MESSAGE FROM THE REEVE

I am pleased to present the 2011 Annual Report. The Report highlights the financial results of the 2011 audit and provides highlights of the 2012 budget. As evident from the financial statements and the 2012 budget, municipal taxes remain the main revenue source for the County. This revenue is necessary for the County to provide services to our ratepayers, upgrade the County's infrastructure, and complete new capital projects. The County has experienced a decline in municipal assessment in the past few years. This started with the closure of Footner Forest Products and progressed to a decline in assessments for other resource enterprises. In an effort to maintain a reasonable mil rate. Council had to review other municipal revenue sources. This included services provided in the communities where the end-users can be easy identified, in particular Council had to reevaluate the level of subsidies through the municipal taxes for some municipal services: utilities, permitting, dust control. As a result, the ratepayers have seen an increase in the utility rates in 2012, the planning and development fees were revised, and dust control.

The year of 2011 has been a challenging one for the County as we had a few personnel changes. Aging population and scarce resources of qualified and trained personnel has been a challenge across Canada. Mackenzie County is not immune to that, but is also fortunate to have many dedicated and loyal employees that chose to make Mackenzie County their home. I would like to take this opportunity to thank all County personnel for their hard work and commitment.

The global economies have been affecting today's municipalities more than ever. Competition to attract investment and attract professionals into the communities continues. Mackenzie County Council recognizes the need to have our communities "investment ready" and made a decision to participate in the Community Investment Readiness Initiative through the Alberta Treasury Board and Enterprise, which was launched in June of 2012. The Initiative focuses on community readiness to attract, retain and grow business investment, and their ability to respond to investors and their needs.

Considering many difficult decisions Council had to make in the past year, we are progressively moving forward in 2012. Some of the major Regional initiatives we are currently involved in are the completion of Highway 88 pavement, promoting the west extension of Highway 58 into British Columbia and seniors' housing facilities. Whenever possible and within our municipal jurisdiction, we are continuing to provide assistance to the various industry stakeholders in moving their initiatives forward. Mackenzie County Council has taken a proactive approach in preparing for the upcoming Lower Peace Land Use Framework development. includes the County's participation in the Lower and Upper Peace municipal initiative titled "Land Use Framework -Municipal Perspective" led by the Mackenzie Municipal Services The final recommendations of the yet to be Agency.

developed Lower Peace Land Use Framework will have a substantial impact on our Region's economy.

As many of our citizens are aware, approximately 99,000 acres of new agricultural land has been sold within Mackenzie County by Alberta Sustainable Resource Development. This is a unique undertaken for Alberta and, I venture to guess, for Canada. These lands are not serviced by any infrastructure. The County with the assistance from the Provincial Government has developed a preliminary rural road network plan. We are actively seeking funding options to fund this infrastructure. A preliminary estimate to build low volume access roads is over \$30M including a few major bridge constructions.

The County is also starting developing a master drainage plan for the newly sold lands in partnership with multiple provincial ministries: Agriculture, Environment and Sustainable Resource Development, Transportation, and Municipal Affairs. We understand the challenges associated with opening up the new agricultural lands for new farmers and their needs. Council must balance addressing these needs without affecting the provision of services at the current levels and maintenance of the established infrastructure.

In the upcoming year, Council and Administration are focusing on improved long term planning. As such, municipal Area Structure Plans will be reviewed and revised through public consultation; the development of a long term financial plan is in progress; 2012 is the first year of a three year program to develop Master Water, Sewer, Storm Water, Transportation plans for the three hamlets (2012 – La Crete; 2013 – Fort Vermilion; 2014 – Zama).

This year we have also seen some significant changes in the Alberta government. We are dedicated to establishing excellent working relationships with all new provincial officials. Council is looking forward to continue working with the ratepayers, stakeholders and our neighbors to better our communities and the Region.

Councillors and I wish our residents a prosperous and healthy year. It has been our pleasure to be your representatives with Mackenzie County.

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INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT

To the Reeve and Council of Mackenzie County

We have audited the accompanying consolidated financial statements of Mackenzie County, which comprise of the consolidated statement of financial position as at December 31, 2011 and the consolidated statements of changes in net financial assets, operations and cash flows for the year then ended, and a summary of significant accounting policies and other explanatory information.

