The cost of policing is climbing out of reach for towns and cities, say civic politicians who complain Alberta spends less on fighting crime than any other province.

"They just can't afford it," said Fairview Mayor Jean Charchuk, a member of a task force studying policing for the Alberta Urban Municipalities Association.

She cited the example of High Prairie, which spends nearly half its budget for 12 RCMP officers.

The task force's first report released this month examines policing in 63 communities that use RCMP. The group will focus next month on Edmonton, Calgary and other municipalities that have their own police forces.

The report recommends the provincial government improve the level of policing it provides, to make it comparable to other provinces. To illustrate "the inadequacy of funding," the report said Alberta ranks third-last among provinces for number of police officers per 100,000 people. There are 154 officers per 100,000 in Alberta, compared with 188 per 100,000 in Quebec, the top-rated province, and 143 in lowest-ranked Newfoundland.

In Newfoundland, policing costs are paid for by the province (78.5 per cent) and federal government (21.5 per cent), according to AUMA figures. For the 63 Alberta municipalities that use RCMP, the province pays 17.6 per cent of the cost, while towns and cities pay 74.6 per cent. The federal government contributes 7.8 per cent.

"We pay the bulk of policing in this province and for a rich province, that's not too good," Charchuk said.

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Although the AUMA report says there is no clear link between funding and crime rates, "there still appears to be a link between police funding in Alberta and the workload experienced by Alberta's police officers," says the document. It has been distributed along with a survey to municipalities so the

AUMA can decide on a course of action.

The report suggests a scenario of undermanned rural police swamped by calls, especially in booming municipalities.

Police officers in all 63 Alberta communities investigated more crimes than the national average. In 49 Alberta towns and cities, police handled twice as many offences per officer as the national average.

"There is a heavy workload for them and I don't know how we'll address that," Charchuk said.

She said Fairview is sometimes left without police presence when officers investigate crimes in neighbouring towns. "Everybody knows when they're not in town, so that's when the incidents happen."

The task force adds that communities such as Fort McMurray are mushrooming in population and in the workload for police.

Forming a provincial police force was not discussed in the report.

Jean Olynyk, Alberta Solicitor General spokeswoman, said the department wouldn't comment on the report until it has officially received it.

In another recommendation, municipalities also want to create an emergency pool of money that towns could draw on to help pay for investigating costly crimes such as murders. Fairview was hit with a \$46,000 bill plus RCMP overtime expenses when a local doctor was slain in 1999.

Although Edmonton was not included in the report, it also faces rising costs to enforce provincial and federal laws such as new bike-helmet legislation, said Bruce Duncan, the city's manager of intergovernmental affairs.

Whether the report will fuel the city's drive to share policing with its surrounding municipalities is unclear.

But Coun. Ed Gibbons said it's unlikely since policing is one of the most contentious issues among the city's neighbours when it comes to finding a way to cut costs in delivering services among the 22 municipalities in the capital region.

"They all grumble about what they think about their RCMP police force throughout the province, yet you talk about having Edmonton's police force as the regional, and feathers go up all over the place. It's

