	Citizens and/or Handicapped Persons		

Purpose:

To provide rural senior citizens and/or handicapped persons with a tow cost alternative for snow removal on their driveways. Snowplowing is required in rural areas to provide easy access for emergency vehicles such as an ambulance or fire truck.

This policy recinds and replaces Policy FIN014 and FIN016.

Policy Statement and Guidelines:

In this policy the following definitions shall apply:

Handicapped shall mean any person who is disabled or crippled and has applied for and received the Alberta Registries "Disabled Persons Placard".

Senior shall mean any person that is of the age of 65 years or older. The person must provide identification by means of a social insurance number or birth certificate.

- The Municipal District of Mackenzie No. 23 recognizes the burden of cost for snow clearing of rural residential access may be prohibitive to senior citizens and/or handicapped persons and wishes through this policy to the impact of snow clearing cost to seniors and/or handicapped persons.
- Senior citizens residing within the Municipal District of Mackenzie No. 23 may apply annually, through the completion of a Seniors and/or Handicapped Snowplow Flag Agreement, to the Council for the Municipal District of Mackenzie No. 23.

The service shall be subject to:

- The senior and/or handicapped rate is only available to those qualified residents living in rural areas.
- 2) Residences where all other persons (excluding spouse or dependent) residing on the property are also senior and/or handicapped citizens. Senior and/or handicapped residents shall provide identification as to their senior and/or handicapped status.

BACKGROUND / PROPOSAL:

Currently Policy PW002-95 sets the criteria for new road construction priorities. With Bylaw 269 passed on September 25, 2001 the road construction policy has to be changed. Previously a road was not constructed to a residence unless the residence was already established. Bylaw 269 now states that a development permit cannot be issued unless there is an access.

DISCUSSION / OPTIONS / BENEFITS / DISADVANTAGES:

The issue of landowners building the roads on road allowance needs to be addressed. Private individuals have constructed several roads this year and problems arose because the topsoil was not removed, road width was not adequate, etc. Currently there is no policy dealing with this matter.

Although there is a policy indicating new road construction priorities, no road standards were included. Each road was given individual standards.

The M.D. also needs to ensure that roads are not being built to parcels of land where the developer promises to clear the land or build a residence, but change their mind after the road is constructed.

COSTS / SOURCE OF FUNDING:

Road construction would continue to be budgeted for during the budget process.

Purpose

To establish a procedure and standards for the hiring of private equipment to complete municipal projects, exclusive of the gravelling and re-gravelling program.

Policy Statement and Guidelines

From time to time the municipality requires equipment which it does not own to work on projects. The municipality will usually go to the private sector to hire this equipment.

Private equipment shall be defined as any equipment which is owned and operated by an individual, partnership, or company other than the Municipal District of Mackenzie No. 23.

Once per year, usually each spring, the municipality will advertise for the "Registration for Day Labour Equipment." Every interested individual, partnership, or company shall have the opportunity to register the equipment that they own. This listing of equipment will be the first source of equipment that is to be hired when privately owned equipment is required for projects within the Municipal District of Mackenzie. This equipment will be paid according to the most current year's Alberta Roadbuilders Heavy Equipment Association's Rates. Where practical Administration is to ensure that all equipment owners receive equal opportunity to earn monies by working for the Municipal District of Mackenzie No. 23.

A contractor or supplier shall not be hired if they are in arrears, on any account, to the municipality. As well, they shall not be hired if they are initiating or involved in a legal action involving the Municipal District of Mackenzie No. 23.

A list of all equipment shall be prepared for staff and the public's information.

Any individual, partnership or corporation who purchases equipment, after the tender closure and wishes to list it with the municipality may do so, by providing a list of the equipment to the Municipal District of Mackenzie No. 23.. Such equipment will be paid 100% of the Alberta Roadbuilders Rate.

Purpose:

To define road construction priorities and road construction standards.

This policy rescinds and replaces Policy PW002 - 95.

