DIRECTOR'S REPORT AGRICULTURAL SERVICES

June 14, 2001

Agricultural Land Base

Worked on Tall Cree Land Settlement presentation to Council. Waiting for letter from Public Lands listing properties to be made available for public auction over next year or so. Beyond this I have nothing to report in this area.

Intensive Livestock Operations Task Force

Advertised for members at large with a deadline of June 15. Lone application has been received so far.

Terms of reference for the ILO Task Force were reviewed at the May 22 Committee of the Whole.

A public meeting on Foot and Mouth disease and the Pork Quality Assurance program was very poorly attended. Veterinarian Dr. Julia Keenliside trained Dr. Wendy Quist in inspection of Mackenzie Pork under the Quality Assurance program.

Water Management/Drainage

EXH has completed field surveys of four roadside projects and M.D. survey figures for another project have been provided to EXH. I've asked for cost estimates for design and construction for these projects.

Drainage Improvement Requests were advertised with a deadline of June 8th. Some requests have been for small, simple projects and others for larger ones. Also, we have two of our own roadside erosion concerns being worked on.

River Road Culvert Washout: EXH has completed survey and is now preparing public tender package. I've approached landowners for permission to work on their land; small changes on the right of entry to backslope form will be made and consent should be obtained shortly. Application for approval under the Water Act is still required and special measures will have to be taken during construction to prevent siltation to the fish bearing waters (Peace River).

High Level East Flood Control: This project should go back to ratepayers for reevaluation, with Environment, EXH and Council representation at a meeting.

Maintenance Agreement for Flood Control Ditches: There are repairs planned for erosion on High Level South and La Crete East. One repair (erosion) caused by late La Crete lagoon dumping has been completed.

Legislature Reference	Municipal Government Act, Section 5

Purpose

To reimburse employees for the use of their personal vehicle for municipal use.

Policy Statement and Guidelines

Based upon the completion of a Vehicle Costing Analysis, it was noted that it would benefit the municipality to allow the option of certain employees to use their personal vehicles for municipal business.

The Chief Administrative Officer shall review and authorize which employees shall use their personal vehicle for municipal use.

The Chief Administrative Officer (CAO) shall, using the previous years kilometres incurred by the employee for municipal use, determine the kilometre range for the individual employee.

The CAO shall authorize payment of fixed bi-weekly rates to be paid as per the following kilometre ranges (proposed rates exclude fuel consumption):

25,000 - 35,000	\$ 356.00
35,000 – 45,000	\$ 480.00
45,000 - 55,000	\$ 534.00

If the employee exceeds the annual pre-determined kilometre range the employee shall be reimbursed the difference to the appropriate kilometre range the employee actually used.

If the employee incurs less kilometres than the pre-determined kilometre range the employee shall be dropped to the appropriate kilometre range and the difference will be taken off the new determined kilometre range to reconcile what the employee actually should have been paid.

The employee shall provide the municipality with a BUSINESS USE insurance policy with the following minimum requirements:

- \$2,000,000 Public Liability and Disability
- use for transporting passengers (6A Endorsement)

The municipality shall ensure M.D. #23's insurance policy includes "non-owned automobile insurance" for employees using someone's personal vehicle for municipal use.

### **GUIDE TO WRITING RESOLUTIONS**

Many issues confronting local councils require action by levels of government other than the municipal level. And sometimes these issues are, or have the potential to be, common to many municipalities. Resolutions forwarded to AUMA are an effective vehicle for dealing with these types of issues.

Keep in mind that a resolution forwarded to AUMA is more than a directive to local municipal staff or a policy guideline for future council meetings. A resolution passed by local council and forwarded to AUMA is one in which you and your council are hoping ultimately to have endorsed by a majority of Alberta's municipalities.

It follows that the resolution should be as clear as possible to as many people as possible. The resolution must address a topic of concern to municipalities throughout the province.

### Construction of the Resolution

All AUMA resolutions take the form of a preamble followed by an operative clause.

The preamble is composed of a number of clauses. How many depends on the complexity of the problem with which the resolution is dealing. Generally, however, there should be no more than five clauses to the preamble.

The operative clause contains the actual call to action which the resolution is putting forward. Because it is best to have only one request per resolution, there is generally only one operative clause.

### The Preamble

The purpose of the preamble is to lead up to the operative clause. That is, the preamble familiarizes the reader with the subject under discussion and alerts the reader to the problem at hand. The reader is then prepared to consider the solution/call to action offered in the operative clause.