Management's Responsibility for the Consolidated Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these consolidated financial statements in accordance with Canadian generally accepted accounting principles, and for such internal control as management determines is necessary to enable the preparation of consolidated financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

Auditor's Responsibility

Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these consolidated financial statements based on our audit. We conducted our audit in accordance with Canadian generally accepted auditing standards. Those standards require that we comply with ethical requirements and plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the consolidated financial statements are free from material misstatement.

An audit involves performing procedures to obtain audit evidence about the amounts and disclosures in the consolidated financial statements. The procedures selected depend on the auditor's judgment, including the assessment of the risks of material misstatement of the consolidated financial statements, whether due to fraud or error. In making those risk assessments, the auditor considers internal control relevant to the entity's preparation and fair presentation of the consolidated financial statements in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the entity's internal control. An audit also includes evaluating the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of accounting estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall presentation of the consolidated financial statements.

We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our audit opinion.

Notes to Consolidated Financial Statements Year Ended December 31, 2011

1. Summary of significant accounting policies

The consolidated financial statements of the municipality are the representations of management prepared in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles for local governments established by the Public Sector Accounting Board of the Canadian Institute of Chartered Accountants. Significant aspects of the accounting polices adopted by the municipality are as follows:

Reporting entity

The consolidated financial statements reflect the assets, liabilities, revenues and expenditures, changes in fund balances and change in financial position of the reporting entity. This entity is comprised of the municipal operations plus all of the organizations that are owned or controlled by the municipality and are, therefore, accountable to Council for the administration of their financial affairs and resources.

The schedule of taxes levied also includes requisitions for education, health, social and other external organizations that are not part of the municipal reporting entity.

The statements exclude trust assets that are administered for the benefit of external parties. Interdepartmental and organizational transactions and balances are eliminated.

Basis of accounting

The financial statements are prepared using the accrual basis of accounting. The accrual basis of accounting records revenue as it is earned and measurable. Expenses are recognized as they are incurred and measurable based upon receipt of goods or services and/or the legal obligation to pay.

Funds from external parties and earnings thereon restricted by agreement or legislation are accounted for as deferred revenue until used for the purpose specified.

Government transfers, contributions and other amounts are received from third parties pursuant to legislation, regulation or agreement and may only be used for certain programs, in the completion of specific work, or for the purchase of tangible capital assets. In addition, certain user charges and fees are collected for which the related services have yet to be performed. Revenue is recognized in the period when the related expenses are incurred, services performed or the tangible capital assets are acquired.

Use of estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with Canadian generally accepted accounting principles requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amount of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements, and the reported amounts of revenue and expenditure during the period. Where measurement uncertainty exists, the financial statements have been prepared within reasonable limits of materiality. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

1. Summary of significant accounting policies (continued)

Cash and cash equivalents

Cash includes cash and cash equivalents. Cash equivalents are investments in treasury bills and are valued at cost plus accrued interest. The carrying amounts approximate fair value because they have maturities at the date of purchase of less than ninety days.

Investments

Long term investments are recorded using the cost method. Under the cost method, the investment is initially recorded at cost, and earnings are recognized only to the extent received or receivable. In the case of a permanent loss in value, the investment is written down to the market value.

Requisition over-levy and under-levy

Over-levies and under-levies arise from the difference between the actual property tax levy made to cover each requisition and the actual amount requisitioned.

If the actual levy exceeds the requisition, the over-levy is accrued as a liability and property tax revenue is reduced. Where the actual levy is less than the requisition amount, the under-levy is accrued as a receivable and as property tax revenue.

Requisition tax rates in the subsequent year are adjusted for any over-levies or under-levies of the prior year.

Inventories for resale

Land held for resale is recorded at the lower of cost or net realizable value. Cost includes costs for land acquisition and improvements required to prepare the land for servicing such as clearing, stripping and levelling charges. Related development costs incurred to provide infrastructure such as water and wastewater services, roads, sidewalks and street lighting are recorded as physical assets under the respective function.

Gravel pit reclamation

Estimated environmental provisions, comprising pollution control, rehabilitation and pit closure, are based on the County's environmental policy taking into account current technological, environmental and regulatory requirements. The provision for rehabilitation is recognized as and when the environmental liability arises. To the extent that the obligations relate to the construction of an asset, they are capitalized as part of the cost of those assets. The effect of subsequent changes to assumptions in estimating an obligation for which the provision was recognized as part of the cost of the asset is adjusted against the asset. Any subsequent changes to an obligation which did not relate to the initial construction of a related asset are charged to the income statement.