Policy Statement and Guidelines

The Municipal District of Mackenzie No. 23 shall be solely responsible for new road construction. Where a road is constructed on road rights-of-way without the approval of the Municipal District of Mackenzie, the municipality shall not hire those contractors, individuals (their equipment) or the landowners authorizing the construction.

General

- 1.1 Construction of roads shall take place on statutory road allowances or road rights-of-way, wherein the construction:
 - a) Extends and forms part of the existing network of roads;
 - b) Meets all design, specifications and standards as determined by the Municipal District of Mackenzie (refer to schedule 'A');
 - c) Application has been made on a "Road Construction Request" form by the landowner(s) for Council's consideration; and
 - d) The project has been approved by Council;
 - e) The road to be constructed to privately owned land shall extend only to the nearest property line of the land owned by the applicant.
- 1.2 Construction outside of the road right-of-way shall be generally accepted when:
 - a) The construction is necessary to meet the design, specifications and standards as determined by the Municipal District of Mackenzie;
 - b) The construction along the road allowance is not cost effective;
 - c) The Municipal District of Mackenzie No. 23 derives either an economic and/or social benefit from the resulting development.

Eligibility

- 2.1 Consideration shall only be given for the construction of roads to access agricultural lands provided:
 - a) A minimum area of eighty (80) acres of the land on any one quarter is in production or has been cleared and grubbed and is suitable for

- the production of an agricultural crop; and
- b) That the quarter section of land is not assessable by an adjacent quarter section and that the quarter section to be accessed and the adjacent quarter section are not under the ownership of the same person(s) or group.
- c) If eighty (80) acres have not been cleared but the applicant expects to have it cleared within the next three years, the applicant shall give the Municipal District of Mackenzie an irrevocable letter of credit or certified cheque for \$10,000 per half mile. If the land is cleared within the three-year period, the irrevocable letter of credit or certified cheque shall be returned.
- d) If the road right-of-way requires clearing, the applicant may enter into an agreement with the municipality to clear and/or brush the road right-of-way. When an agreement has been entered into for the purpose of clearing a road right-of-way, the applicant shall be paid in accordance with the municipality's *Hiring of Private Equipment* policy.
- 2.2 Consideration shall be given for the construction of roads for residential access provided:
 - a) The land has been serviced with the appropriate utilities;
 - b) If the applicant expects to construct a residence within the next two years, the applicant shall give the Municipal District of Mackenzie No. 23 an irrevocable letter of credit or certified cheque for \$10,000 per half mile. If the residence is built within the two year period, the irrevocable letter of credit or certified cheque shall be returned.

Prioritization

- 3.1 Prioritization shall be by road class in the following order:
 - a) Major Collector
 - b) Minor Collector
 - c) Local Road
 - d) Low Volume Farm Access
 - e) Field Access
- 3.2 Prioritization within a particular road classification shall be:
 - a) Agricultural
 - b) Economic Benefit
 - c) Residential

Funding

4.1 Option 1

That the applicant provide the M.D. with a set amount of money (\$10,000) per half mile by certified cheque or irrevocable letter of credit when applying for the road. If the residence is built within a two year period after the road is constructed, the cheque or irrevocable letter of credit is

returned. The same would happen if the land was brushed and grubbed and ready for an agricultural crop after three years of the road being constructed. If the residence was not built and the land not cleared, the M.D. would keep the money.

Option 2

That the applicant pay for all, or a portion of, costs for constructing the road. The road would have to be built to standards set by Council in a policy. Unless there is a supervisor on sight during the construction, it is difficult to ensure that the road is built to standard.

Option 3

If applicable, the applicant clear the brush off of the road right of way at their cost and the M.D. construct the road at their cost. Some road rights of way do not require clearing and therefore this option would only affect selected applicants.

Option 4

That the M.D. pay all costs of constructing the road. This option leaves the door open to applicants requesting a road because they want to construct a residence or clear some land, but after the road is constructed the value of their land increases and they no longer plan on building or clearing.

