requested copies of all agreements and correspondence affecting land within the M.D.

Deputy Reeve Rosenberger thanked Ken Boutillier, Neil Reddekopp, Dan Wilkinson, and Ken McCrae, who then left the Council table at 2:41 p.m.

Deputy Reeve Rosenberger recessed the meeting at 2:41 p.m.

Deputy Reeve Rosenberger reconvened the meeting at 2:52 p.m.

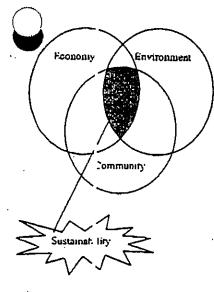

FINAL Terms of Reference

Northern East Slopes Sustainable Resource and Environmental Management Strategy March 30, 2000

"To effectively integrate resource management, we need to look at large areas ... and deal with large-scale issues such as biodiversity, airsheds, forest fire regimes and the resource dependence of a regional economy" (Doug Radke, Deputy Minister, Alberta Environment, Decembe 1999).



INTRODUCTION

In March of 1999, the Alberta Government stated its commitment to the wise management of Alberta's natural resources and environment for the benefit of all Alberta's present and future generations; in the Commitment to Sustainable Resource and Environmental Management. The Vision of Sustainable Development for Alberta as stated in the March 1999 Commitment to Sustainable Resource and Environmental Management policy is set out below.

"Alberta, a member of the global community, is a leader in sustainable development, ensuring a healthy environment, a healthy economy, and a high quality of life in the present and future."

"Integrated Resource Management is based on cooperation, communication, consideration of all values and consultation before action. It recognizes that everything is connected to everything else." (Doug Radke, Deputy Minister of Alberta Environment). The Commitment to Sustainable Resource and Environmental Management states that "regional plans will provide a level of detail between provincial policy and operational decision making". Regional plans are at a scale of 1:250,000.

The government departments accountable for ensuring the commitment is achieved are Alberta Environment; Alberta Agriculture, Food and Rural Development; Alberta Resource Development; and Alberta Economic Development. The Regional Environmental Resource Committees (ERCs) are responsible for leading and implementing the Alberta commitment initiative at the regional level.

Building upon other provincial experiences in Integrated Resource Management (IRM), the following terms of reference will provide a blueprint for action to develop a Northern East Slopes Sustainable Resource and Environmental Management Strategy (NES Strategy). The development of the NES Strategy will consider existing planning policy (i.e., Eastern Slopes Policy). Additionally, the NES Strategy will maintain a seamless link to incorporate ongoing regional development, regional research and resource management initiatives (i.e., Foothills Model Forest, Caribou Cumulative Effects, etc).

STRATEGY PRODUCTS/OUTCOMES

The products of the NES Strategy will include:

- A regional vision with goals and indicators, that outlines desired sustainable resource use and considers economy, environment, community and aboriginal interests.
- The identification, prioritization and analysis of values, issues and concerns in realizing our regional sustainable resource management vision.
- Strategies to achieve the goals and to resolve outstanding issues and concerns.
- A process to monitor, evaluate, report and improve the NES Strategy.

- Enhanced communication and co-operation among industries, communities, government and aboriginal people;
- Clear strategic direction for managing resources in the region;
- Improved management of cumulative effects;
- Better understanding of the relationships between economic, environment, and community interest that are important for decision making within the region.
- Efficient, effective and consistent land management decisions, approvals and referrals;
- Identification of sub-regional and local planning priorities;
- Increased certainty with respect to the development of the region's natural resources;
- Community concerns are considered in resource development and environmental management decisions.

TIMEFRAME

An interim report, outlining the regional vision, goals, indicators, prioritized concerns, and required actions will be completed by December 31, 2000. This preliminary version of the Strategy will include an identification of critical and immediate issues, and action plans for their resolution, based on fast-tracked analysis and consultation. The subsequent consolidated Strategy document, completed in the spring of 2002, will additionally contain comprehensive strategies for a-wider range of issues based on more extensive analysis and consultation.

A proposed workplan and budget for the 2000/2001 fiscal year will be developed by April 2000. The interim report will finalize the budget for the 2001/2002 fiscal year.

REGIONAL STRATEGY BOUNDARY

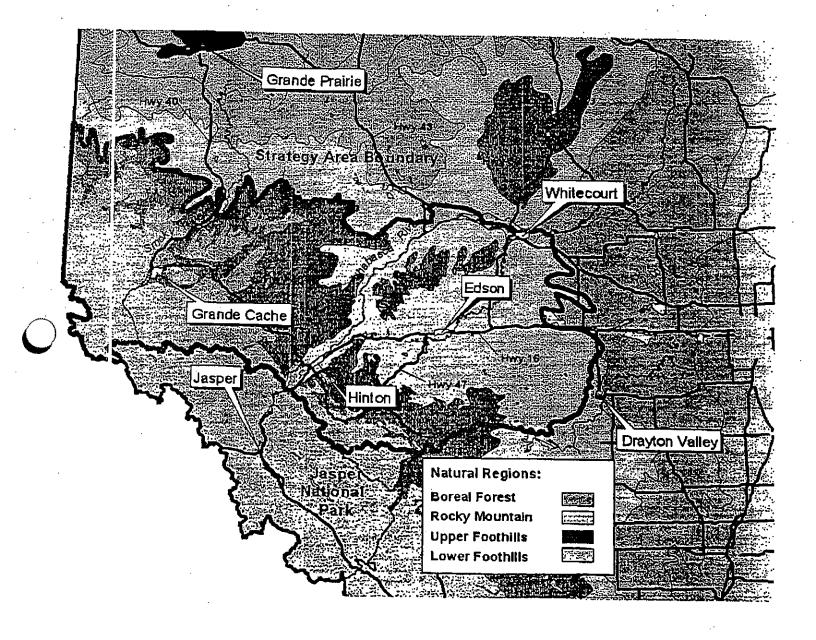
The NES Strategy area, as shown on the attached map, will include portions of the Athabasca and Smoky River watersheds in Alberta. At a more detailed scale, the study boundary will include:

- The Smoky River watershed within the Rocky Mountain Natural Region and the Upper Foothills Natural Subregion;
- The Athabasca River watershed within the Rocky Mountain and Foothills Natural Regions with a boundary of Highway 43 to the Northeast.

Integrated resource management must consider that ecosystems, flows and resources overlap and cross jurisdictional boundaries. As a result, the regional area boundaries will remain flexible and change if the issues and concerns being addressed warrant it. Regional alliances based on economic interests at the community level will be explored within the study boundary.

 To review, influence, critique and support the interim and final products of the planning process through a variety of public consultation mechanisms such as workshops.

(Note: The Edson and District Sustainable Communities Initiative, is a model to consider for community involvement)

PROJECT MANAGEMENT

Northern East Slopes ERC will support the development of the NES Strategy. This committee includes membership from Alberta Environment, Alberta Agriculture, Food and Rural Development, Alberta Resource Development, Alberta EUB and Jasper National Park.

The NES Strategy recommendations will be developed under the direction of a Regional Steering Group for Ministerial approval. The NES Regional Planner will act as Project Manager under the direction of the Steering Group.

The Foothills Model Forest Board has agreed to support the NES Strategy by:

- Providing research data; and technical input on the criteria and indicators for use in the Strategy.
- Reviewing, influencing, critiquing and supporting the interim and final products of the planning process;

The linkages of management and the basic functions of each responsible group are outlined in the following management linkage chart. Appendix I outlines the Roles and Responsibilities of each group in more detail.

BACKGROUND / PROPOSAL:

The applicant is requesting to re-zone SE 09 -110-19-W5M from Agricultural District 1 "A1" to Country Residential District "CR", to accommodate the growing demand for country residential acreage's.

DISCUSSION / OPTIONS / BENEFITS / DISADVANTAGES:

The subject property consists of approximately 157 acres and is immediately adjacent to the northern boundary of the Town of High Level and east of Highway 35. The subject property is situated east of the Railway Line (at the west) paralleling Highway 35 with approximately 70 acres under cultivation, supporting a hay crop. The parcel is fragmented by two waterways.

CONCERNS

1) Soil Classification

According to Mackenzie Municipal Services Agency's report, the Canada Land Inventory soil classification for the subject land consists of class 4 and 5 soil. The majority of the subject property does not constitute better agriculture land, including some smaller parcels, although class 4 soil, but difficult to farm. No Agrologist report was provided.

2) Location of proposed rezoning

The subject property is located immediately adjacent to the Town of High Level boundary. Our Land Use Bylaw, Section 5.3.A.H(e)(ii) of the RURAL COUNTRY RESIDENTIAL DISTRICT "RC" requires that any Country Residential Subdivision be a

The applicant is requesting a rezoning from AGRICULTURAL DISTRICT I "AI" to RURAL COUNTRY RESIDENTIAL DISTRICT "RC" in PART of the SE-09-110-19-WSM. The subject site consists of approximately 157 acres and is immediately adjacent to the northern boundary of the Town of High Level and east of Highway 35. The subject site is situated east of the Railway Line (at the west) paralleling Highway 35. The subject land appears to be under cultivation.

RECOMMENDATION

That the subject rezoning application of lands in PART of the SE-09-110-19-WSM from AGRICULTURAL DISTRICT I "A1" to RURAL COUNTRY RESIDENTIAL DISTRICT "RC" be DENIED

DISCUSSION

- 1. The subject lands are classified as 5⁶wO⁴ and some 4⁸D⁴w according to the Canada Land Inventory. Much of the subject property does not constitute better Agricultural land, which is defined as Classes 1-4, Canada Land Inventory, according to MD 23's General Municipal Plan. The remaining Class 4 Lands are too small to farm as a viable unit.
- 2. Despite the fact, a large part of the site can be considered as poorer agricultural land, much of the land appears to be characterized by organic

soils and has a general soil wetness constraint. MD 23 Council should therefore be assured that the site has suitability for on site sewage disposal and therefore, a septic tank feasibility report should be submitted from the applicant to the MD for review from a qualified professional.

3. The main problem with respect to this application is that Section H (e) (ii) of the RURAL COUNTRY RESIDENTIAL DISTRICT "RC" requires that any Country Residential Subdivision be a minimum of 3.2 Kilometres from the boundary of The Town of High Level.

This section of the Land Use Bylaw was taken directly from previous Provincial Subdivision Regulations. Although these separation distances (intended to provide a buffer area around urban centres) are no longer in effect in The Provincial Regulations, they are still requirements that must be met in the MD's Land Use Bylaw.

MD 23 Council may wish to review these separation distance requirements in the course of the current Review of MD 23's Land Use Bylaw . Until these requirements are removed Rural Country Residential Subdivisions / RC rezoning applications immediately adjacent to The Town of High Level, cannot be approved.

Ron and I have reviewed this proposal and have major concerns from both a Planning and design perspective.

- A total of 139 lots are shown which at 3 to 4 persons per lot would yield a potential population of between, 417 and 556 people, the size of a village
- I cannot see the Town of High Level agreeing to such a large 2. development immediately outside the Town limits.

Such a development would require full Town water and sewer services and the Town would have to agree to this.

Any development of this size and scale would have to be deemed as premature until the new Inter- Municipal Development Plan is prepared and adopted by both Councils.

- This is not a country residential subdivision but clearly an urban 3. development of 80-90 foot lots. It does not offer a country residential lifestyle.
- We have major concerns with the design of the subdivision and 4. constraints of the site.

Only one access point is to be provided for 139 lots. No provision is made for Emergency access.

Paul Driedger, Director, Planning and Emergency Services July 27, 2001

- The flood plain- and top of the Bank of the Bushe River will have to be determined and therefore many of the River lots may not be feasible. Environmental Reserve will have to be shown.
- There is no Public Reserve shown which according to the MGA Act must be up to 10% of the area (minus Environmental Reserve). It is unacceptable to have no Parkland for such a large subdivision.
- Having residential lots about a Railway line is undesirable. At the very least proper buffers, berms, screening and noise walls would have to be provided.
- No Buffers are shown at the south to buffer the Highway commercial area to the south in the Town.
- Roads are excessively long. 1000 metres of continuous road in first phase and 900 metres in second.
- Our CLI soil maps show that there are extensive areas of organic / wet solls, which present problems for construction.
- Lots are relatively long and narrow with many close to or over 300 feet in depth. This is undesirable from the point of view of lot maintenance.
- 5. The proposal clearly does not conform to the RC District Provisions, which require a minimum of 5 acre (not ½ acre) lots and no development within 3.2 kilometres of the Town. The only zone that comes close is the Hamlet Residential District 1 "HR1", which obviously is only applied to Hamlet areas.