Government transfers

Government transfers are the transfer of assets from senior levels of government that are not the result of an exchange transaction, are not expected to be repaid in the future, or the result of a direct financial return.

Government transfers are recognized in the financial statements as revenue in the period in which events giving rise to the transfer occur, providing the transfers are authorized, any eligibility criteria have been met, and reasonable estimates of the amounts can be determined.

Non-financial assets

Non-financial assets are not available to discharge existing liabilities and are held for use in the provision of services. They have useful lives extending beyond the current year and are not intended for sale in the normal course of operations. The change in non-financial assets during the year, together with the excess of revenues over expenses, provides the consolidated Change in Net Financial Assets for the year.

a) Tangible capital assets

Tangible capital assets are recorded at cost which includes all amounts that are directly attributable to acquisition, construction, development or betterment of the asset. The cost, less residual value, of the tangible capital assets is amortized on a straight-line basis over the estimated useful life as follows:

Annual amortization is not charged in the year of acquisition on the year of disposal. Assets under construction are not amortized until the asset is available for productive use.

b) Contributions of tangible capital assets

Tangible capital assets received as contributions are recorded at fair value at the date of receipt and also are recorded as revenue.

c) Leases

Leases are classified as capital or operating leases. Leases which transfer substantially all of the benefits and risks incidental to ownership of property are accounted for as capital leases. All other leases are accounted for as operating leases and the related lease payments are charged to expenses as incurred.

d) Inventories

Inventories consist of parts and supplies held for consumption, and gravel. Inventories of parts and supplies are carried at the lower of cost and replacement cost, with cost determined by the average cost method. Gravel pit reserves are recorded at cost and allocated to gravel supplies on a unit of production basis.

Recent accounting pronouncements published but not yet adopted

The following accounting standards have been issued by the Canadian Institute of Chartered Accountants (CICA) but are not yet effective. The municipality is currently evaluating the effect of adopting these standards on their financial statements.

Section PS 3410 - Government Transfers

This section establishes standards on how to account for and report government transfers to individuals, organizations and other governments from both a transferring government and a recipient government perspective. This section is effective for fiscal periods beginning on or after April 1, 2012.

Section PS 3510 - Tax Revenue

This new standard establishes recognition, measurement, presentation and disclosure standards relating to tax revenue reported in financial statements. This section is effective for fiscal periods beginning on or after April 1, 2012.

Section PS 3260 - Liability for Contaminated Sites

This new section establishes recognition, measurement, and disclosure standards for liabilities relating to contaminated sites of governments and those organizations applying the CICA Public Sector Accounting Handbook. This section is effective for fiscal periods beginning on or after April 1, 2014.

Section PS 3450 - Financial Instruments

This new section establishes standards for recognizing and measuring financial assets, financial liabilities and non-financial derivatives. In conjunction with this new section, section PS 1201 and section PS 2601 have been amended as a consequence of the introduction of new financial instruments standards. These amendments were required to present the associated gains and losses with financial instruments recognized under the new section. The new section and the related amendments are effective for fiscal periods beginning on or after April 1, 2015.

For government organizations, as defined in Section PS 1300, the new section and related amendments are effective for fiscal periods beginning on or after April 1, 2012.

Debenture debt is repayable to the Alberta Capital Finance Authority and bears interest at rates ranging from 3.046% to 5.375% per annum and matures in periods 2012 through 2030. The weighted average annual interest rate is 3.746% for 2011 (3.803% for 2010).

Debenture debt is issued on the credit and security of the municipality at large.

Interest on long term debt amounted to \$484,236 (2010 - \$449,220).

The municipality's total cash payments for interest in 2011 were \$471,603 (2010 - \$456,697).

Incurring debt beyond these limitations requires approval by the Minister of Municipal Affairs. These thresholds are guidelines used by Alberta Municipal Affairs to identify municipalities that could be at financial risk if further debt is acquired. The calculation taken alone does not represent the financial stability of the municipality. Rather, the financial statements must be interpreted as a whole.

14. Local Authorities Pension Plan

Employees of the municipality participate in the Local Authorities Pension Plan (LAPP), which is one of the plans covered by the Alberta Public Sector Pension Plans Act. The LAPP serves about 200,000 people and 400 employers. The LAPP is financed by employer and employee contributions and by investment earnings of the LAPP Fund.

Contributions for current service are recorded as expenditures in the year in which they become due.