Council reserves the right to modify the priority of a project when the distribution of costs for the construction of a road are presented as a cost shared project. Subject to the discretion of M.D. Council, the upgrading of any of the road infrastructure within the municipality may be given a higher priority.

CONSTRUCTION OF ROADS

Purpose:

To define where roads will be constructed, on lands under the administration

and control of Municipal District of Mackenzie No. 23

Statement:

(a) Construction of roads shall take place on road allowances as were established during the THIRD SYSTEM OF SURVEYS, wherein the construction:

(i) Upgrades or improves any portion thereof of the existing network of roads;

(ii) Extends and forms part of the existing network of roads;

- (iii) Meets all design, specifications and standards as determined by the Manager of Public Works:
- (iv) Council of the Municipal District of Mackenzie No. 23 has approved the project;
- (v) Council of the Municipal District of Mackenzie No. 23 has allocated funding for the project;
- (vi) Application has been made on a "Road Construction Request Form" by the ratepayer(s) for Council's consideration;
- (vii) Unless special circumstances exist the roads to be constructed to privately owned land shall extend to the boundary of the property.
- (b) Consideration shall be given for the construction of roads to access agricultural lands provided:
 - (i) a minimum area of EIGHTY ACRES of the land on any one quarter is in production or has been cleared and grubbed and is suitable for the production of an agricultural crop.
 - (ii) that the quarter section of land is not assessible by an adjacent quarter section and that the quarter section to be accessed and the adjacent quarter section are not under the ownership of the same person(s) or group.
- (c) Consideration shall be given for the construction of roads for residential access provided:
 - (i) the land has been services with the appropriate utilities;
 - (ii) a permanent residence has been established on the property wherein access has been requested;

PAGE 2 - ROAD CONSTRUCTION POLICY

- (d) Construction outside of the road allowance shall be generally accepted when:
 - the construction is necessary to meet the design, specifications and standards as determined by the Manager of Public Works;
 - (ii) the construction along the road allowance is not cost effective;
 - the Municipal District of Mackenzie No. 23 derives either an Economic and/or Social benefit from the resulting development.

All projects approved by the Municipal District shall be based on the following priority, based on the available funding:

FIRST PRIORITY----

ACCESS TO AGRICULTURAL LANDS

SECOND PRIORITY----

ROADS WHEREIN A SOCIAL/ECONOMIC BENEFIT

EXISTS

THIRD PRIORITY----

RESIDENTIAL ACCESS

Council reserves the right to modify the priority of a project when the distribution of costs for the construction of a road are presented as a cost shared project. Subject to the discretion of M.D. Council the upgrading of any of the road infrastructure within the municipality may be given a higher priority.

- That Section 3.1 of Part Three, CONTROL OF DEVELOPMENT, be amended by adding, to the end of Subsection (2), Subsection (3) that shall read:
 - (3) No development, except for site preparation, shall be allowed on any property until an access to the property from a public road has been constructed and approved by the Municipal District of Mackenzie No.23.
 - 2. That this bylaw shall come into effect upon the passing of the third and final reading of this resolution.



Policy Statement and Guidelines

Existing roads within the Municipal District of Mackenzie require repair and rehabilitation work from time to time. Repair and rehabilitation priorities are hereby established as follows:

- 1. First priority will be to repair and rehabilitate roads where the integrity of the road is affected.
- Second priority will be to repair and rehabilitate roads by using the following criteria to determine road priorities:
 - a) Ongoing maintenance costs;
 - 1. gravel frequency;
 - 2. grading frequency; and
 - 3. excessive road width.
 - b) Condition of substructure culvert placement;
 - c) Soft spots;
 - d) Drainage issues;
 - e) Projections for long-term use of the roads; and
 - f) Road users local traffic, commercial, industrial.



Attached is the Primary and Secondary Highway Priority list that was established at the March 6, 2001 Regular Council Meeting.