All preamble clauses begin with "WHEREAS" and, where appropriate, should start out by referring to the applicable legislation. Always use the proper title of the Act or number of the Bill in question. If possible, list the particular sections of the Bill or Act to which the resolution is addressed.

- 3. Made a number of trips out to the Highway 88 Connector Project to review design and right-of-way issues with EXH Engineering staff and landowners.
- 4. Field trips to review designs for local roads and the Rocky Lane River Road.
- 5. Inspect High Level South drainage project with Mrs. Margaret Peitsch, Alberta Environment and Chris Kelland.
- 6. Reviewed urban designs with Doug Schuler, GPEC Engineering Services.
- 7. Reviewed work on lift station project.
- 8. Interviewed staff to review mechanical repairs and maintenance operations in the MD.
- Met with contractors re development in La Crete (water and sewer installation west of MD office).
- 10. Attended the Public Information Meeting in Zama on June 7, 2001.
- 11. Re-negotiated the contract with Jake Banman regarding the Savage Prairie Road reconstruction. Mr. Banman will perform the work for the same price. The new design has slightly higher earth excavation quantities from the Torchinsky design. In general the new design has a standard width, and depth ditch with an 8 meter wide road top.
- 12. Attended the meeting with officials from Wood Buffalo National Park on June 16, 2001.

<u>BACKGROUND / PROPOSAL:</u> For some time discussions have occurred regarding responsibility for the extension of Highway 58 east of the Wentzel River. The MD has taken the position that this road is not a municipal responsibility. On June 7, 2001 the Honorable Ed Stelmach, Minister of Transportation wrote to Reeve Bill Neufeld. In his letter Mr. Stelmach states "It remains our position that this is indeed a loacal road under the jurisdiction of the municipality."

In an August 21, 2000 letter our legal advisors indicate that they "are of the opinion that the Municipal District has no authority over the the provisional road reservation in Question. Rather, authority for this tract of land would lie with the Department of Alberta Infrastructure."

### **DISCUSSION / OPTIONS / BENEFITS / DISADVANTAGES:**

The June 7, 2001 letter from the Minister of Transportation conveys his Department's position on the matter. The MD informed Alberta Infrastructure staff in March, 2001 "that as the road is not a Municipal District of Mackenzie No. 23 road we will not be arranging for any work on the bridges you mentioned." In a letter to John Engleder on March 21, 2001 I advised him that "Information from our legal advisors is that this "road is not a public road and is not the responsibility of the Municipal District of Mackenzie No. 23." If the road is built under the terms of the Resource Road Program costs to the MD would be about \$2,805,250 plus \$336,630 in GST for a total cost to the MD of \$3,141,880. Annual maintenance costs are expected to be about \$243,000 per year.

### **COSTS / SOURCE OF FUNDING:**

If the MD assumes responsibility for the road it would need to delete other capital projects, increase taxes or do a combination of the two solutions.

### **RECOMMENDED ACTION (by originator):**

That Council authorize administration to engage appropriate advisors to meet with Alberta Transportation Officials to further discuss the matter.

Again I wish to formally advise that as the road is not a Municipal District of Mackenzie No. 23 road we will not be arranging for any work on the bridges you mentioned.

It was a pleasure meeting you and Council members on May 23, 2001, to discuss our Special Places designation program and the proposed Caribou Mountains Wildland Provincial Park.

Our meeting gave me the chance to better understand the specific nature of your concerns and was particularly timely since I am preparing a final recommendation for government to conclude our Special Places program. My colleague, Gary Friedel, raised your concerns on previous occasions but it was good to hear them first hand. (I do regret that Honourable Pearl Calahasen's schedule prevented her attendance.)

In any case, your substantive issues regarding the establishment of a representative and balanced advisory management planning committee, as well as the size of the proposed protected area and the implications on potential future economic benefits to the Municipal District of Mackenzie (MD), were clearly noted.

I am prepared to recommend that the proposed Caribou Mountains Wildland Provincial Park be established with the following commitments to the municipality. Firstly, I will establish a management planning committee to advise me directly regarding the future management of the proposed wildland. The committee will be structured to achieve balanced representation of the key stakeholders, with the municipality invited to participate as a core member. Secondly, I am willing to amend the local committee's recommended boundary and will remove five townships in support of future economic development potential in the MD. Additionally, I am willing to remove the MD lands within the Cache Creek Wolverine site from further consideration under the Special Places program.