I am sorry I cannot be more supportive of this proposal but it defles a number of basic Planning principles. I cannot understand why the applicant applied for the RC Zoning when this proposal clearly does not fit.

I cannot see any viable options at this time unless, the applicant is willing to substantially scale down the proposal, submit a proper design, and secure the support of the Town of High Level.

We have received a number of development permits requesting to develop a yardsite for future development. This has caused some concern in the control of development in areas with no proper access (Built to M.D. No.23's standards) from public roads to the property.

DISCUSSION / OPTIONS / BENEFITS / DISADVANTAGES:

The request is to make a Technical amendment to the Land Use Bylaw to enable better control over any type of development that intends on building in areas that have no proper access from public roads with the exception of site preparation to the applicable property. Once an access from a public road is developed, then further development would be allowed on the applicable property. The proposed changes to section 3.1 in the Land Use Bylaw will direct the Development Officers to deny development permit applications that do not meet the M.D. requirements for proper access from public roads.

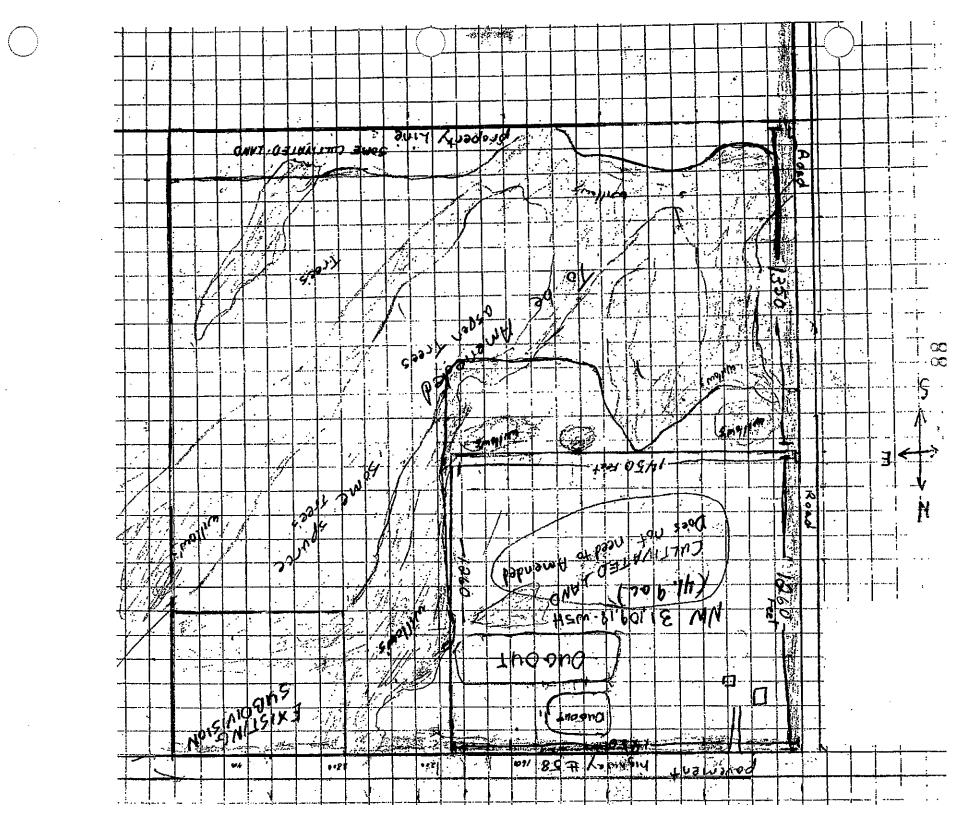

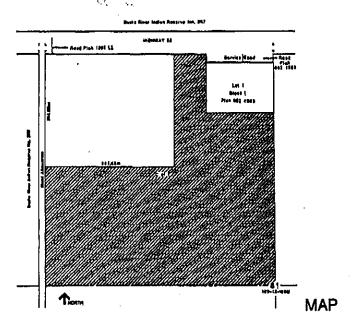

BYLAW 272/01

BEING A BYLAW OF THE MUNICIPAL DISTRICT OF MACKENZIE NO. 23 IN THE PROVINCE OF ALBERTA

TO PROVIDE FOR THE CONTROL AND OPERATION OF PARKS, CAMPGROUNDS AND OTHER PUBLIC AREAS WITHIN

CHANGE

MUNICIPAL DISTRICT OF MACKENZIE NO. 23

WHEREAS pursuant to the Municipal Government Act, being chapter M-26.1 of the Revised Statutes of Alberta, 1994 and amendments thereto the Council of the Municipal District of Mackenzie No. 23 may pass bylaws respecting people, activities and things in, on or near a public place or place that is open to the public; and

WHEREAS the Municipal District of Mackenzie No. 23 and the Province of Alberta have an agreement in place permitting the Municipal District of Mackenzie No. 23 to administer and enforce the Parks Bylaw at the following sites: Wadlin Lake, Machesis Lake, Tourangeau Lake, Fort Vermilion Bridge Campsite and all day use camp areas within the Municipality.

NOW THEREFORE, the Council of the Municipal District of Mackenzie No. 23 in the Province of Alberta, duly assembled, enacts as follows:

SHORT TITLE

1. This Bylaw may be cited as the "MUNICIPAL PARKS BYLAW".

DEFINITIONS

- 2. In this Bylaw, unless context otherwise requires:
 - (a) "ABANDONED", means left standing at a location for more than 72 consecutive hours other than pursuant to a license, permit, or other similar authorization, or prior authorization of a Park Officer;
 - (b) "ANIMAL", means a domestic animal and includes an animal that is wild by nature but has been domesticated;

- (c) "CAMPING ACCOMMODATION UNIT", means a
 - (a) tent
 - (b) trailer
 - (c) tent trailer
 - (d) van
 - (e) truck camper
 - (f) motorhome
- (d) "COUNCIL", means the Council of the Municipal District of Mackenzie No. 23, duly assembled and acting as such;
- (e) "FIREARM", means any device that propels a projectile by means of explosion, spring, air, gas, string, wire or elastic material or any combination of those things;
- (f) "HIGHWAY", means a highway as defined in the Highway Traffic Act;
- (g) "INDIVIDUAL CAMPSITE", means a separate designated stall under this Bylaw;
- (h) "MOTOR VEHICLE", means a motor vehicle as defined in the Highway Traffic Act;
- (i) "MUNICIPALITY", means the Municipal District of Mackenzie No. 23, a Municipal Corporation in the Province of Alberta.
- (j) "OFF-HIGHWAY VEHICLE", means an off-highway vehicle as defined in the Off Highway Vehicle Act;
- (k) "PARK", means land designated as park, campground or recreation area by the Council;
- (I) "PARK OFFICER", means a person appointed as a Park Officer, a Bylaw Enforcement Officer, a Special Constable appointed pursuant to the provisions of the Police Act, a Statute of Alberta, or a member of the Royal Canadian Mounted Police;
- (m) "PUBLIC AREA", means an area in the Municipality normally accessible for use by the public.
- (n) "WATER ACTIVITY", includes swimming, wading, or any other activity resulting in full or partial immersion of a person's body into water.

PARK USAGE

- 3. Any person using a park shall
 - (a) keep the land and improvements in a condition satisfactory to a Park Officer.
 - (b) Comply with the instructions, prohibitions and directions prescribed by all lawfully designated and erected signs and notices.
- Any person vacating a park shall restore the area to a clean and tidy condition.
- 5. No person shall
 - (a) interfere with the right of others to the quiet and peaceful enjoyment of a park.
 - (b) deface, injure or destroy any municipal property in a park.
 - (c) excavate or remove any tree, plant, or shrub.
 - (d) remove park equipment.
 - (e) display or post any signs or advertisements in a park unless authorized by the Park Officer or Council.
 - (f) remove, deface, damage or destroy any sign boards, signs or notices posted or placed in a park under authority of this or any other Bylaw or Act.
 - (g) clean clothing, fish, cooking or eating utensils, vehicles, equipment, or bathe at or near a drinking fountain, standpipe, well or pump in a park.
- 6. All construction must be authorized by the municipality.
- 7. No person shall carry on a business in a park unless he has received permission from the Municipality for that purpose.

REGISTRATION AND CAMPING PERMITS

- 8. All persons entering a park shall register at the Self-Registration Vault or with a Park Officer.
- 9. Each camping accommodation unit must have an individual camping permit.

- 10. Notwithstanding subsection 8 and 9 children under the age of 16 years staying in a tent are exempt from registering provided they are staying in an individual campsite that is currently being occupied by a person(s) with a valid camping permit.
- 11. The Municipality may issue individual campsite permits, day use permits, or group camping permits under this Bylaw.
- 12. The Municipality may provide for and designate areas for day use and overnight camping.
- 13. Permits shall be issued on a first come, first serve basis.
- 14. No person shall camp overnight in a park except in an area designated for that purpose unless otherwise authorized by a Park Officer and has a valid permit.
- 15. No person shall alter a camping permit or transfer a camping permit to another person.
- 16. The camping permit shall be made available for inspection by the Park Officer at any time.
- A group camping permit may be subject to any conditions the Municipality considers appropriate.
- 18. Council may, in writing, waive any applicable fee to any person or group.
- 19. When a campground or park has individual campsites, the maximum allowable combination of motorized vehicles, camping accommodation units, and towed equipment shall not exceed three (3), of which not more than two (2) shall be motorized vehicles
- 20. If neither of the two (2) motorized vehicles permitted under section 19 is towing a camping accommodation unit or being used for accommodations, two (2) tents may be kept in a campsite in addition to the vehicles permitted under section 19.
- No person shall camp for more than fourteen (14) consecutive days in the same campground in a park without the written permission of a Park Officer.
- 22. An individual campsite shall be considered to be unoccupied when no camping accommodation unit, motor vehicle, or personal belongings are located on the campsite.

- 23. A camping permit is automatically cancelled if the campsite to which it relates to is unoccupied for 24 consecutive hours.
- 24. A Park Officer may cancel a camping permit on written notice to the permit holder, if the permit holder contravenes this Bylaw and the permit holder shall vacate the campsite within one hour of receiving such notice.
- 25. On the expiration or cancellation of a camping permit, the permit holder shall ensure that the campsite is vacated and that all personal property is removed.
- 26. The Municipality may add to, delete or vary the terms and conditions to which a permit is issued under this Bylaw.
- 27. No visitors shall be allowed in the park after 11:00 p.m. Any person remaining in the park after 11:00 p.m. shall be subject to pay the overnight camping fee.
- 28. No person shall occupy or remain in an area designated as a day use area after 11:00 p.m. unless authorized by a Park Officer.
- 29. Check out time for overnight camping shall be 2:00 p.m., day rate charges shall apply to overnight campers who check out after 2:00 p.m.

ACCESS RESTRICTIONS

30. No person shall enter or remain in a park or portion of a park where travel or access restrictions have been imposed under this Bylaw.

FIRE

- 31. No person shall set, light or maintain a fire in a park except in a fireplace, pit or other facility designed for that purpose.
- 32. A person may use any dead vegetation for fuel purposes in a park.
- 33. Where the Municipality is of the opinion that a fire hazard exists in a park, the Municipality may, by erecting signs and notices for the purpose, prohibit the setting, lighting or maintaining of fires in all or part of a park.
- 34. No fire shall be left unattended or be allowed to spread.
- 35. No person shall deposit or dispose of hot coals, ashes, embers or any other burning or smoldering material in a place other than a stove, firepit, or other place provided for that purpose by the Municipality.

- 36. All fires, hot coals or smoldering materials shall be extinguished before leaving.
- 37. No person shall remove firewood from a park.