DISCUSSION / OPTIONS / BENEFITS / DISADVANTAGES:

Bridge File No. 74193 on Rocky Lane Road west of the Boyer River First Nation is currently limited to a 3 tonne load therefore it cannot be crossed by school buses and trucks. The Fort Vermilion School Division has requested that the bridge be upgraded, as their buses have to detour around the bridge at this time. This bridge has become an emergency issue.

RECOMMENDED ACTION (by originator):

That Motion 01-135 be rescinded and that the Highway and Bridge Priority list be established as follows:

- 1. Upgrade of Bridge File No. 74193 on Rocky Lane Road west of the Boyer River First Nation.
- 2. Upgrading of Primary Highway 88, including bridge structures and pavement.

BACKGROUND / PROPOSAL:

During 2000, Day Labour equipment rates were established through the bidding system. Under this system, the lowest bidder received the work for the season. In order to share the work among all the equipment owners, the policy was revised in October of 2000 to set one standard rate and all equipment worked for the same rate. The approximate price increase from 2000 to 2001 for equipment rates is 19%.

DISCUSSION / OPTIONS / BENEFITS / DISADVANTAGES:

Policy PW018 – Hiring of Private Equipment replaces Policy PW002. The only significant difference between the two policies is the rate at which the M.D. pays Day Labour equipment. The current policy states that the contractor is paid 100% of Alberta Roadbuilders Heavy Equipment Association's Rates. Policy PW018 changes that rate to 90% of the current years Alberta Roadbuilders Heavy Equipment Association's Rate.



Purpose

To establish a procedure and standards for the hiring of private equipment to complete municipal work exclusive of the gravelling and re-gravelling program.

This policy rescinds and replaces Policy PW002.

Policy Statement and Guidelines

From time to time the municipality requires equipment, which it does not own, for municipal work. The municipality shall usually go to the private sector to hire this equipment.

Private equipment shall be defined as any equipment which is owned and operated by an individual, partnership, or corporation other than the Municipal District of Mackenzie No. 23.

Once per year, usually each spring, the municipality shall advertise for the "Registration for Day Labour Equipment." Every interested individual, partnership, or corporation may register their equipment at any time during the year. This listing of equipment shall be the first source of equipment to be hired when privately owned equipment is required for work within the Municipal District of Mackenzie. This equipment shall be paid 90% of the most current year's Alberta Roadbuilders Heavy Equipment Association's Rates. Where practical, Administration is to ensure that all equipment owners receive equal opportunity to work for the Municipal District of Mackenzie No. 23.

Contractors and suppliers shall be hired only if they have no outstanding accounts with the municipality and are not involved in any legal action with the Municipal District of Mackenzie No. 23.

A list of all equipment shall be prepared for public information in accordance with the Freedom of Information and Protection of Privacy Act.

Purpose

Policy Statement and Guidelines

From time to time the municipality requires equipment which it does not own to work on projects. The municipality will usually go to the private sector to hire this equipment.

Private equipment shall be defined as any equipment which is owned and operated by an individual, partnership, or company other than the Municipal District of Mackenzie No. 23.

Once per year, usually each spring, the municipality will advertise for the "Registration for Day Labour Equipment." Every interested individual, partnership, or company shall have the opportunity to register the equipment that they own. This listing of equipment will be the first source of equipment that is to be hired when privately owned equipment is required for projects within the Municipal District of Mackenzie. This equipment will be paid according to the most current year's Alberta Roadbuilders Heavy Equipment Association's Rates. Where practical Administration is to ensure that all equipment owners receive equal opportunity to earn monies by working for the Municipal District of Mackenzie No. 23.

A contractor or supplier shall not be hired if they are in arrears, on any account, to the municipality. As well, they shall not be hired if they are initiating or involved in a legal action involving the Municipal District of Mackenzie No. 23.

A list of all equipment shall be prepared for staff and the public's information.

Any individual, partnership or corporation who purchases equipment, after the tender closure and wishes to list it with the municipality may do so, by providing a list of the equipment to the Municipal District of Mackenzie No. 23. Such equipment will be paid 100% of the Alberta Roadbuilders Rate.