### Family and Community Support Services (FCSS) Funding Increase

As you are aware, the FCSS Association of Alberta, in partnership with the Ministry of Children's Services, completed a review of the FCSS Funding Allocation Model last year. The final report of the review, "Finding the Balance" was presented at the Association Annual Meeting last November and a copy is enclosed. The two key findings of the review were that the rationale behind the allocation model is essentially sound, and that the most significant issue facing FCSS in Alberta is the need to achieve the level of funding for FCSS that was identified during the Program Re-design in 1998.

Now is a critical time for our advocacy efforts, as Cabinet and Caucus will be meeting in June to begin their budget planning processes for the 2002-2003 fiscal year. The Association is asking for your help in discussing the need for increased funding to the FCSS Program with MLAs throughout the province. We would ask that you contact your local MLA and arrange a time to meet in the constituency with all of the respective municipalities, Metis Settlements and FCSS Programs. To assist with this action the Association has developed a list of FCSS Programs/MLA Constituencies and a summary of information relating to the FCSS Program funding requirement.

The purpose of the meetings is twofold. First, to ensure that all MLAs have an understanding and awareness of FCSS, not only as a provincial Program, but as integral community resources that provide direct benefits to residents of their constituencies. Secondly, to encourage the MLAs to contact Minister Evans to discuss how they can help her to ensure that additional FCSS funds are proposed in the Children's Service budget and approved by Treasury in the next fiscal year.

Family and Community Support Services Funding Information For Discussion with M.L.A.s May 25, 2001

### 1. Summary of Information from the "Finding the Balance" Report

The Ministry of Children's Services and the Family and Community Support Services (FCSS) Provincial Association undertook a review of the FCSS Funding Allocation Model in 2000 by forming the Funding Allocation Model Review (FAMR) Working Group. A comprehensive consultation review process was undertaken by the Working Group to determine the effectiveness of the FCSS Funding Allocation Model in meeting the needs of municipalities, Metis settlements and FCSS programs.

### Major findings of the review include the following:

- ▶ 95% of FCSS Programs have not had an increase in funds since 1993.
- ▶ The funds required to support the model when it was implemented in 1997 (13.9 million dollars) have not been achieved.
- Limited funding is causing competition for "people resources" in the community. FCSS cannot afford to pay as much as some other agencies and is losing key staff.
- ▶ Significant funding continues to be put toward crisis services. As the provincial government increasingly confirms the need to invest in prevention and early intervention, funding as a way to reduce the need for crisis services/resources must be allocated.
- Provincial FCSS funding is immediately multiplied by the community in terms of the 20% matching share contributed by municipalities.
- Many programs and services previously provided by other government departments or community agencies have been reduced or eliminated. Where these programs are eligible for FCSS funding, municipal and settlement councils are being pressured to assume FCSS funding and/or operational responsibility.

### Summary of allocation model review

- Generally, it appears the FCSS funding allocation model would have worked well if adequate funding was in place to support it.
- ▶ The pressing need is to take steps to ensure that the required funding level is in place so that the model could work as it was designed and as intended and that a commitment be made to review operational aspects of the allocation model once the funding is in place.

#### Recommendations

The Report focuses on recommendation 1, which states:

- ▶ An additional \$15.5 million in provincial funding is required to support the FCSS partnership and operate current FCSS Programs, including:
  - \$3.3 million to meet the original commitment of an additional \$13.9 million to the FCSS provincial grant budget;
  - \$7.6 million to fund increased service demands, including service restructuring by other providers;

### 4. Statistics supporting the need for a \$15.5 million dollar increase

- In 2000/2001 281 municipalities and Metis Settlements participated in the FCSS Program.
- 133 municipalities and Metis Settlements are currently grand fathered * in the funding model at a funding level less than they received in 1993/94.
- 134 municipalities and Metis Settlements are not grand fathered but are still funded at a level less than 1993/94.
- 14 municipalities and Metis Settlements are receiving more money from the province than they did in 1993/94.
- If the required level of funding was in place (15.5 million additional dollars) only 9 municipalities would still be grand fathered.
- ▶ 57 municipalities/Metis Settlements have joined the FCSS Program since 1993/94. These communities are eligible for provincial funding of \$1,355,807. Only \$500,000 however has been specifically budgeted to accommodate new communities meaning that the majority of the funds for new Programs has come from increases to the general FCSS grant.
- Family and Social Services and now Children's Services has been working to increase FCSS funding to the level recommended by the Program Re-design since 1998. The provincial FCSS budget has increased by \$11.2 million in that time, including a \$4.7 million increase in the current fiscal year. The 2001/02 provincial FCSS budget is \$42.3 million. The funding allocation model review demonstrated that to adequately support the provincial / municipal and Metis Settlement partnership, an additional 15.5 million dollars is required.
- * Grand fathering. Since adequate funding was not available when the Re-design funding allocation model was implemented in 1998, communities that were receiving a higher level of funding at that time were "grand fathered" to ensure that they did not experience a funding reduction impact. The "grand fathering" provision was to be in place only until the adequate level of funding was achieved. To date the funding has not reached the level identified in the funding model review.