The municipality is required to make current service contributions to the LAPP of 9.49% of pensionable earnings up to the year's maximum pensionable earnings under the Canada Pension Plan and 13.13% on pensionable earnings above this amount. Employees of the municipality are required to make current service contributions of 8.49% of pensionable salary up to the year's maximum pensionable salary and 12.13% on pensionable salary above this amount.

Total current service contributions by the municipality to the LAPP in 2011 were \$315,227 (2010 - \$277,075). Total current service contributions by the employees of the municipality to the Local Authorities Pension Plan in 2011 were \$285,025 (2010 - \$249,211).

At December 31, 2010, the LAPP disclosed an actuarial deficiency of \$4.635 billion.

15. Contingent liability

The municipality is a member of the Local Authorities Reciprocal Insurance Exchange. Under the terms of the membership, the municipality could become liable for its proportionate share of any claim losses in excess of the funds held by the exchange. Any liability incurred would be accounted for as a current transaction in the year the losses are determined.

In the normal conduct of operations, various legal claims are pending against the County in connection with road maintenance and construction, and other matters. The County carries liability insurance, subject to certain deductibles and policy limits, against such claims. Administration believes that the County has recognized adequate provisions of probable and reasonably estimable liabilities associated with these claims, and that their ultimate resolutions will not have a material adverse effect on the financial position of the County or its financial activities.

16. Financial instruments

The municipality's financial instruments consist of cash and temporary investments, accounts receivable, investments, accounts payable and accrued liabilities, deposit liabilities, requisition underlevy, and long term debt. It is management's opinion that the municipality is not exposed to significant interest or currency risks arising from these financial instruments.

The municipality is subject to credit risk with respect to taxes and grants in place of taxes receivables and trade and other receivables. Credit risk arises from the possibility that taxpayers and entities to which the municipality provides services may experience financial difficulty and be unable to fulfill their obligations. The large number and diversity of taxpayers and customers minimizes the credit risk

Unless otherwise noted, the carrying value of the financial instrument approximates fair value.




18. Budget amounts

Budget amounts are included for information purposes only and are not audited.

Under the Municipal Government Act, each council must adopt an operating and capital budget for each calendar year. Mackenzie County Council reviewed, deliberated and adopted the 2012 operating and capital budgets. County's Council has the drive and energy to build a fiscally responsible, results-oriented culture and enjoy working in a publicly accountable environment. Council's directive to administration was to prepare draft budgets while maintaining the same level of services. In order for our municipality to continue providing the services at the same levels, a small increase in the tax rate was required. The municipal tax rate was increased by I/2 mil for both residential and non-residential properties.




2012 Municipal Tax Revenue



Total operating revenues are projected to be \$35.7M (5% increase from 2011).

This increase is associated with an increase in municipal tax rate, increase in utilities rates, increase in provincial grants (bridge repair program).

2012 Operating Expenses



Total operating expenses including requisition transfers and amortization of tangible capital assets are projected to be \$39.5M, which is a 14% increase from 2011. The increase is associated with the increases in amortization of capital assets, new positions (wages & salaries), grant to the Town of High Level, bridge repair program. The schools requisition transfer will be \$6,157,364 (2011—\$6,295,112) and the senior lodge requisition transfer will be \$291,715 (2011—\$719,088).

Operating expenses include \$372,500 in grants to non-profit groups and bursaries, \$293,341 to FCSS, \$981,759 to recreation boards, \$186,756 to the Mackenzie Regional Library Board. In order to support the regional services provision, the County entered into agreements with the neighboring municipalities: the Towns of High Level and Rainbow Lake. The 2012 transfer to these local governments is estimated at \$2.0M.



What is the County's long-term debt?

The County has been borrowing funds for major capital projects. All of the County's debentures are arranged through the Alberta Capital Finance Authority who offers low fixed rates.


The Municipal Government Act and Alberta Regulation 255/00 defines the debt limits for municipalities. If the borrowing takes place as intended based on the preapproved bylaws, the County will be at 45% of its allowable debt limit on December 31, 2012 as permitted under MGA, AR 255/00.



Does the County have reserves?

In general, establishing reserves and setting aside a specified amount of funds annually assists in long term financial planning, and assists in maintaining a stable taxation structure.

Council has established various reserve policies. These policies define the purposes, permitted uses (must have a motion of Council), targeted minimum and maximum reserve levels, and the annual minimum contributions.





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