VEHICLES

- 38. No person shall, within a park, operate or ride an off-highway vehicle that is motor driven, except on a designated trail or area unless otherwise authorized by the Municipality.
- 39. A Park Officer may prohibit the entry of a vehicle into any part of a park.
- 40. No vehicle shall be parked in a manner or at a location that impedes traffic.
- 41. No person shall exceed the posted speed limit with a motor vehicle or off-highway vehicle in a park.
- 42. The owner of a motor vehicle or off-highway vehicle which is involved in any contravention of this Bylaw is guilty of an offence.
- 43. When a motor vehicle, off-highway vehicle, boat, trailer, equipment, appliance, article, or object
 - (a) is abandoned,
 - (b) remains in an area after the authorization to be in that area has expired, or
 - (c) is located in a prohibited area.
 - a Park Officer may remove, store or dispose of this item in accordance with this Bylaw.
- 44. A Park Officer may seize any vehicle, off-highway vehicle, boat, trailer or any equipment, appliance or other article or object that is being used in a park in contravention of this Bylaw, whether it is found in possession of the person alleged to have committed the contravention or not.
- 45. No motor vehicle, off-highway vehicle, boat, trailer, equipment, appliance, article or object that has been removed or seized shall be released to its owner or the owner's agent until all expenses incurred by the Municipality regarding the subject item have been paid. Such charges shall be in addition to any fine or penalty imposed in respect of any violation or to any payment made in lieu of prosecution as provided for in Schedule "A" of this Bylaw.

46. Pursuant to section 45, if any item stored is not claimed by the owner or someone on his behalf, in return for full payment of costs incurred, within 60 days of its removal, the item and its contents shall be turned over to the Municipality to be disposed of.

<u>ANIMALS</u>

- 47. No person having the custody or control of an animal shall
 - (a) bring the animal into a park or allow the animal to enter or remain in a park unless it is under the immediate, continuous, and effective control of such person.
 - (b) bring into or allow an animal to enter or remain in or on any area in a park that is
 - a designated swimming area,

 - (2) a beach area,(3) a public washroom, or other public building or structure, or
 - (4) any other area where signs are posted prohibiting animals.
- 48. A Park Officer may refuse to admit to a park, or require to be removed from a park, any animal if the animal
 - is not under control (a)
 - is a nuisance (b)
 - threatens the life, safety, health, or comfort of any person, or (c)
 - (d) damages property
- 49. A Park Officer and/or any other person acting under the supervision of a Park Officer may capture an animal running at large in a park.
- 50. When an animal is captured, the Park Officer shall
 - impound the animal, and (a)
 - (b) make a reasonable attempt to contact the owner or person having custody of the animal.
- 51. Where the owner or person having custody of an animal, claims a captured animal from a Park Officer, that person shall pay the fees as set out in the Municipal District of Mackenzie No. 23's Animal Control Bylaw.
- 52. When an animal has been impounded for the time period required in the

Municipal District of Mackenzie No. 23's Animal Control Bylaw, and no person claims it, a Park Officer may dispose of the animal in accordance with the Animal Control Bylaw.

53. No person shall bring into a Municipal park, a horse, pony, or beast of burden except with the written authorization from a Park Officer.

WASTE DISPOSAL

- 54. No person shall
 - (a) deposit liquid or solid waste matter in a park except in a receptacle or area provided for that purpose by the Municipality.
 - (b) bring commercial or residential waste matter into a park for disposal.
- 55. In areas in a park where waste disposal receptacles are not provided, waste matters shall be carried out of the area for disposal.

NUISANCE

- 56. If, in the opinion of a Park Officer, a nuisance exists on any site which is subject to a permit, the Park Officer may, in writing, order the person causing the nuisance to abate the nuisance, clean the site, or both.
- 57. Where a person fails to comply with an order made pursuant to section (56) the Park Officer may take whatever steps are necessary to abate the nuisance, clean the site, or both. All costs incurred as a result of the nuisance shall be paid by the offender.
- 58. No person who has been removed from a park pursuant to this Bylaw shall, within the following 72-hour period, enter or attempt to enter a park.

FIREARMS

- 59. No person shall discharge a firearm in a park or campground unless the firearm is discharged by a
 - (a) a Police Officer,
 - (b) a Fish and Wildlife Officer,
 - (c) a duly authorized Municipal employee, agent, or contractor in the performance of their duties.
- 60. Notwithstanding section 59, a person who is in possession of a firearm in a park shall ensure the firearm is unloaded and

- (a) in a condition such that the barrel and stock are separated and taken apart, or
- (b) completely enclosed in a locked case or other covering designed for that purpose.
- 61. No person shall hang or dress big game in the park.

NO SWIMMING

- 62. Any person engaged in swimming, wading or any other Water Activity in a body of water located in a Park or other Public Area, contrary to a "No Swimming" sign posted in respect of that body of water is guilty of an offence and subject to a fine as set out at Schedule B of this Bylaw.
- 63. Any person in or in the immediate vicinity of a Park or other Public Area who is exercising care, control or supervision of a child or children under twelve (12) years of age who is/are engaged in swimming, wading or any other Water Activity contrary to Section 62, is guilty of an offence and subject to a fine as set out at Schedule B of the Bylaw.

<u>SIGNAGE</u>

- 64. The Council may
 - (a) subject to the Highway Traffic Act, control and prohibit the movement of vehicular, pedestrian and other traffic by means of signs and notices designated and erected by it, and
 - (b) designate and erect other signs and notices governing and prohibiting activities that are provided for in this Bylaw.

<u>ADMINISTRATION</u>

- 65. For the purpose of administering and enforcing this Bylaw, a Park Officer may:
 - (a) Enter on and inspect any land, road structure or work in a park;
 - (b) Order the repair, alteration, improvement, evacuation or removal of or addition to any unauthorized structure or work in a park;
 - (c) Order any person in a park to cease or refrain from any action, omission or conduct that in the opinion of the Park Officer is dangerous to life or property or detrimental to the use and enjoyment of the park by other persons;

HODED

- (d) Require any person in a park to inform a Park Officer of
 - (a) the name, and address of the person, and
 - (b) any fact or intention relating to the use of the park by that person;
- (e) Remove from a park
 - (1) any person making unauthorized use of the park,
 - (2) any person failing to comply with any provisions of this Bylaw, and
 - (3) any person creating a nuisance or disturbance or committing a trespass or any undesirable act.
- 66. Each section of this Bylaw shall be read and construed as being separate and severable from each other section. Should any section of this Bylaw be found to have been improperly enacted for any reason, then such section apart shall be regarded as being severable from the rest of the Bylaw and the Bylaw remaining after such severance shall be effective and enforceable.

FEE RATES FOR USE OF CAMPGROUNDS

67. Fees pursuant to this Bylaw shall be paid in accordance with Schedule "A".

CONTRAVENTIONS

- 68. The Municipality or Park Officer may cancel or suspend a permit issued under this Bylaw if the permit holder contravenes this Bylaw, or any terms or conditions to which the permit is subject.
- 69. Every person who contravenes the provisions of this Bylaw is guilty of an offence and liable to the penalty as prescribed in Schedule "B" of this Bylaw or, on summary conviction to a fine not exceeding two thousand dollars (\$2,000.00) or imprisonment for a term of not more than six (6) months or to both a fine and imprisonment.
- 70. A Park Officer may commence a summons or offence notice in the form of a violation ticket or long information for the contravention. A Park Officer may serve upon such a person a violation ticket allowing payment of a specified penalty in the amount prescribed in Schedule "B", in lieu of prosecution for the offence.
- 71. Violation tickets shall be issued in accordance with the Provincial Offences Procedure Act.

Re: Swimming Prohibition – Amendment to Parks Bylaw

Further to your correspondence of July 10, 2001 addressed to our Jeneane Grundberg, we are writing to provide our opinion with respect to incorporation of a "No Swimming" provision into the existing Municipal Parks Bylaw (Bylaw 179/99).

Having reviewed the relevant statutory authority, it is our opinion that the Municipal District has the authority to control swimming within bodies of water located within the jurisdiction of the Municipality. Specifically, s.7(a) and (b) state as follows:

- A council may pass bylaws for municipal purposes respecting the following matters:
 - (a) the safety, health and welfare of people and the protection of people and property;
 - (b) people, activities and things in, on or near a public place or a place that is open to the public

Further, s.60 of the Municipal Government Act states:

60. Subject to any other enactment, a municipality has the direction, control and management of the rivers, streams, water courses, lakes and other natural bodies of water within the municipality, including the airspace above and the ground below.

. Ontario Bar 109



Accordingly, the Municipal Parks Bylaw can be amended to include prohibition against swimming in certain bodies of water where a municipal council has deemed it appropriate to do so.

However, with respect to the Municipal District's authority to take children violating the no swimming prohibition home and issue a ticket to their parents when an offence occurs, we would advise this is likely beyond the scope of the Municipal District's authority. In criminal law generally there is a reluctance to allow legislation which has the affect of making parents vicariously guilty for their children's offences. As a result, it is our recommendation the Municipal District not include provisions purporting to make parents of children caught swimming contrary to the Bylaw guilty for their children's conduct. Notwithstanding this however, it is likely within the authority of the Municipal District to draft the amendment so as to make any person exercising care, control or responsibility over children under the age of twelve (12) years guilty of an offence under the Bylaw where that person is present and allows a child to swim contrary to the Bylaw.

For children between twelve (12) and eighteen (18) years of age, we would recommend that violation tickets be issued directly to the child contravening the Bylaw. The Municipal District must ensure in such circumstances that provisions of the Alberta Young Offenders Act are complied with. Compliance with the Young Offenders Act is of benefit to the Municipal District as, among its other requirements, the Act requires notice to be given to the parents when a violation ticket is issued to advise them that court proceedings are commencing.

Where a child is under the age of twelve (12) years and a parent or guardian is not present at the time the contravention occurs, the Municipal District will not be able to issue a violation ticket against that child or the person exercising the care, control or supervision of that child. However, other remedies may be available to the Municipal District, including removing the child from the park in question and banning that child from accessing the park for a specific period of time. Once again, we would recommend that if such actions are undertaken that a formal notice be issued to the parents advising of the circumstances.

With respect to the text of the proposed amendment we would recommend the following wording:

#.: No Swimming

- #.1 Any person engaging in swimming, wading or any other Water Activity in a body of water located in a Park, contrary to a "No Swimming" sign posted in respect of that body of water is guilty of an offence and subject to a fine as set out at Schedule B of this Bylaw.
- #.2 Any person in or in the immediate vicinity of a Park who is exercising care, control or supervision of a child or children under twelve (12) years of age who is/are engaged in swimming, wading or any other Water Activity contrary to Section #.1, is guilty of an offence and subject to a fine as set out at Schedule B of the Bylaw.



#.3 A sign referred to in s. #.1 shall have the following characteristics:

[the Municipal District should provide detailed description, the size, material, lettering and other markings which will constitute the "No Swimming" sign].

It will also be beneficial to insert a definition for "Water Activity". We propose the following:

"Water Activity" includes swimming, wading, or any other activity resulting in full or partial immersion of a person's body into water.

We trust the foregoing is satisfactory. It is my understanding that the MD council is meeting on the 21st of August. I would appreciate if you would forward this letter for that meeting.

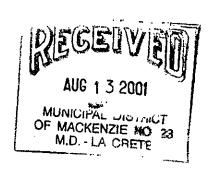

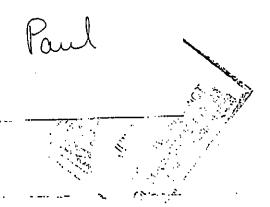

BACKGROUND / PROPOSAL:

The AGRATorchinsky report on the River Road Washout repairs estimated the cost at \$130,000. Based on this amount, Alberta Environment entered an agreement (April 01, 2000 to March 31, 2003) with AE contributing \$84,500 (65%) and the M.D. \$45,500.

The project was tendered, and on August 09, 2001, bids were opened. The attached correspondence from EXH Engineering Services Ltd. summarizes the bids. EXH now anticipates the cost of the project at \$177,384.25 (\$182,705.78 including the 3% gst).

DISCUSSION / OPTIONS / BENEFITS / DISADVANTAGES:

If AE still contributes the agreement's maximum of \$84,500, the M.D. contribution would be \$98,206 (\$182,706 less \$84,500).

On project completion, the M.D. can make application to AE for a supplementary grant to share the increased cost of \$52,706 (\$182,706-\$130,000).