### 5. FCSS is Prevention

Over the past 24 months, two major direction setting processes have been undertaken by the Children's Services Ministry. The "Children at Risk Task Force" and the "Children's Forum" identified a number of crucial prevention and early intervention strategies to help children and families in Alberta avoid the need for crisis based services and programs. A preliminary review of municipal and Metis Settlement FCSS programs and services, done in 2000, showed that over one quarter of FCSS funds were going directly to strategies identified in the two reports (see attached list). These programs do not include resources allocated by local councils to out-of-school care, community development or volunteer development programs and services. FCSS is an effective way to address these priorities within the provincial government and in local communities.



# RE: Proposed Bylaw No. 253/01 as an Amendment to the existing Land-Use Bylaw

The purpose of this report is to provide the Municipal District of Mackenzie No. 23 with comments and recommendation on a proposed amendment to the existing Land-Use Bylaw with regard to the property, known as Part of SW 35-105-15-W5M within the Municipal District of Mackenzie No.23, as shown on Schedule "A" hereto attached.

#### RECOMMENDATION

It is recommended that the application to rezone the subject land, known as Part of SW 35-105-15-W5M within the Municipal District of Mackenzie No.23, as shown on Schedule "A" to this report, from Agricultural District 1 (A1) to Rural Country Residential District (RC) be APPROVED.

According to the Canada Land Inventory (CLI) rating, the soils of the subject property are classified as "3c" (see the Soils Classification map attached to this report). The soils in Class "3" have a "moderately severe limitations" for agricultural production. More specifically, the soils of this Class restrict the range of crops or have effects on timing and ease of tillage, planting and harvesting, as well as on choice of crops.

In addition, because the land situated to the west of the subject property has mostly organic soils, unsuited for cultivation, and because the land to the south has been used for a campground, the subject property has become an isolated and fragmented piece of farmland that is economically unviable for agricultural operation. Therefore, to develop the subject property for residential use would not seem to contradict the policy of protecting prime agricultural land within the Municipal District.

#### 3. Land-use Compatibility:

Most of the land surrounding the subject property is currently uncultivated or only partially cultivated. To the north of the subject property, only half of the adjacent land is under cultivation. To the west, most of the area is covered with slough. To the south, only half of the adjacent section is cultivated. To the east across the road are farmland and a house. The southern half of the section where the subject land is situated has already been developed for a campground. Therefore, the proposed development on the subject property would create no land-use conflict, and is considered acceptable from the viewpoint of land-use compatibility.


#### CONCLUSION

#### BACKGROUND / PROPOSAL:

Concerns have been brought forward regarding us charging municipal reserve in the form of money for rural subdivisions. Anytime where there is a 2nd or additional parcel out of a quarter section we have been charging for Municipal Reserve in the amount of 10% of fair market value of the proposed subdivision.

This is in accordance with the Municipal Government Act (MGA) Division 8 (Reserve Land, Land for Roads and Utilities) copy attached.

#### **DISCUSSION / OPTIONS / BENEFITS / DISADVANTAGES:**

For determining the amount of municipal reserve to be charged we have been:

- 1) using the assessed value for the proposed subdivision provided to us by Compass Assessment, or
- 2) if the developer feels that the assessment is to high we request they provide us with a property appraisal of the proposed subdivision, and

we will use the lesser of the two.

Council can set the amount of municipal reserve to be charged. Following are some options.

- Option 1: Leave the amount as is, being 10% of appraised value for all 2nd or additional parcels being subdivided, or
- Option 2: Charge a lower % of the appraised value for all 2nd or additional parcels being subdivided, or

Reserve Land, Land for Roads and Utilities

Land dedication

- 661 The owner of a parcel of land that is the subject of a proposed subdivision must provide, without compensation,
- (a) to the Crown in right of Alberta or a municipality, land for roads, public utilities and environmental reserve, and
- (b) subject to section 663, to the Crown in right of Alberta, a municipality, one or more school authorities or a municipality and one or more school authorities, land for municipal reserve, school reserve, municipal and school reserve, money in place of any or all of those reserves or a combination of reserves and money,
- as required by the subdivision authority pursuant to this Division. 1995 c24 s95

Roads, utilities, etc.