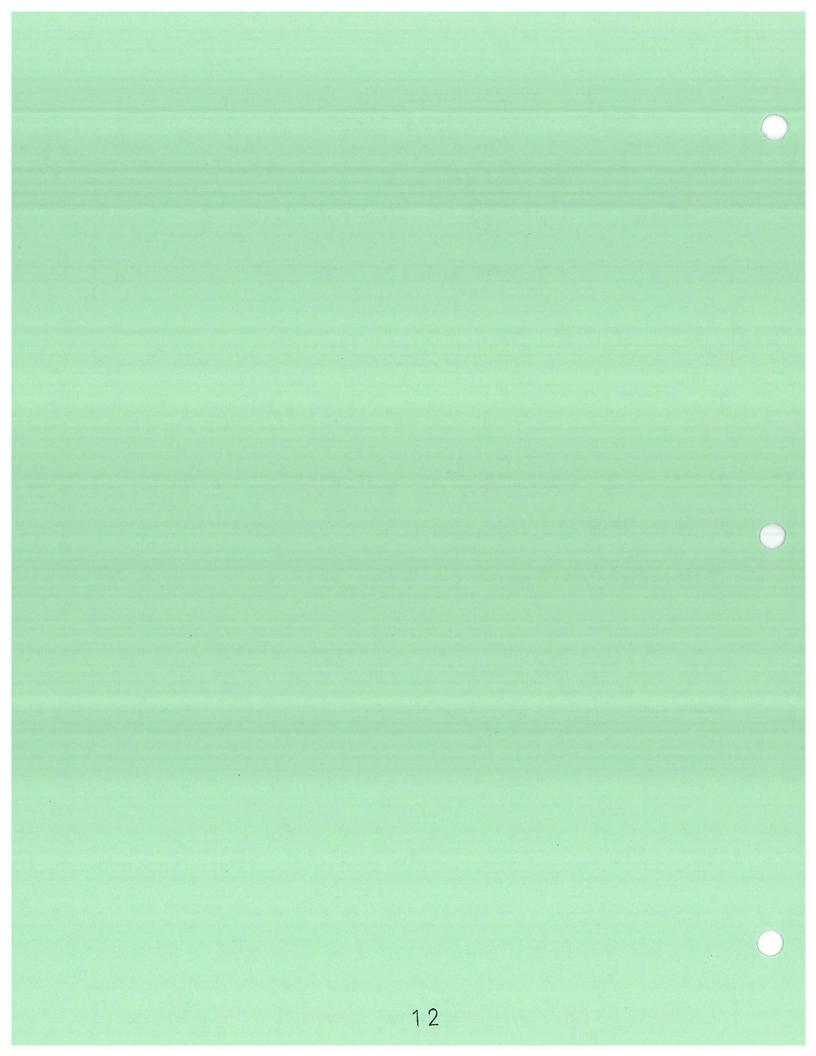

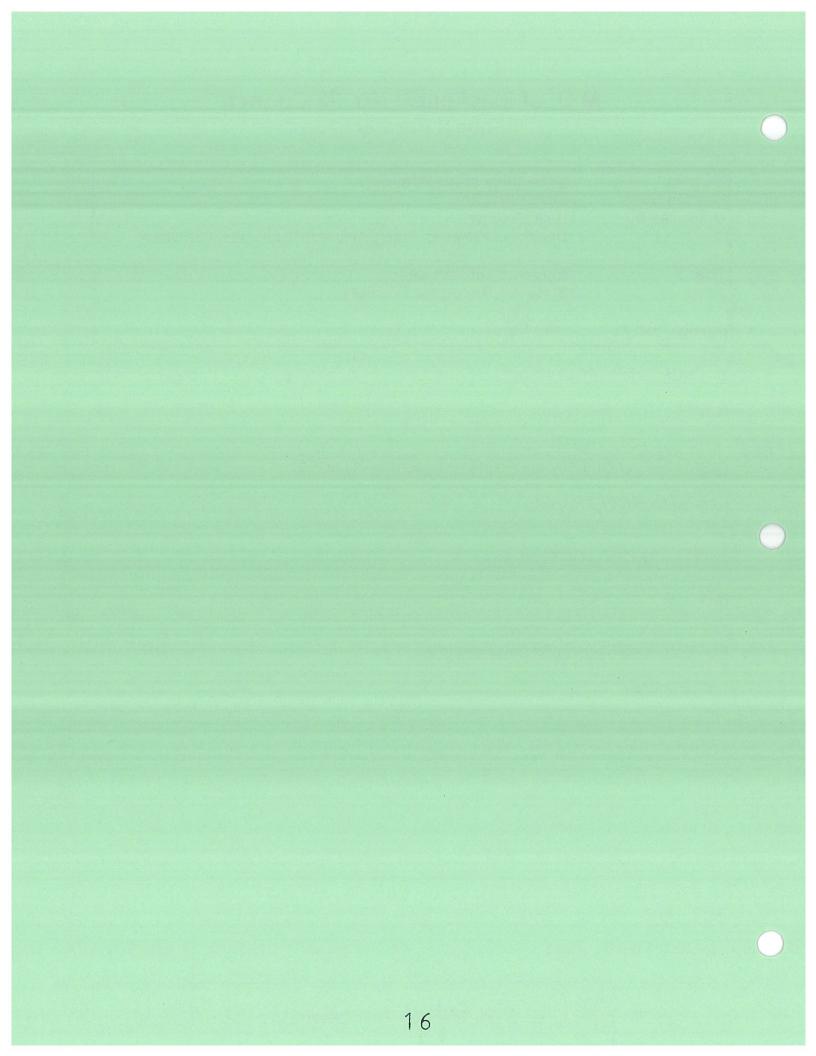

- 1. Attended various staff meetings to prepare Budget documents for Council.
- 2. Started review of drainage projects list received from Chris Kelland. The aim will be to do a number of the ones with minor work as road maintenance projects.
- Inspected a number of ratepayer concern items relating to blading of driveways. It appears that the persons with concerns do not want a snow ridge of any height on their driveway. This will be addressed later this year when the snow and ice control policy is reviewed.
- 4. Attended two meetings of the Joint Work Site Health and Safety Committee for the M.D. of Mackenzie #23.
- 5. Attended Inter-Municipal Development Plan meeting with MD and Town of High Level Administrative staff to review Terms of Reference for Councils to review.
- 6. Attended teleconference meeting with Personnel Consultant to review Collective Agreement.