The River Road Culvert Washout project will be funded:

\$84,500 from Alberta Environment's grant,

BY-LAWS OF THE MUNICIPAL DISTRICT OF MACKENZIE #23 REGIONAL LIBRARY BOARD

The M.D. of MacKenzie #23 Regional Library Board enacts the following by-laws pursuant to **The Libraries Act**, R.S.A. Chapter L-12.1, 1983 Section 40

INTERPRETATION

- 1. (1) For the purposes of this by-law the expression:
 - a) "Act"refers to **The Libraries Act**, R.S.A., Chapter L-12.1, 1983 and amendments thereto.
 - b) "Board" means the M.D. of MacKenzie #23 Regional Library Board.
 - c) "Borrower" means the person to whom a library borrowers card has been issued.
 - d) "Library Committee" refers to elected individuals representing each Library who report to and make recommendations to the Board.
 - e) "Librarian" means the person selected by each library committee for the operation of their Library.
 - f) "Library Resources" means any material, regardless of format, that is held in a library's collection and includes books, periodicals, audio recordings, video recordings, projected media, paintings, drawings, photographs, micromaterials, toys and games, kits, CD-ROMS and electronic databases in the collection of any Municipal Library operating under the Board or borrowed by same.
 - g) "Council" refers to elected members of the M.D. of MacKenzie #23 Council.
- 1. (2) In these by-laws, unless the contrary intention appears in the context
 - a) Words imparting male persons include female persons.
 - b) Words in the singular include the plural and words in the plural include the singular.
 - c) Where a word is defined, other parts of speech and tenses of that word have corresponding meanings.
 - d) Where a period of time dating from a given day, act or event is prescribed or allowed for any purposes, the time shall be reckoned exclusively of such day or of the day of such act or event.
- 1. (3) Where the time limit for doing anything falls on a day when the library is closed to the public the time shall be deemed to be extended to the first day thereafter on which the library is opened to the public.

LIBRARY FACILITY

- 2. (1) The portion of any building used for public library purposes is open to any member of the public FREE OF CHARGE during the hours of opening as are set out by the Board from time to time.
- 2. (2) Any person using the library building shall conduct himself so as to not disturb other library users.

PROCEDURE FOR ACQUIRING A BORROWERS CARD

- 3. (1) Any person resident in the M.D. of MacKenzie #23 is eligible to apply for a borrowers card.
- 3. (2) An application pursuant to 3(1) shall be
 - a) In writing in form prescribed by the librarian.
 - b) Dated and signed by the applicant.
 - c) Dated and signed by the parent or guardian of an applicant as set forth by the Board.
- 3. (3) The librarian may issue a borrower's card to a person who has made proper application to 3(1) and 3(2)

RESPONSIBILITIES OF A BORROWER

- 4. (1) A borrowers card may only be used by the person to whom it is issued except:
 - a) in accordance to Librarian's discretion.
- 4. (2) A borrower shall notify the librarian of any change of address and/or telephone number.
- 4. (3) A borrower should take proper care of any library item entrusted to his care.
- 4. (4) A borrower should return any library item to the library on or before the due date.

LOAN OF LIBRARY RESOURCES

- 5. (1) In accordance with **The Libraries Act** Section 40 (3) there shall be NO CHARGE for the use of library resources. This includes resources used on the premises, resources loaned or resources used or resources acquired from other sources at the discretion of the Board.
- 5. (2) The loan periods for various library resources are set out in accordance to Schedule A.

- 5. (3) Library resources may be reserved in accordance with policy established by the Board.
- 5. (4) Library resources may be renewed in accordance with Schedule A.

PENALTY PROVISIONS

- 6. (1) The fines for late return of library resources are as set out in accordance to Schedule B.
- 6. (2) The fines for damaged or lost resources are set out in accordance to Schedule B.
- 6. (3) The Procedure for demanding the return of overdue resources are set out in Schedule B.
- 6. (4) A borrower card may be revoked by the Librarian for the reasons set out in Schedule B.
- 6. (5) A person who has had his borrowers card revoked pursuant to 6(4) may within 30 DAYS of such revocation make an appeal to the Board in writing setting out the grounds of the appeal.
- 6. (6) The decision of the Board in an appeal pursuant to 6(5) is final and not subject to further appeal.
- 6. (7) In cases of serious dereliction the Board may prosecute an offence under **The Libraries Act**, Section 45. Such an offence is punishable under the Libraries Act, Section 45.
- 6. (8) Any fine or penalty imposed pursuant to an offence under 6(7) inures to the benefit of the Board in accordance with The Libraries Act, Section 46.

SCHEDULE A

LOAN PERIODS FOR LIBRARY RESOURCES

1. Loan Periods

A. Three-Week Loan Books, past-issues of periodicals, audio recordings,

toys and games and kits may be loaned up to a three-week period unless special arrangements with

the librarian are made.

B. One-Week Loan CD-ROMS, Video recordings will be loaned for a

one-week period unless special arrangements with

Librarian are made.

C. In Library Use Only Current periodicals, reference materials and any

other materials as chosen by Librarian for

reasonable cause must remain on library premises.

2. Renewals

- a. Books may be renewed by telephone, in writing or in person twice after the initial due date.
- b. Borrowers requiring materials beyond the two renewal periods must bring item to the library for any additional loan periods.
- c. Librarian may refuse to renew item if book is especially popular or needed by another borrower or the library.

SCHEDULE B

PENALTY PROVISIONS

- Procedure for Notice of Overdue Library Resources and Demand for Return of Library Resources
 - a. Any items not returned by the due date are considered overdue.
 - b. Patrons shall be notified by telephone or by mail three times before memberships are revoked.
 - c. Two months after the items are due, they shall be considered lost and a letter shall be sent informing patron of replacement costs and penalties. If there is no response, the matter may be forwarded to a collection agency.
 - d. Fines shall be assessed according to the fine schedule as determined by the Board.
 - e. If all attempts to regain overdue items should fail, the library reserves the right to charge the patron under Section 45 of the Alberta Libraries Act.
 - f. The Board will decide if charges will be brought against the patron.
- 2. Revocation of Memberships.
 - a. The Librarian is empowered by the Board to revoke the borrowing privileges of any patron when the borrowing privileges are abused.
 - b. Once a membership is revoked, all borrowing privileges are cancelled until such time as all overdue fines are paid, damaged or lost items are paid, or library items previously withheld are returned.
- 3. Overdue Fines
 - a. Patrons may be levied a daily fine per item per operating day, not to a maximum amount per item, except in the case of lost items.
 - b. Fines may be periodically reviewed and set by the Board and shall not exceed the following:

i. Adult Books \$0.25/item/operating day ii. Children's Books \$0.15/item/operating day iii. Audio Recordings \$0.25/item/operating day \$1.00/item/operating day iv. Video Recordings

v. Magazines, etc. \$0.25/item/operating day

- c. Overdue interlibrary loans shall be subject to overdue fines as set by the Board.
- 4. Lost and Damaged Items
 - a. An item that is two months overdue is considered lost.

- b. A letter shall be mailed informing patron that the Library considers the book lost and that the library's lost item policy is as follows:
 - i. Patron shall be charged the replacement cost of the book unless other arrangements are made at the Librarian's discretion.
 - ii. When an item is out of print or cannot be replaced, the Library reserves the right to choose a book of similar value to replace it and the patron shall be charged the full replacement cost.
 - iii. If a lost item is returned within two months and before a replacement copy has been purchased, the item shall be accepted and fines will be charged instead.
 - iv. If a lost item is replaced after a replacement has already been purchased or after two months, the patron is not eligible for a refund. The patron may keep the found item if they wish. The only exception to this would be in the case of a rare and/or valuable item or an item that is difficult to replace. The decision would be the Librarian's.
- c. Books that are unreasonably soiled or damaged beyond repair will be treated the same as lost items.
- d. The patron shall be informed in writing that the Library considers the item to be damaged beyond repair and the Library considers such item as if lost.

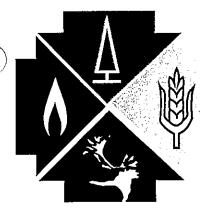

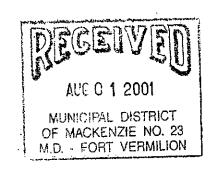

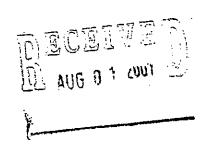

A Northern Highways Strategy ... Advancing The Alberta Advantage

Northern Alberta will continue to make a significant contribution to *The Alberta Advantage* as the Province of Alberta moves into the future. The building of northern highways will be a key factor in realizing the many northern economic development opportunities and the provincial benefits associated with them.

The proposed northern highways included in this proposed "Northern Highways Strategy" are all priorities. They will provide enhanced access to resources, tourism routes for the Province's growing tourism industry and connections to communities. These highways will also play a critical role in the integration of the Province of Alberta's highway system with neighbouring provincial and territorial jurisdictions.

When looking to the future of the Province of Alberta, the north will be an important cornerstone to the advancement of *The Alberta Advantage*. In order to advance, northern highways must be developed as a priority program for the Provincial Government.

The Northern Alberta Development Council recommends: The Provincial Government to consider the provision of special, one-time funding for the complete implementation of the Northwestern Canadian Integrated Road Network Plan over a five-year period.

The Alberta Advantage - A Northern Perspective

Introduction

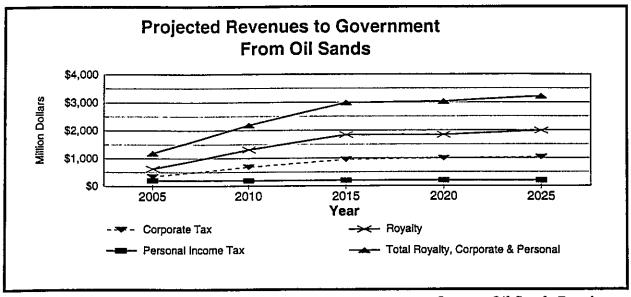
The Northern Alberta Development Council understands the importance of a highway transportation network, as it is vital to develop the social and economic fabric of northern Alberta. Communities and businesses require a road network that links the regions of northern Alberta with each other and with Western Canada.

Overview of Economic Activity

The Province of Alberta receives a significant amount of its royalty revenues from northern Alberta. Northern Alberta (defined as the area covered by the Northern Alberta Development Council) is a significant contributor to the economy of Alberta. The north is rich in a variety of resources. Northern Alberta is a major producer of agriculture, forestry and energy products. Northern highway projects are an investment in Alberta's future. Highway infrastructure projects help communities and industry to grow and prosper and in turn this allows the Province to collect more revenues through royalties, timber fees, and corporate and personal taxes. Resource developments in northern Alberta are closely tied to government's ability to fund other priorities such as health and education.

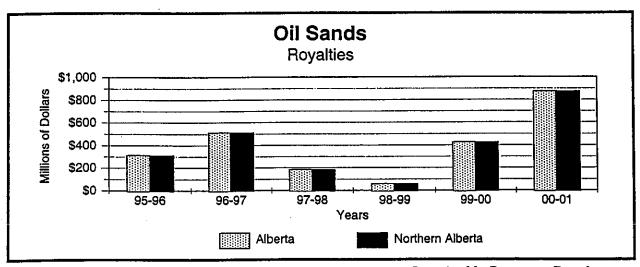
Oil sands developments are just one example of the significant contribution the overall northern energy sector makes to the provincial economy. All of Alberta's oil sands deposits are located in northern Alberta. In 1999, oil sands production amounted to 585 thousand barrels per day. By the year 2010, daily production is forecast to be 1.7 million barrels per day. This will result in more than 1.0 billion dollars of royalty. With more than 40 billion dollars of oil sands investment since 1996, 50,000 new jobs have created across Canada in addition to the 33, 000 people already employed in the sector.

Northern Oil Sands developments will contribute immensely to Government revenues over the upcoming 25 years. Total corporate tax, personal income tax and royalties for this period is forecast to be more than \$70 billion.



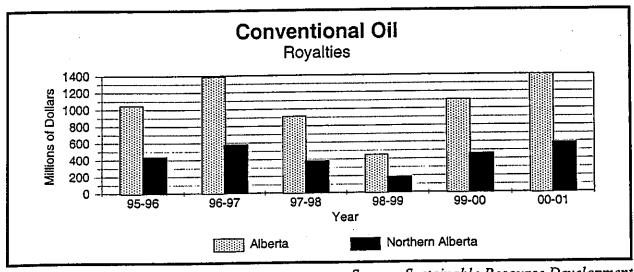

The following chart shows Alberta oil sands. In the period 1995 - 2001 Alberta royalties amounted to \$2.367 billion.