- 662(1) A subdivision authority may require the owner of a parcel of land that is the subject of a proposed subdivision to provide part of that parcel of land for the purpose of roads, public utilities or both.
- (2) The land to be provided under subsection (1) may not exceed 30% of the area of the parcel of land less the land taken as environmental reserve or as an environmental reserve easement.
- (3) If the owner has provided sufficient land for the purposes referred to in subsection (1) but the land is less than the maximum amount authorized by subsection (2), the subdivision authority may not require the owner to provide any more land for those purposes.

663 A subdivision authority may not require the owner of a parcel of land
that is the subject of a proposed subdivision to provide reserve land or
money in place of reserve land if

- (a) one lot is to be created from a quarter section of land,
- (b) land is to be subdivided into lots of 16.0 hectares or more and is to be used only for agricultural purposes,
  - (c) the land to be subdivided is 0.8 hectares or less, or
- (d) reserve land, environmental reserve easement or money in place of it was provided in respect of the land that is the subject of the proposed subdivision under this Part or the former Act. 1995 c24 s95;1996 c30 s62
- Environmental reserve 664(1) Subject to section 663, a subdivision authority may require the owner of a parcel of land that is the subject of a proposed subdivision to provide part of that parcel of land as environmental reserve if it consists

Designation of municipal land 665(1) A council may, by bylaw, require that a parcel of land or a part of a parcel of land that it owns or that it is in the process of acquiring be designated as municipal reserve, school reserve, municipal and school reserve, environmental reserve or public utility lot.

- (2) Subject to subsection (3), on receipt of a copy of a bylaw under this section and the applicable fees, the Registrar must do all things necessary to give effect to the order, including cancelling the existing certificate of title and issuing a new certificate of title for each newly created parcel of land with the designation of
- (a) municipal reserve, which must be identified by a number suffixed by the letters "MR",
- (b) public utility lot, which must be identified by a number suffixed by the letters "PUL",
- (c) environmental reserve, which must be identified by a number suffixed by the letters "ER",
- (d) school reserve, which must be identified by a number suffixed by the letters "SR",
- (e) municipal and school reserve, which must be identified by a number suffixed by the letters "MSR", or
  - (f) a lot, which must be identified by a number.
- (3) The certificate of title for a municipal reserve, school reserve, municipal and school reserve, environmental reserve or public utility lot under this section must be free of all encumbrances, as defined in the Land Titles Act.

Municipal and school reserves 666(1) Subject to section 663, a subdivision authority may require the owner of a parcel of land that is the subject of a proposed subdivision

- to provide part of that parcel of land as municipal reserve, school reserve or municipal and school reserve,
- to provide money in place of municipal reserve, school reserve or municipal and school reserve, or
- (c) to provide any combination of land or money referred to in clauses (a) and (b).
- (2) The aggregate amount of land that may be required under subsection (1) may not exceed the percentage set out in the municipal development plan, which may not exceed 10% of the parcel of land less the land required to be provided as environmental reserve and the land made subject to an environmental reserve easement.
- (3) The total amount of money that may be required to be provided under subsection (1) may not exceed 10% of the appraised market value, determined

subsection (2) may not exceed the equivalent of 5% of the developable land or a lesser percentage as prescribed in the subdivision and development regulations.

Deferment of municipal and school reserves 669(1) Notwithstanding sections 661(b) and 666, instead of requiring municipal reserve, school reserve or municipal and school reserve or money in place of any of them, a subdivision authority may direct that the requirement to provide all or part of those reserves be deferred against

- (a) the remainder of the parcel that is the subject of the proposed subdivision approval, or
- (b) other land of the person applying for subdivision approval that is within the same municipality as that parcel of land, or both.
- (2) If a deferment is directed under subsection (1), the subdivision authority must file a caveat in a land titles office against the title of the land to which the direction relates.
- (3) The direction for a deferment under subsection (1) must
  - (a) state the name of the applicant for subdivision approval,
- (b) describe the land that is the subject of the application for subdivision approval,
  - (c) describe the land to which the deferment relates,
  - (d) state the area of the land referred to in clause (b), and
- (e) state whether the deferment is in respect of municipal reserve, school reserve or municipal and school reserve.
- (4) If an application for subdivision approval is made in respect of land against the title of which is filed a deferred reserve caveat under this section or a former Act, the subdivision authority may, in addition to requiring municipal reserve, school reserve or municipal and school reserve to be provided in accordance with this Division or a former Act, require to be provided all or part of the reserve land in respect of which a deferment was directed or required under this section or a former Act.
- (5) If deferred reserve is provided in accordance with subsection (4), the caveat must be discharged or amended accordingly.
- (6) If a deferred reserve caveat was registered in a land titles office under a former Act in respect of land in respect of which under section 663 no reserve land could be required to be provided, the registered owner may apply to the Registrar to endorse the certificate of title with a memorandum cancelling the registration of the caveat.
- (7) On being satisfied that subsection (6) applies to the deferred reserve caveat, the Registrar must endorse a memorandum on the certificate of title cancelling the registration of the caveat.