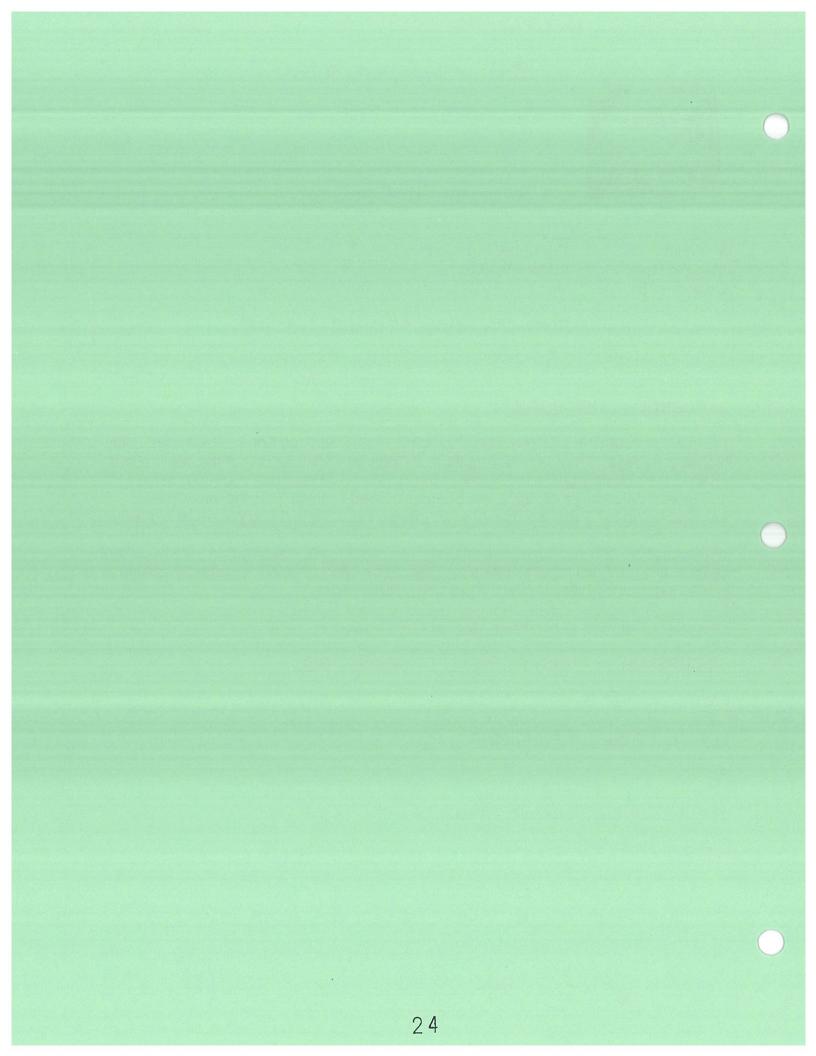

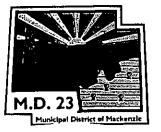

Re: Proposed Destination Signage for the Hamlet of La Crete

Thank you for your letter dated January 25, 2002. The primary purpose of Alberta Transportation's guide sign system is to direct motorists, unfamiliar with the area, along the highway system to their specific destinations. While the department understands the desire of communities to be included on destination signage, it is not possible to indicate all destinations on all intersecting routes. In determining which destinations are listed, the department takes into consideration:

- community size;
- geographical location;
- relationship to the highway network; and
- the nature of the traffic on each particular section of the highway.

The intersection of the Highway 88 Connector road and Highway 88 with Highway 697 has fewer turning movements than at communities between this access and Slave Lake. Most of the traffic travelling to La Crete on the provincial highway system does so via the junction of Highway 88 and Highway 697 west of Fort Vermilion. The relatively low turn count at the Highway 88 Connector and the fact that the Highway 88 Connector is not part of the provincial highway system affects the ranking of this location in relation to other potential destinations on this section of Highway 88.

The junction of Highway 35 and Highway 697 is approximately 85 kilometers from La Crete. There are fewer turning movements than at communities between this intersection and Peace River and almost half of the vehicles turning are single unit trucks or tractor-trailer units. Commercial vehicles, like local traffic, are generally familiar with their routes.

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Because of the forgoing and the hamlet's relatively remote location in relation to the highways in question, Alberta Transportation does not consider the Hamlet of La Crete to be a key destination for the purposes of the department's guide signing system within the highway sections under discussion. Alberta Transportation has installed directional distance signs north and south of both the junction of Highway 35 and Highway 697 and the intersection of Highway 88 and the Highway 88 Connector road. The department is also reviewing a proposal that would allow municipalities to erect informational "YOU ARE HERE" route map signs in advance of their communities. If this proposal is approved, the route map sign would be erected, parallel to the highway, on a roadside pullout or rest area located on the correct side of the highway 35 south of the junction with Highway 697, but the department is reviewing the number and location of roadside pullouts across the province.