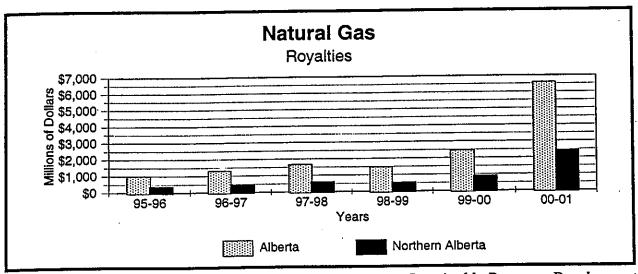

Northern Alberta accounts for 42 % of Alberta's conventional oil production. It is estimated that Northern Alberta contributed \$2.65 billion to the Provincial Treasury in this period



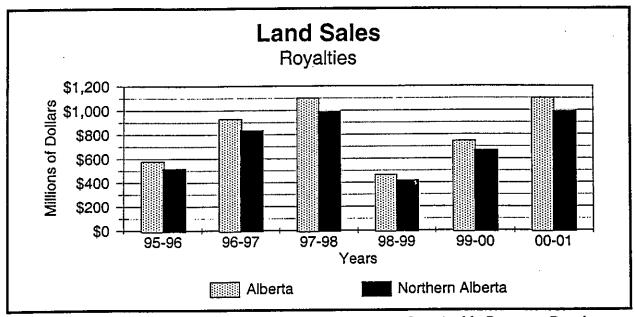

The following chart shows Alberta natural gas royalties. In the period 1995 - 2001 Alberta royalties amounted to \$14.461 billion. Northern Alberta accounts for 37 % of Alberta's natural gas production. It is estimated that Northern Alberta contributed \$5.351 billion to the Provincial Treasury in this period



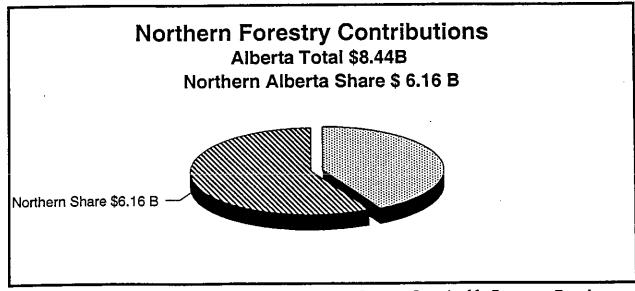

In the period 1995 - 2001 Alberta royalties amounted to \$4.910 billion. Northern Alberta accounts for 90 % of Alberta's crown land base. It is estimated that Northern Alberta contributed \$4.419 billion to the Provincial Treasury

This chart shows the overall forestry sector contribution to Alberta for the 1997-98 timber year. The total revenues of all product sales including direct and indirect benefits, corporate and personal income tax, property tax and stumpage and protection charges amount to \$8.44 billion. Of this amount, \$6.16 billion can be attributed to Northern Alberta.

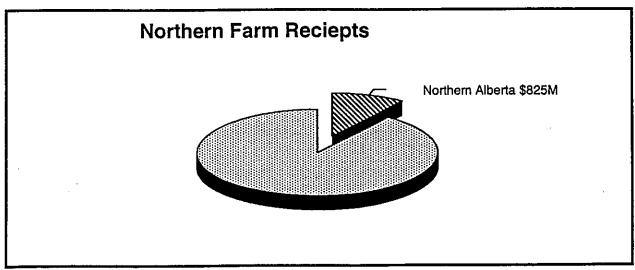

Future Northern Prospects

Northern Alberta has immense resource exploration and development potential such as mining, tourism, new commercial ventures and value added activities. Mining includes exploration, development and commercialization stages and each stage provides many spin-off benefits. Although no commercial mine (non energy type mine) operate in northern Alberta, in 1999 more than \$70 million was spent on gold, diamond, precious gem and base metal exploration. There have been some encouraging discoveries throughout northern Alberta.

Tourism

Highway infrastructure is necessary to support the development of a strong and vibrant tourism industry. Improvements in transportation will increase the region's ability to participate in expanding tourism markets. The abundance of lakes, forests and wildlife provide excellent resources for this industry. Each year, more visitors are attracted to the northern experience which include outdoor recreation, historic, cultural and urban attractions. Recently, Travel Alberta reported a 26% increase in northern tourism revenues.

Value -Added Industries

Northern Alberta is reliant on primary resource activities. As demand and markets change there is huge potential for northern Alberta to add value to products in the oil/gas, agriculture and forestry sectors. Secondary processing can be further advanced in northern Alberta if transportation challenges are addressed.

New Commercial Ventures

Road infrastructure projects strengthen businesses and industries that are already part of the region. Road development helps to diversify existing industries and spur new ventures that bring new employment and income to the region and Alberta.

One Priority - The Role of Northern Highways

Highways play an important role in the economic growth and development of northern Alberta. Due to the potential for economic activity in northern Alberta, today and into the future, there is a need to make the highways identified in the <u>Northwestern Canada Integrated Road Network Plan</u> the priority for highway development. All of the identified highways provide vital connections to resources, communities and neighbouring jurisdictions. The integration of the system will result in opportunities to further advance *The Alberta Advantage*.

Much of northern Alberta's economy is tied to the: development of natural resources; movement of commodities; and the inter-relationship between regions. Based on these considerations, the Province of Alberta must strive to build and maintain an effective highway system in northern Alberta. Highways are also vital in reducing the isolation of northern communities.

The rationale for this "one priority approach" is based on the significant need for northern highways and the significant revenues generated as a result of resource development in northern Alberta. It makes economic sense to undertake these projects now as a way to capture the future potential of the north while provincial revenues are available.

Northwestern Canadian Integrated Road Network Plan

In June 1998, the Western Premiers adopted a concept plan for the future development of highways in northwestern Canada. The Northwestern Canadian Integrated Road Network Plan provides a vision for the integration of road development in northwestern Canada, while recognizing the importance of highways to the advancement of northern development.

Many northern highways have been extensively studied and discussed amongst community, industry and provincial officials. Based on these consultations, key northern Alberta highway development projects were identified in the Network Plan. These highways support the current northern road network, while providing new regional and inter-provincial linkages.

Purpose

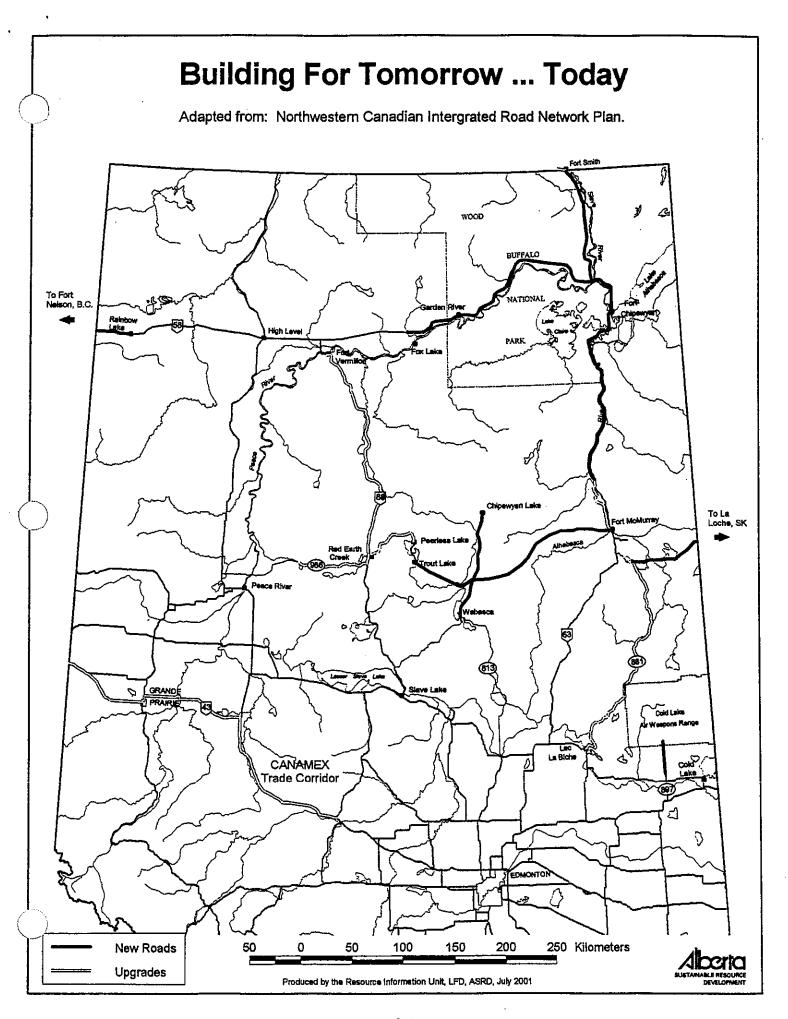
The overall goal of the Network Plan is to provide a framework for the future development of a road network in northwestern Canada, including northern Alberta, that is integrated.

Northern Alberta Road Projects

Northern regions have enormous development potential and will provide increased levels of wealth of all levels of government. Northern-based jurisdictions, including the Province of Alberta, share common opportunities and challenges in relation to future highway transportation needs.

The Northwestern Canadian Integrated Road Network Plan identified the following highway projects:

- Northern Alberta East-West Highway Corridor
- Highway #58
- Highway #88
- Secondary Highway # 881
- Secondary Highway #897
- Highway #63
- Secondary Highway #813
- CANAMEX Trade Corridor Highway # 43



Northern Alberta Highways Strategy

A Priority For Alberta

The overall implementation of the Northwestern Canadian Integrated Road Network Plan should be a major priority for the Province of Alberta. This position is based on the following:

- significant contribution to The Alberta Advantage made by the northern economy;
- provincial revenue generation resulting from resource development in northern Alberta;
- advancing new opportunities in agriculture, tourism, non-energy mineral, forestry and resource development;
- enhancing connections to northern, remote communities; and
- greater highway integration across northwestern Canada.

While the development of northern Alberta's highway system is a priority for northerners, the realization of the above-noted benefits should make this initiative a priority for all Albertans.

Strategic Directions

Highway infrastructure proposed for northern Alberta supports a western Canada integrated road network system. Road supports economic development by providing access to resources and the transportation of commodities, products and services. Roads facilitate industry expansion plans which in turn generates provincial resource revenues. The economic and social well being in northern communities is tied closely to efforts to strengthen the northern economy. Some communities experience unemployment rates above the provincial averages. More northern roads will promote economic activity and improve labour participation rates, especially for young Aboriginal people living in this region.

Implementation Strategies

Alberta Transportation Business Plan

Alberta Transportation incorporates all road transportation projects in its three year business plan. The department's planning horizon should not be limited to this time frame. Road projects are dependant upon availability of funds and overall priority importance to Alberta. Construction projects are often phased over several construction seasons. Where possible, the department is encouraged to adopt a "start to finish" strategy. In some instances it would be more practical to apply sufficient resources to a single project and complete it sooner. This would reduce the costs of moving construction equipment and personnel and allow roads to be commissioned sooner.

Special Funding Program

Based on its consultation with northerners, the Northern Alberta Development Council believes that access to resources, services to industry/people and community de-isolation are key drivers for northern development. The implementation of the Northwestern Canadian Integrated Road Network Plan will help leverage many benefits related to the economy such as increased mobility of local residents, better labour supply, new employment opportunities, small business growth, revenues for all levels government. Roads are important to the industry because they reduce resource extraction and transportation costs, and provide an incentive to increase exploration activities which brings new projects to fruition more quickly.

The Northern Alberta Development Council recommends: The Provincial Government to consider the provision of special, one-time funding for the complete implementation of the Northwestern Canadian Integrated Road Network Plan over a five-year period.

Rationale

The rationale for this special funding request is based on the significant royalty revenues which accrue as a result of energy projects in northern Alberta. There is also a need to integrate growth across Alberta's northern regions including British Columbia and Saskatchewan. It makes economic sense to invest in these projects now, to compliment resource development activities and the accrual of royalties.

Existing Road Commitments and Maintenance

This request for special project funding will be separate from existing commitments except where the existing commitment is connected to the implementation of the <u>Northwestern Canadian Integrated Road Network Plan</u>.

This initiative would also be separate from the regular operation, upgrading and maintenance of highways in northern Alberta.

Northern Highways Projects

The Northern Alberta Development Council knows there will continue to be significant growth in northern Alberta in the years ahead. Road infrastructure will be a catalyst for northern Alberta economic development. Therefore the implementation of this northern highways strategy must be an essential part of the Province of Alberta's economic strategy.