#### **BYLAW NO. 266/01**

#### BEING A BY-LAW OF THE MUNICIPAL DISTRICT OF MACKENZIE NO. 23 IN THE PROVINCE OF ALBERTA

#### TO ESTABLISH AN ASSESSMENT REVIEW BOARD

WHEREAS, Section 454(1) of the Municipal Government Act, being Chapter M-26.1 of the Revised Statutes of Alberta, 1994, hereinafter referred to as the "M.G.A." provides for the establishment of an Assessment Review Board, and

WHEREAS, Council is required to establish an Assessment Review Board when assessment complaints are received by the municipality under Section 461 of the Municipal Government Act, and

**WHEREAS,** Council wishes to provide procedures for hearings of the Assessment Review Board on complaints against Assessments under the Municipal Government Act,

**NOW THEREFORE,** THE COUNCIL OF THE Municipal District of Mackenzie No. 23, duly assembled, enacts as follows:

#### **Definitions**

- 1. The following words and phrases mean:
  - (a) **Assessor** the assessor for the Municipal District of Mackenzie No. 23.
  - (b) Clerk the Clerk to be appointed pursuant to Section 455 of the Municipal Government Act.
  - (c) Complainant the person who files a complaint about an assessment or tax applicable to a particular assessment and tax.
  - (d) **Complaint** a complaint about an assessment of property within the Municipal District of Mackenzie No. 23.
  - (e) Council the duly elected Council of the Municipal District of Mackenzie No. 23.

#### **Duties of the Assessment Review Board**

 The Assessment Review Board shall hear and decide complaints from assessments received under Section 460 of the Municipal Government Act.

#### Chair and Vice-Chair

8. Before its first hearing, the Assessment Review board must elect a Chair and Vice-Chair from among its members. The Vice-Chair shall preside if the Chair is absent.

#### Quorum

9. The quorum for the Assessment Review Board is two (2) members providing one of those two is a Council member. If there is a loss of quorum then the alternate member shall fill the vacancy.

#### Remuneration and Expenses

10. The members of the Assessment Review Board shall be paid according to the Municipal District of Mackenzie No. 23 Honourariums and Related Expense Reimbursement Bylaw.

#### **Decisions**

11. A copy of each decision of the Assessment Review Board shall be sent to all persons notified of the hearing. The Board shall send reasons to any person who was notified of the hearing and who requests written reasons, either orally at the hearing, or in writing to the Clerk prior to the hearing.

#### **Duties of the Clerk**

- 12. The Clerk shall:
  - (a) Record the complaint;
  - (b) Set a time, date and place for the hearing of any complaint and provide notice in accordance with the Municipal Government Act and regulations hereto;

#### BACKGROUND / PROPOSAL:

The regional health authorities elections will be held in conjunction with municipal elections on October 15, 2001. The provincial government is proposing that municipalities conduct the elections for both.

#### **DISCUSSION / OPTIONS / BENEFITS / DISADVANTAGES:**

Attached is a proposed agreement between Alberta Health and Wellness, the Regional Health Authority, and the M.D. of Mackenzie. The proposal is for the Returning Officer for the M.D. to be responsible for the health authorities elections from nomination day through Election Day. Alberta Health and Wellness will pay the M.D. of Mackenzie \$1 per capita for those wards where municipal elections are held and \$2 per capita for those wards where no elections are held (where elections are by acclamation). Per capita figures used are from the 1996 census, for a total of 7,980.

#### **COSTS / SOURCE OF FUNDING:**

Election costs would be covered by Alberta Health and Wellness.

#### RECOMMENDED ACTION (by originator):

That the M.D. of Mackenzie enter into an agreement with Alberta Health and Wellness and the Regional Health Authority to conduct elections for the regional health authority in conjunction with the municipal elections.

Dear Mr. Prockiw:

As you may be aware, the first elections for regional health authorities will be held in conjunction with the municipal and school board elections on October 15, 2001. Alberta Health and Wellness has been working with Alberta Municipal Affairs to ensure that these elections are successful.

You should have recently received a letter from the Assistant Deputy Minister of Local Government Services, Alberta Municipal Affairs. This letter enclosed a copy of the regulations applicable to the forthcoming elections, and indicating the roles that we envision municipalities playing in the elections. The regulations adopt, with certain modifications, the provisions of the Local Authorities Election Act.

We will be amending the *Election and Appointment of Regional Health Authority Members* Regulation shortly to provide for rules governing campaign contributions, and will provide the amendment regulation to you immediately after it is passed.

The Election and Appointment of Regional Health Authority Members Regulation provides the Minister of Health and Wellness with the responsibility to conduct the election, and authorizes him to make agreements for the conduct of the election. I therefore respectfully request your council's cooperation in conducting a vote of the electors residing in the M.D. of Mackenzie No. 23. For conducting this election, the M.D. of Mackenzie No. 23 will be reimbursed the amount of \$1 per resident or a minimum of \$1,000 for conducting the regional health authority election in any municipal ward in which the M.D. of Mackenzie No. 23 is also holding an election of its own, and the greater of \$2 per resident and \$2,000 for conducting the regional health authority election in any municipal ward in which a municipal election is not being held. Further details of payments can be found in the attached Agreement and its Schedule.

We are inviting First Nations and Metis Settlements to conduct the regional health authority elections in their jurisdictions. If agreements are not made with them, we may be inviting your council to conduct the election for any of these that are near your municipality.

Your cooperation and assistance in this matter is most appreciated. If you require further information, please contact Jim Leitch of Alberta Municipal Affairs at 780-422-8340.

#### REGIONAL HEALTH AUTHORITIES ELECTION AGREEMENT

#### BETWEEN:

## HER MAJESTY THE QUEEN IN RIGHT OF ALBERTA as represented by the Minister of Health and Wellness (the "Minister")

- and -

## Northwestern Regional Health Authority (the "Regional Health Authority")

- and -

## M.D. of Mackenzie No. 23 (the "Election Partner")

WHEREAS pursuant to section 6(1) of the *Election and Appointment of Regional Health Authority Members Regulation* (the "Regulation") the Minister is responsible for conducting the vote of the electors residing in a municipality, specialized municipality or Indian reserve and the Minister has the rights, powers and duties to conduct the vote;

AND WHEREAS pursuant to section 2(b)(ii) of the Regulation the Minister has determined that two-thirds of the Regional Health Authority's members are to be elected;

AND WHEREAS pursuant to section 6(2) of the Regulation, the Minister has the authority to enter into agreements to conduct the election;

NOW THEREFORE, the parties hereto agree as follows:

#### 1. Responsibilities of the Election Partner

M.D. of Mackenzie No. 23 shall, on the Minister's behalf, for purposes of the Regulation:

a) conduct a vote of the electors of:

#### 2. Responsibilities of the Regional Health Authority

The Regional Health Authority shall ensure that the Returning Officer, on behalf of the Regional Health Authority and in compliance with the Election Regulations, shall:

- a) publish the notice of nomination day;
- b) receive nominations and withdrawals of nominations;
- c) advise the Election Partner immediately upon nominations closing of the results of the nominations;
- d) if elections are required, receive from the Election Partner the results in the area in which the Election Partner is conducting the election;
- e) compile, announce, and publish the results, and report the results to the Deputy Minister of Alberta Health and Wellness;
- f) assist the Election Partner as necessary in any recounts; and
- g) conduct or participate in any post-election matters, other than recounts, such as trials of elections and involve the Election Partner as necessary.

#### 3. Responsibilities of the Regional Health Authority and the Election Partner

The Regional Health Authority and the Election Partner shall communicate and cooperate with each other to ensure a successful election.

#### 4. Responsibilities of the Minister

The Minister shall:

- a) appoint, for the purposes of conducting an election, a returning officer for the health region administered by the Regional Health Authority (herein referred to as the "Returning Officer"); and
- b) upon the Election Partner fulfilling all of its responsibilities under this Agreement, pay the Election Partner according to the Schedule that is attached to and forms part of this Agreement. The amount that the Minister is required to pay the Election Partner shall be paid within thirty (30) days of the Minister's receipt of a written invoice showing the total and particulars of the amount and the Minister being satisfied as to the invoice.

#### 5. Term of the agreement

The term of this agreement shall commence on the date the final signatory signs the agreement and shall end six weeks after the election, unless a judicial recount or a trial of the election has been commenced, in which case this agreement shall

remedy the Minister may have, correct such default and deduct the cost of doing so from any payment required to be paid by the Minister to the Election Partner under this agreement.