New Road Developments

NORTHERN ALBERTA EAST-WEST HIGHWAY CORRIDOR Fort McMurray - Peace River

Description:

This project would include the paving of Highway 986 between Peace River and Red Earth. The highway connection between Red Earth and Fort McMurray would be improved via Peerless Lake. This northern connection would: provide greater access to natural resources; tourism development opportunities; increasing labour supply for high growth areas; mobility related to employment.

Current Status:

There is a high degree of industry and community support for this project due to the following: lever many economic development and tourism opportunities; provide access to existing and undeveloped resources; including mineral exploration; de-isolation of northern communities (Chipewyan Lake); access to services and employment opportunities and greater connections to markets/ocean ports. There is a significant road network already in place, and further development by industry is on-going. This project will provide a coordinated approach to resource access development and provide a new much needed northern east-west public travel route.

Highway 58

Description

This project includes four components: 1) the extension of Highway 58 west to the British Columbia border; 2) upgrades to the existing highway between High Level and Rainbow Lake; 3) the extension of highway 58 to east Wood Buffalo National Park, and 4) the upgrade of an existing road within Wood Buffalo Park. Component one is new road construction: component two is widening of primary highway: component three is new road construction to Garden River: and component four is an upgrade. This project would provide access to resources, improve public safety and de-isolate two aboriginal communities, (Fox Lake and Garden River) and provide another connection to Fort Smith NWT.

Current Status

Industry has expressed its strong support for the widening of Highway 58 between High Level and Rainbow Lake. The Province of British Columbia has not yet made any commitments regarding the construction of its portion of the Fort Nelson - Rainbow Lake connector. The Federal Government has yet to decide about road access through the Wood Buffalo National Park. Alberta has plans to construct a new road to Fox Lake and Garden River.

Highway 88

Description

This project includes the upgrading and paving of Highway 88, north of Red Earth to Highway 58. This project facilitates public travel and resource extraction activities across a vast region. This route is an integral part of the northern road system which will connect eastwest regions of northern Alberta. The project is expected to enhance economic development, reduce safety concerns and improves access to services.

Current Status

Last Fall, a regional business/community group made a presentation to the Minister regarding this project. The presentation emphasized the importance of the project and its relationship to the Northwestern Canadian Integrated Road Network Plan.

Highway 881

Description

This project involves two components; 1) the completion of upgrades planned for Highway 881 between Lac La Biche and Fort McMurray and 2) connector road to La Loche Saskatchewan. Highway 881 serves as an emergency route, as experienced during 1998 fire season when Highway 63 was closed for some time. The project provide an alternate route to oil sands development, enhances economic development and jurisdictional trade and improves community access (Janvier and Conklin).

Current Status

There have been several major industrial projects developed in this area and this route is needed to sustain current and future industry and community expansion plans. There is considerable interest from residents of north west Saskatchewan to access facilities and services in Fort McMurray as well.

Highway 63

Description

This project is the extension of Highway 63, north of Fort McMurray to Fort Chipewyan. This project will provide an all weather road to residents of Fort Chipewyan. It will reduce costs to service the region, create new economic opportunities and compliment the Northwestern Integrated Road Network plan

Current Status

It should be noted that with the oil sands expansion the route north of Fort McMurray has been extended some distance. As industry moves further north, public costs to build this road will decrease. Fort Chipewyan residents continue to discuss the need and most suitable route to their community.

Highway 813

Description

This project is the extension of Highway 813 from Wabasca north to Chipewyan Lake. This road will increase access to a large geographic area rich in resources. This road will also deisolate the community of Chipewyan Lake. This project ties in to the proposed extension of Highway 686 connecting Peerless Lake to Fort McMurray.

Current Status

The Northern Alberta Development Council understands that Alberta Pacific Forest Products has plans to complete this route to all weather road standard by 2004.

Highway 897

Description

This project is the extension of Highway 897 into the Department of National Defence Air Weapons Range near Cold Lake. The air weapons range is of significant importance to Canada, especially our commitment to meet North Atlantic Treaty Organization (NATO) air training exercises. 4 Wing Cold Lake conducts annual international training operations in this area; a better road access would be beneficial. The energy sector is optimistic about the area's development potential.

Current Status

There are two major energy projects in this area and this route is needed to sustain current and future industry expansion plans.

CANAMEX Trade Corridor - Highway 43

Description

Alberta is part of the CANAMEX Trade Corridor system. This corridor consists of the American States of Arizona, Nevada, Utah, Idaho and Montana and several Mexican states. The key purpose of this international initiative is to facilitate transportation distribution, commerce and tourism between three countries.

The twinning of highway 43 between from Edmonton northwest to Grande Prairie and then to the British Columbia border is part of Alberta's contribution to the CANAMEX project.

Current Status

This project is underway and will remain a high priority under the Northern Highways Strategy.

BACKGROUND / PROPOSAL:

The Alberta Transportation Resource Road/New Industry Program (RR/NI) is continuing for an additional year and they are accepting new applications until November 30, 2001for their 2002/2003 fiscal year.

For a project to be eligible for this program, it must enhance the transportation of goods and people related to value added processing, intensified farming operations, resource-based industrial developments, or high throughput elevators. Local road projects (residential, recreational and farm) are not eligible.

The RR/NI program will provide 75% funding on approved projects up to a maximum of \$2,250,000 per project. The M.D. is responsible for the remaining 25%, as well as G.S.T.

An application was submitted last year for 2 projects along the Highway 88 Connector; Project No. 1 (11 km of construction from Jct. Highway 88 West) and for Project No. 2 (11 km of construction from Jct. of SH 697). Alberta Transportation approved Project No. 2 but not Project No. 1.

Construction should begin on Project No. 2 later this summer.

DISCUSSION / OPTIONS / BENEFITS / DISADVANTAGES:

In order to have the same standard of road along Highway 88 Connector, the east end needs to be reconstructed. This would give the entire road an eleven (11) meter top. There are also steep sideslopes that need to be rectified. Reconstructing the east end would also repair the sections of road located in wet, muskeg terrain.

1.0 INTRODUCTION

The following report has been prepared to provide the Municipal District of Mackenzie #23 with the required information to evaluate the existing storm drainage system and proposed improvements.

A proposal to undertake the Storm Drainage Study was submitted to the Municipal District of Mackenzie on May 9, 2001. The Municipal District of Mackenzie awarded the contract for this study on May 10, 2001 to G.P.E.C. Consulting Ltd.

2.0 EXISTING STORM DRAINAGE SYSTEM

2.1 General Review and Inspections

During the months of May and July, 200 inspections and field surveys were carried out on the existing storm drainage system. This included a review of existing drainage patterns, open ditches, piped systems and storm sewer structures. A review of the existing drainage data and inspection of problem areas was completed at this time.

2.2 Existing Drainage Basin

The overall drainage basin area for Fort Vermilion was determined from topographical maps, aerial photographs, and from field observations as shown on Figure 1. This drainage area encompasses approximately 3.5 square Kilometres. The overall drainage is from the south west to the north east into the Peace River.

2/3 Peace River

The Peace River is the primary drainage course and discharge point for the storm drainage systems. All storm water within the Hamlet of Ft Vermillion as well as areas outside the Hamlet as noted on Figure 1, ultimately discharge into the Peace River.

The fourteen outlets located within the Hamlet boundaries appear to be performing without obvious major problems. Some of the CSP culvert ends are damaged.

2.4 Drainage Ditches

A number of grassed drainage ditches/swales are used to convey storm water to the Piped Storm System which discharges to the Peace River.

2.5 Storm Sewer System

The existing storm sewer structures and piped system culverts and drainage ditches are identified on Figure 1 entitled Existing Storm Drainage System". The storm sewer system was divided into a number of catchment are as each having a separate outlet. The condition and other pertinent information are summarized in Table 1. The capacity of the culverts at the various crossings were determined from nomographs from the "Handbook of Steel Drainage & Highway Construction Products, 1984" for inlet control. The capacity of the grossings from west to east along the Peace River are summarized below.

2.6 Problem Areas

49th Avenue / 51st Street

This area is identified as having existing ponding and flooding problems. A proposed storm sewer along 52nd Street / 53rd Street as shown on Figure 2 will collect runoff south of 48th Avenue and the ponding water along 49th Avenue and provide improved drainage in the area. The proposed storm sewer system will provide relief for the existing storm sewer located on 50th Street.

49th Avenue / 47th Street

A proposed storm sewer system along 47 street would provide improved drainage in this catchment area and eliminate deep ditches parallelling the road. The majority of the drainage flows in an open ditch through the golf-course. The existing 800mm diameter CSP culvert across River Road should be replaced with a larger diameter pipe to provide capacity should the areas to the south develop in the future.

3.0 STORM SEWER EVALUATION

3.1 Piped Storm Sewer System

Peak Flow Analysis

The proposed storm sewer systems have been analysed on an individual basis. The rational method is the most widely used method for the analysis of all proposed from small catchment areas. As each area in question consists of areas less than 65 Ha., the rational method was used to determine peak flows.

The rational method is based on the following assumptions:

The peak runoff rate is a direct function of the average rainfall intensity during the time of concentration

The peak discharge frequency is equivalent to the frequency of the average rainfall intensity.

 $Q_p = 2.78 \text{ CIA}$ $Q_p = \text{Peak discharge rate (L/s)}$

C = Runoff coefficient

I = Rainfall intensity (mm/hr)

A = Area of catchment (hectares)

Alberta Environment recommends that a 1:5 year storm be used in the evaluation of the piped storm sewer system or 1/2 year storm may be used in smaller communities. Values for the coefficient for residential areas range from 3.0 - 6.0, dependent on the flood frequency and characteristics of the catchment area. As the areas in question contain relatively large lot areas (more pervious soil conditions), a value of 0.35 was used for the residential areas. Where no development has occurred (ie park areas), a value of 0.2 was used for the coefficient.

The rainfall intensity relationship for Grande Prairie Airport was used in this analysis. It is dependent on the Time of Concentration (T_c). For the purpose of this evaluation, a value of 15 minutes plus travel time along storm pipe was assumed for the time of concentration. Some large catchment areas were adjusted to a higher initial T_c as the time for the water to travel is increased.

Storm Sewer Capacity

The capacity of the existing storm sewer was evaluated using the Manning Equation. The relationship of the cross sectional area, slope and roughness of the pipe is used to determine the capacity as follows.

A roughness coefficient (n) of 0.021 for Corrugated Steel Pipe(CSP)

A roughness coefficient (n) of 0.010 for PVC Ultrarib pipe was used.

4.0 RECOMMENDATIONS

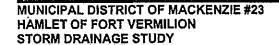
A piped storm sewer system along 52nd Street discharging into the Peace River at 53rd Street and 50th Avenue (River Road) will reduce the occurrence of flooding north of 48th Avenue and reduce ditch erosion along 52nd Street. A portion of storm runoff water will be diverted from the current surcharged piped storm sewer system on 50th Street.

A piped storm sewer system along 47th Street from the golf course south of 48th Avenue to 50th Avenue (River Road) will eliminate the deep ditches, improve safety concerning traffic and children; and provide for boulevard landscaping.

Approvals from Alberta Environment will be required prior to construction.

A regular maintenance program should be implemented to ensure the storm drainage system is operating effectively. Maintenance items such as debris/silt build-up causing plugged inlets/outlets, bent pipe ends and silt build-up in catch basins should be regularly maintained.

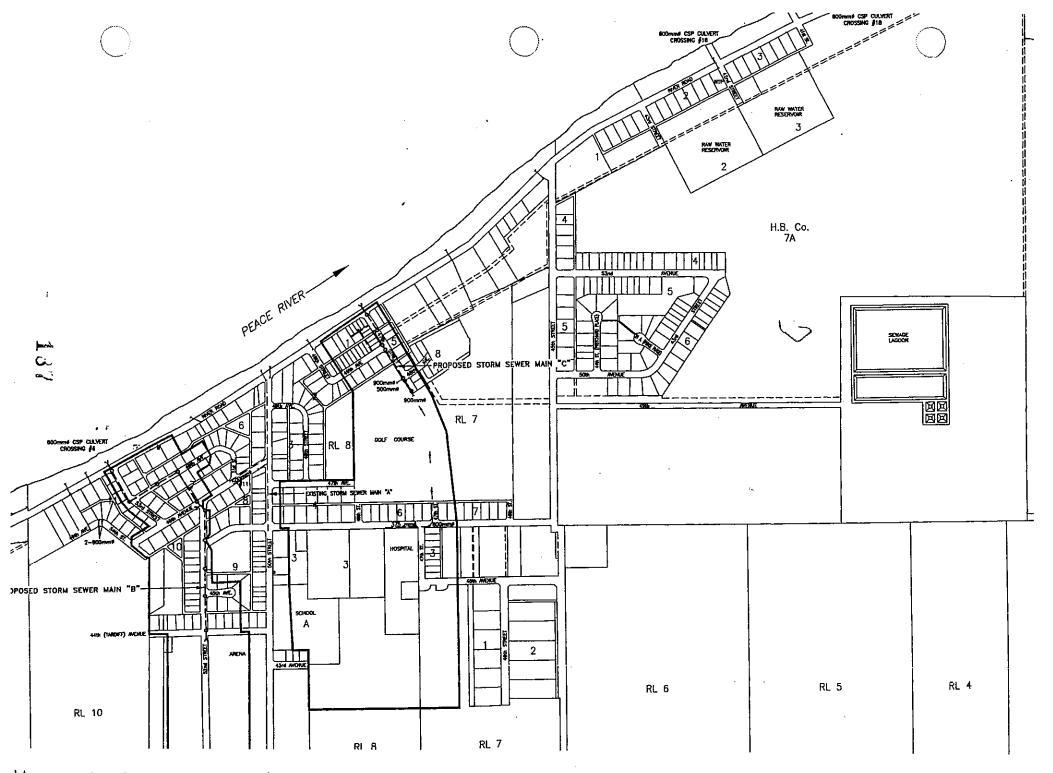
Future development areas should be designed with storm management plans to ensure the capacity of the existing system are not exceeded and that in the event of a major storm there is an adequate overland flow path to ensure there is no major property damage or loss. The current policy of Alberta Environment requests that Storm Water Management retain the natural runoff characteristics of the pre-development system or at a minimum provide an appropriate dual drainage concept plan that provides stormwater quantity and quality controls.



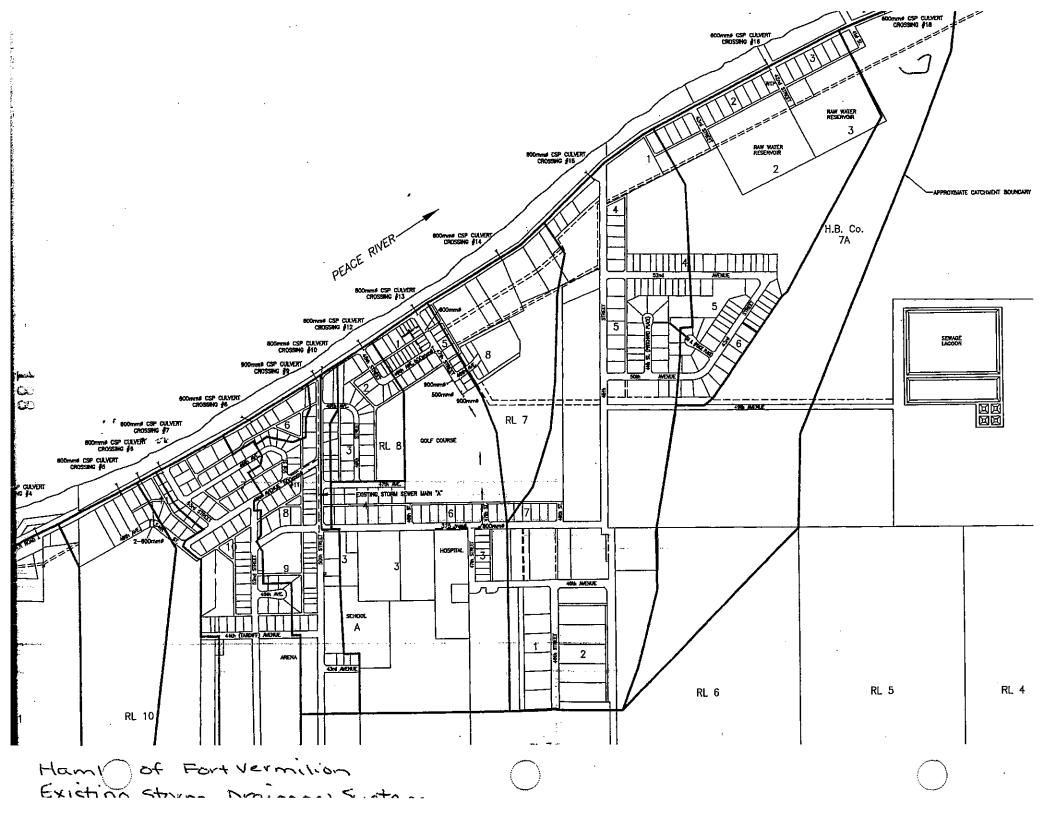

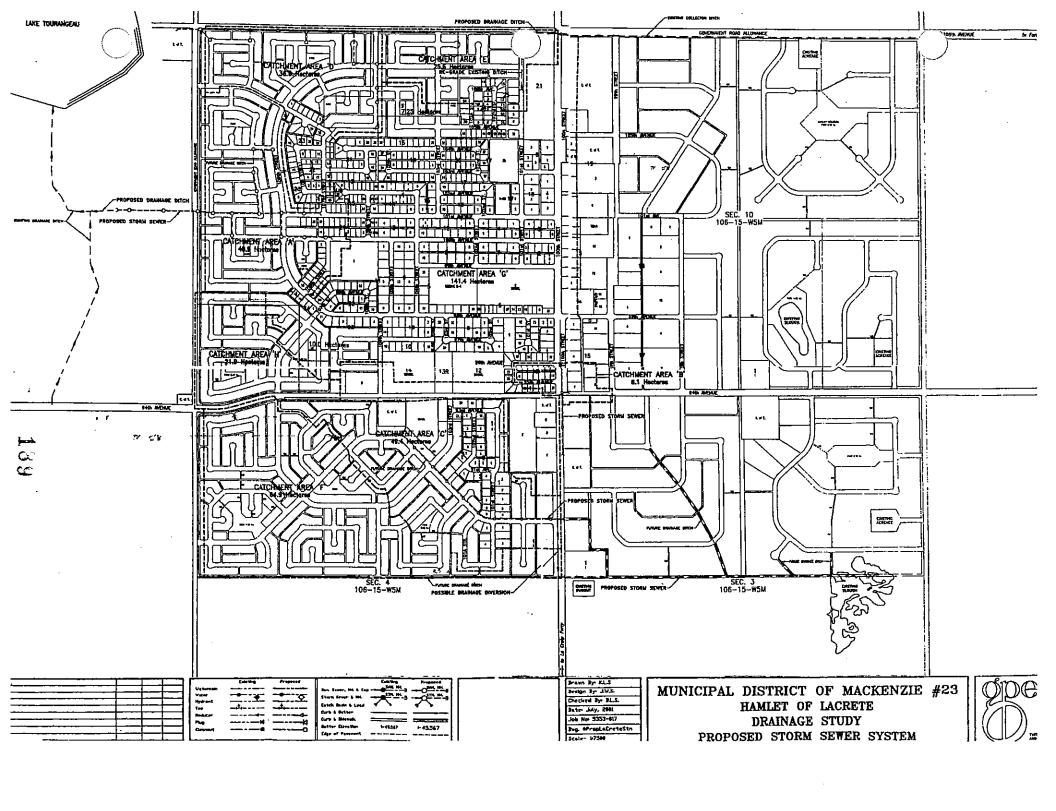

1.0 INTRODUCTION

The following report has been prepared to provide the Municipal District of Mackenzie #23 with the required information to evaluate the existing storm drainage system and proposed improvements.

A proposal to undertake the Storm Drainage Study was submitted to the Municipal District of Mackenzie on May 9, 2001. The Municipal District of Mackenzie awarded the contract for this study on May 10, 2001 to G.P.E.C. Consulting Ltd.

2.0 EXISTING STORM DRAINAGE SYSTEM.

2.1 General Review and Inspections

During the months of May and June, 2001 inspections and field surveys were carried out on the existing storm drainage system. This included a review of existing drainage patterns, open ditches and piped systems. A review of the existing drainage data and inspection of problem areas was completed at this time.

2.2 Existing Drainage Basin

The overall drainage basin area for La Crete was determined from topographical maps, aerial photographs, field surveys and field observations as shown on Figure 1. This drainage area encompasses approximately 9.3 square kilometres. The overall natural drainage is from west to east and southeast into low lying areas (i.e. swamp lands, sloughs and shallow lakes).

Contour maps show natural grades as relatively level. The survey and past experience has shown these grades to be approximately 0.3% average throughout the Hamlet.

2.3 Drainage Ditches

date the storm drainage system consists only of open drainage ditches with piped road crossings. The natural grades of the streets will not allow for surface drainage with curb and gutter unless combined with a piped storm sewer system.

Existing road ditches throughout the Hamlet were found to be at minimum grades or have been constructed without any defined grade. During rainfall occurrence the ditches hold water until the hydraulic head generated allows flow through the pipe culverts downstream.

2.4 Drainage Pattern

The existing system consists of two major drainage routes and several minor routes. The ditches parallelling 100 Street collect storm runoff water from the west and the lots adjacent on the east side.

The drainage splits north and south along 94 Avenue. The majority of the Hamlet shown as Area 1 on Figure 1 flows east to 100 Street. The centre line culvert on 100 Street at 105 Avenue directs storm water to the east ditch which flows north to 109 Avenue at the north Hamlet boundary. The south collector ditch along 109 Avenue (the north boundary of Section 10-106-15-W5M) flows east then crossing the paved road to the north ditch then east one (1) mile and north one (1) mile to the improved east/west drainage ditch on the north boundary of Section 13-105-15-W5M. Relatively high discharge rates will continue east along Highway 697.

Area 2 including a small area north of 94 Avenue flows southeast to 100 Street. Two centre line culverts direct the flow east, one immediately south of 91 Avenue and the second near the centre of Section 4-106-15-W5M. The runoff follows natural shallow drainage courses through Section 3-106-15-W5M to swamp lands and sloughs to the east.

Area 3 bordered by Area 1 on the east is defined by a ridge running north/south through the undeveloped western portion of the Hamlet. Area 3 naturally flows west to Lake Tourangeau on 94 Avenue and 109 Avenue.

The developed commercial/industrial land east of 100 Street drains east to 99 Street and north to the collector ditch along 109 Avenue. The lands east of 99 Street between 94 Avenue and 99 Avenue drain east to a low area located centrally in S.E. 1/4 Section 10-106-15-W5M via a drainage ditch along 98 Avenue. The lands north of 99 Avenue drain northeast to 109 Avenue.

The undeveloped lands east of 100 Street and south of 94 Avenue flow east and south to low areas centrally located in S.E. 1/4 Section 10-106-15-W5M and to the slough area south of the N.E. 1/4 Section 3-106-15-W5M.

2.5 Storm Water Drainage

The existing storm water drainage system consisting of culverts and road ditches are identified on Figure 1 entitled "Existing Storm Water Drainage System". The storm drainage is divided into a number of catchment areas. The condition and other pertinent information of the key drainage culverts are summarized in Table 1 and labeled on Figure 1. The capacity of the culverts at the various crossings were determined from nomographs from the "Handbook of Steel Drainage & Highway Construction Products, 1984" for inlet control. The capacity of the crossings are summarized below.

3.0 PROPOSED IMPROVEMENTS

3.1 Piped Storm Sewer System

Future residential development is proposed to utilize curb and gutter drainage rather than open ditches. Curb and gutter drainage will work only if a piped storm sewer system is constructed due to the minimal natural land grades. Some areas are not feasible for storm sewer construction and will require to be developed with an open ditch system.

The piped storm sewer system will divert drainage from its natural course and will require environmental approvals.

3.1.1 Catchment Area 'A'

The storm sewer system will collect runoff from approximately 41 hectares of residential land development. The storm sewer main will extend along 101 Avenue from 107 Street west to the existing north/south ditch which discharges into Lake Tourangeau. A branch line will be extended to 108 Street and 100 Avenue to collect runoff from the proposed road improvements on 108 Street. Future residential development west of 107 Street will require storm sewer to accommodate curb and gutter. Intern ditches can be constructed from 108 Street to the intersection of 109 Street and 101 Avenue storm manhole. The storm sewer main from 109 Street to the west will divert runoff presently flowing north and east through the Hamlet.