7.3 Notwithstanding clauses 7.1 and 7.2 or anything to the contrary herein contained or implied, the Minister may immediately, on written notice to the Election Partner, terminate this agreement for or without any reason. Upon such termination, the Election Partner may invoice for the out-of-pocket costs reasonably incurred by the Election Partner up to the date of termination that are directly related to the preparations for the regional health authority election in its area, and the final decision of whether any cost is reasonable will be made by the Minister.

#### 8. Collection, Use and Disclosure of Information

- 8.1 All parties acknowledge that the *Freedom of Information and Protection of Privacy Act* (the "FOIPPA") applies to all, and the *Local Authorities Election Act* (the "LAEA") applies to some, records that are produced or acquired under this agreement and all parties agree to comply with the provisions of FOIPPA or LAEA, as applicable, with respect to the collection, use, disclosure, retention and destruction of records produced or acquired under this agreement.
- 8.2 The Regional Health Authority and the Election Partner shall get the written approval of the Minister prior to the disclosure, during the term of this agreement and at any time in the future, of any information produced or acquired under this agreement to any third party, but the Election Partner and Regional Health Authority may make disclosures of information as between each other and to the Minister as specifically required under the terms of this agreement.
- 8.3 Notwithstanding anything to the contrary herein contained or implied, clauses 8.1 and 8.2 shall survive termination of this agreement.

## 9. Addresses for Notices and Payment

Any notices or payments required to be given under the terms of this agreement shall be delivered or sent by prepaid or registered mail to:

- 10.6 A waiver by any party of the performance by another party of an obligation under this agreement whether before or after the other party has breached that obligation shall be deemed not to constitute a continuing waiver of the performance of that obligation unless a contrary intention is expressed in writing and signed by all parties.
- 10.7 This agreement does not prevent the Election Partner from retaining another person or entity to assist with the election; however, in that event nothing in this agreement relieves the Election Partner from its responsibilities under this agreement.
- 10.8 Each of the Regional Health Authority and the Election Partner is responsible for maintaining general liability insurance, including blanket contractual coverage and in the amount of not less than \$2,000,000 inclusive per occurrence, to protect such party in the event of third party claims for bodily injury, personal injury or property damage (including loss of use thereof) arising in connection with the performance of this Agreement.
- 10.9 Each of the Regional Health Authority and the Election Partner is responsible for maintaining vehicle liability insurance on all vehicles used in connection with this agreement in the amount of not less that \$1,000,000 for public liability and property damage, including loss of use thereof.

## Municipalities or Local Jurisdictions Without Wards

Municipalities or local jurisdictions conducting an election of their own under the Local Authorities Election Act will receive the greater of \$1,000 in total or \$1 per resident.

Municipalities or local jurisdictions not conducting an election of their own under the Local Authorities Election Act will receive the greater of \$2,000 or \$2 per resident.

#### Municipalities or Local Jurisdictions With Wards

Municipalities or local jurisdictions conducting an election of their own under the Local Authorities Election Act in a ward will receive the greater of \$1,000 in total or \$1 per resident for that ward.

Municipalities or local jurisdictions not conducting an election of their own under the Local Authorities Election Act in a ward will receive the greater of \$2,000 or \$2 per resident for that ward.

Municipalities or local jurisdictions not conducting an election of their own under the Local Authorities Election Act in any wards will receive the greater of \$2,000 or \$2 per resident for the entire municipality or local jurisdiction.

Therefore, where there is an acclamation in one or more wards and an election in one or more wards of a municipality or local jurisdiction, there will be separate payment calculations for each ward.

To determine the amount to be paid on a per resident basis in respect of a ward in a municipality or local jurisdiction, the population of the ward is determined by dividing the total population of that municipality or local jurisdiction by the number of wards.

For purposes of this Schedule, the population of a municipality is that established for 2000 under the Determination of Population Regulation (AR 371/94), or where a municipality has not conducted a census for 2000 under the Determination of Population Regulation (AR 371/94), that determined using the latest official population list of the Department of Municipal Affairs.

For the purposes of this Schedule, local jurisdiction includes Metis settlements and Indian Reserves.

The population of a Metis settlement is that determined by the most recent census conducted by the Metis Settlements General Council.

## COSTS / SOURCE OF FUNDING:

The replacement cost for a coin machine is approximately \$500.00 installed. They generally are reliable but there have been occasions were three of these machines were replaced in a given season. During the winter months the coin machines require heat from a space heater to prevent freeze-up causing the machine to malfunction. Approximately 60 hours per year are spent on repairing coin machines where half that time would be charged out at time and one half. An average of one hour per week per hamlet excluding Zama is spent on rolling coins.