2 Catchment Area 'B'

A piece storm sewer is required for the proposed road improvements on 100A Street to collect runoff near 96 Avenue. The storm sewer main will extend south along 100 Street day lighting in the east ditch at approximately 92 Avenue. There is potential to collect runoff from 6.1 hectares of land when leads are extended west across 100 Street to 96 Avenue intersection and east on 94 Avenue. The storm sewer will decrease the runoff flowing north to the 100 Street drainage ditches. The storm sewer will be required for the lowering of 100 Street.

3.1.3 Catchment Area 'C'

The 2001 residential development on 101 Street north and south of 89 Avenue requires an interm drainage ditch to be constructed east to 100 Street until a piped storm system can be installed. This piped system will potentially collect 49.4 hectares of residential storm water runoff. The immediate needs are for a storm sewer main to extend from 101A Street to the east side of 100 Street. An open outfall drainage ditch is required to be constructed through the north half of Section 3-106-15-W5M to the slough area in the east half of 3-106-15-W5M. Option 2 would be to extend the storm sewer or construct an open ditch south from 89 Avenue along the west side of 100 Street to the quarter line and then cross 100 Street. Area 'F' outfall ditch requires crossing 100 Street near the quarter line at time of future development. Option 2 would reduce crossing 100 Street twice and reduce the length of outfall drainage ditch. An easement is required for ditch construction through Lot 1, Block 1, west side of 100 Street and through the north half of Section 3-106-15-W5M.

3.1.4 Catchment Area 'D'

This piped storm system will collect runoff water from approximately 33.6 hectares of land. Approximately one third of the runoff is from existing developments in northwest La Crete. All runoff flowing east in the 105 Avenue ditch will be diverted into the piped storm system reducing flows to the 100 Street open ditch system. From 105 Avenue the storm sewer main will extend north on 106 Street to 109 Avenue and then west to Lake Tourangeau.

.2 Open Ditch Storm Drainage System

3.2.1 Catchment Area 'E'

This area must be constructed with road ditches to a rural standard due to existing gradients. It is not feasible to service this area due to storm sewer depth/cover restraints. The area presently drains through private (Co-op) property (Lot 21). This runoff can be diverted north along 101 Street and

east along 109 Avenue. A centerline culvert crossing 100 Street is required to discharge into the major collector ditch flowing east.

The major culvert crossings on 100 Street and east along 109 Avenue were analysed for the 1:10 year storm frequency. The results have been summarized in Table 1 - Existing Storm Drainage Culvert Summary.

3.2.2 Catchment Area 'F'

Catchment Area 'F' discharges runoff from approximately 79.5 hectares and requires construction of an open east/west ditch system parallelling the centre of Section 4-106-15-W5M. Portions of the future residential development can be serviced by a piped storm sewer discharging at points along the open ditch.

A detailed analysis for the area was not completed. It should be noted that the southwest portion of Area 'F' is not serviceable with the present gravity sanitary sewer system.

3.2.3 Catchment Area 'G'

Catchment Area 'G' collects runoff water from approximately 141.4 hectares of land of which 17.25 hectares is undeveloped. These areas must be constructed with open ditches and will flow through the existing ditch drainage system in the Hamlet to 100 Street. The ditches along 100 Street direct the flow north to 109 Avenue and east in the major collector ditch.

3.2.4. Catchment Area 'H'

Catchment Area 'H' contains approximately 21.9 hectares of land. The storm runoff in Area 'H' will flow west along 94 Avenue and north to Lake Tourangeau.

3.2.5 Section 10-106-15-W5M

The future land use for this section of land is designated for industrial and country residential development. Due to slope less than 0.5% these areas should be developed using road ditch drainage systems. The majority of runoff would flow to the northeast corner. One or more storm retention ponds should be constructed prior to discharge into the major drainage ditch.

3.2.6 North Half of Section 3-106-15-W5M

The future land use for this area is designated as industrial and country residential development and should use a road ditch drainage system. The natural runoff is southeast to the slough area in the southeast corner. Future ditches are required to direct flows to the collector ditch flowing west to east along the south boundary.

4.0 STORM SEWER EVALUATION

4.1 Piped Storm Sewer System

4.1.1 Peak Flow Analysis

The proposed storm sewer systems have been analysed on an individual basis. The rational method is the most widely used method for the analysis of runoff response from small catchment areas. As each area in question consists of areas less than 65 Ha., the rational method was used to determine peak flows.

ţ.

The rational method is based on the following assumptions:

- The peak runoff rate is a direct function of the average rainfall intensity during the time of concentration
- The peak discharge frequency is equivalent to the frequency of the average rainfall intensity.

Q = 2.78 CA Q Peak discharge rate (L/s)

C = Runoff coefficient

I = Rainfall intensity (mm/hr)

A = Area of catchment (hectares)

Alberta Environment recommends that a 1:5 year storm be used in the evaluation of the piped storm sewer system or 1:2 year storm may be used in smaller communities. Values for the coefficient for residential areas range from 3.0 - 6.0, dependent on the flood frequency and characteristics of the catchment area. As the areas in question contain relatively large lot areas (more pervious soil conditions), a value of 0.35 was used for the residential areas. Where no development has occurred (ie. park areas), a value of 0.2 was used for the coefficient.



The rainfall intensity relationship for Grande Prairie Airport was used in this analysis. It is dependent on the Time of Concentration (T_c). For the purpose of this evaluation, a value of 15 minutes plus travel time along storm pipe was assumed for the time of concentration. Some large catchment areas were adjusted to a higher initial T_c as the time for the water to travel is increased.

4.1.2 Storm Sewer Capacity

The capacity of the existing storm sewer was evaluated using the Manning Equation. The relationship of the cross sectional area, slope and roughness of the pipe is used to determine the capacity as follows.

 $Q = 1/n \times AR^{2/3}s^{1/2}$

Q = Capacity (m³/s)

A = Cross sectional area (m_c^2)

R = Hydraulic radius (m)

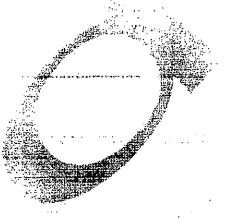
s = slope of pipe (m/m)

n = roughness coefficient

A roughness coefficient (p) of 0.021 for Corrugated Steel Pipe(CSP)

A roughness coefficient (i) of 0.010 for PVC Ultrarib pipe was used.

Open ditch capacities have also been evaluated using the same equation. A roughness coefficient (n) of 0.040 for a grassed ditch has been used.

5.0 RECOMMENDATIONS

A piped storm sewer system along 101 Avenue from 107 Street flowing west and discharging into the existing ditch to Lake Tourangeau will allow for present and future development with curb and gutters in the west area of La Crete. This storm sewer main is required to collect runoff from existing and new developments on 101 Avenue and the proposed road improvements using curb and gutter on 108 Street. The storm sewer will divert runoff from flowing east through the Hamlet's overtaxed ditch system.

A piped storm sewer system along 100 Street south of 96 Avenue discharging to the ditch near 92 Avenue will allow for curb and gutter construction on 100A Street. This storm main has potential to divert runoff from flowing north along 100 Street and will assist drainage in the reconstruction of 100 Street at a lower elevation.

The recent development along 101 Street south of 91 Avenue required curb and gutter as part of the development. To collect runoff a pipe storm sewer must be constructed from 101A Street discharging to the east of 100 Street. An open ditch must be constructed east through Section 3-106-15-W5M. Two optional routes exist along 100 Street with constraints and land acquisition. The piped storm sewer system would be extended northwest when future development occurs. The construction of the drainage ditch in Section 3-106-15-W5M, a centerline culvert at 100 Street and drainage ditch to 101 Street would provide interm drainage.

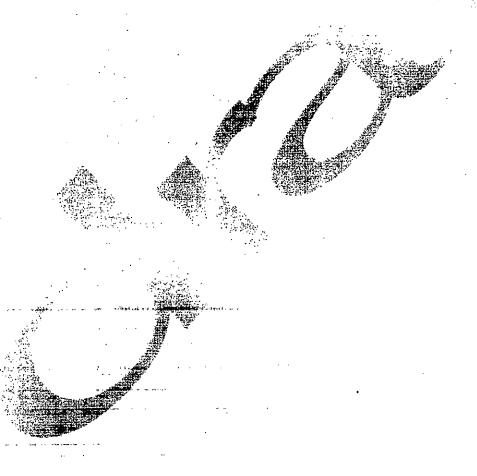
Storm water that currently flows through Block 21 east of 101 Street should be diverted to flow north to 109 Avenue and east to 100 Street. A road widening or easement is required on the north end of Block 21. A new culvert crossing 100 Street must be installed.

Alberta Environment approval is required prior to construction of these drainage improvements.

All piped storm sewer mains and drainage ditches not mentioned herein, but required for proper drainage, should be constructed as development proceeds.

Future development areas should be designed with storm management plans to ensure the capacity of the existing system are not exceeded and that in the event of a major storm there is an adequate overland flow path to ensure there is no major property damage or loss. The current policy of Alberta Environment requests that Storm Water Management retain the natural runoff characteristics of the pre-development system or at a minimum provide an appropriate dual drainage concept plan that provides stormwater quantity and quality controls.

A regular maintenance program should be implemented to ensure the storm drainage system is operating effectively. Maintenance items such as debris/silt build-up causing plugged inlets/outlets, bent pipe ends and silt build-up in catch basins should be regularly maintained.

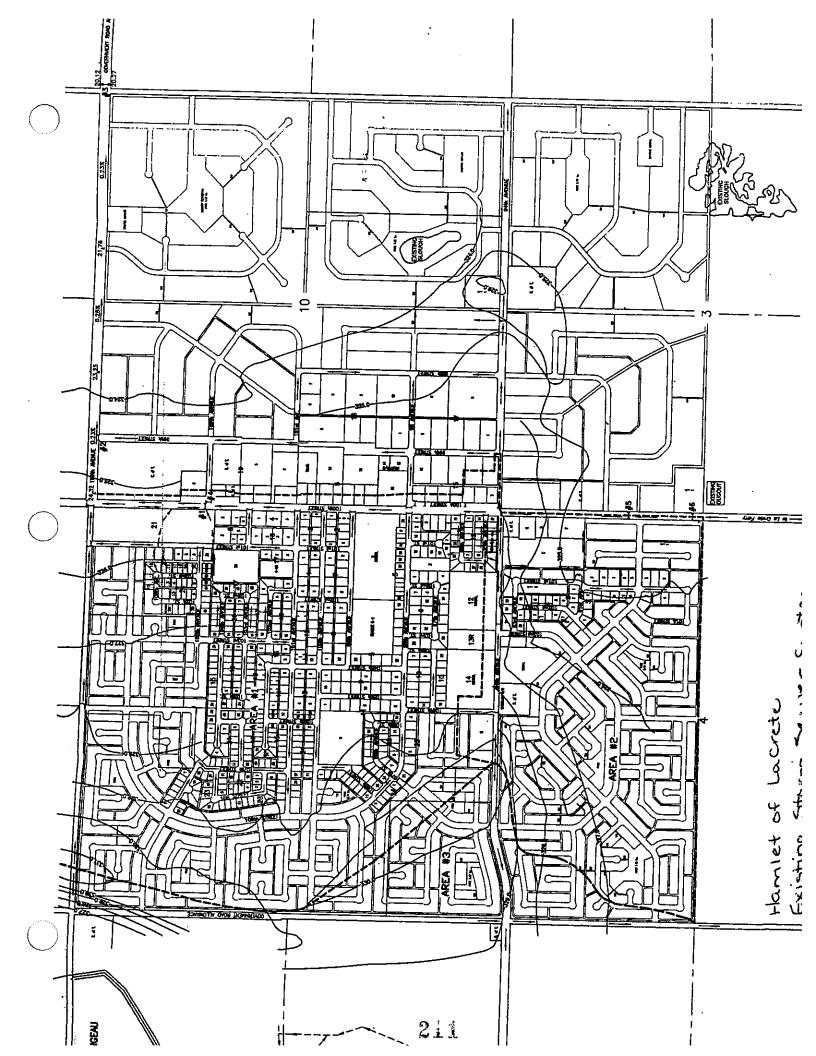

On the July 17, 2001 Regular Council Meeting, Council made a motion (01-388) that Administration spend a maximum of \$80,000 on the 94th Ave Extension road. This funding is not enough to complete the project.