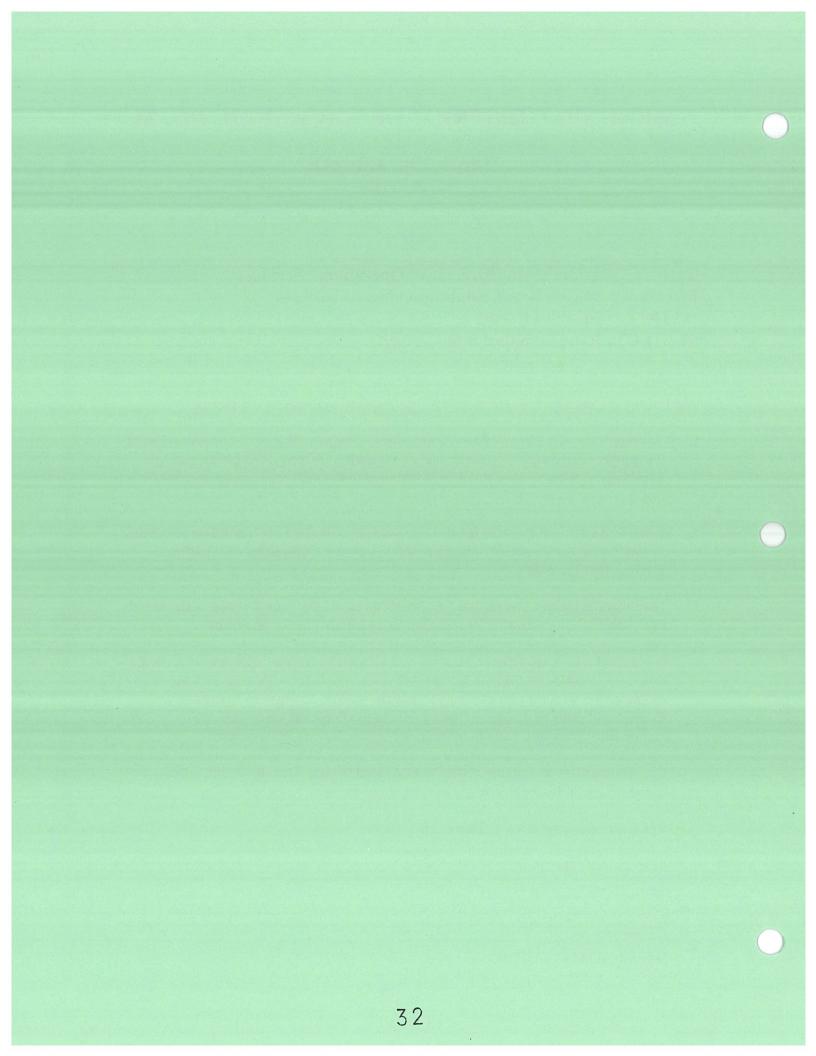

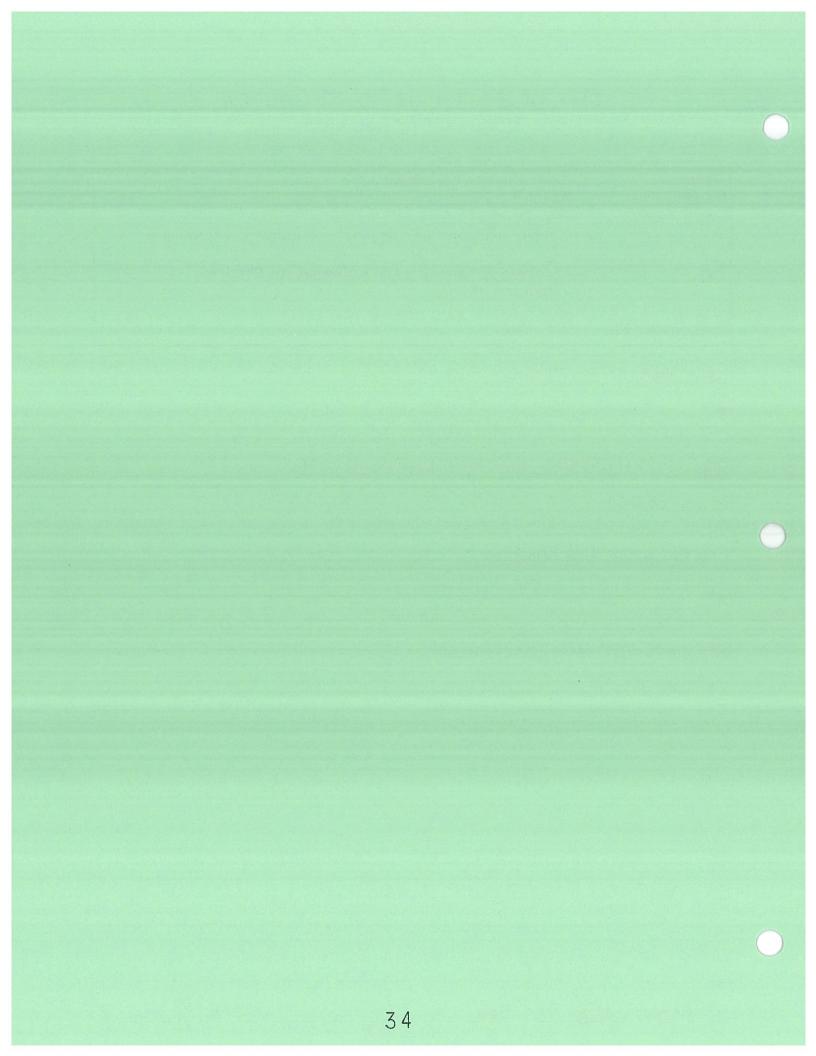

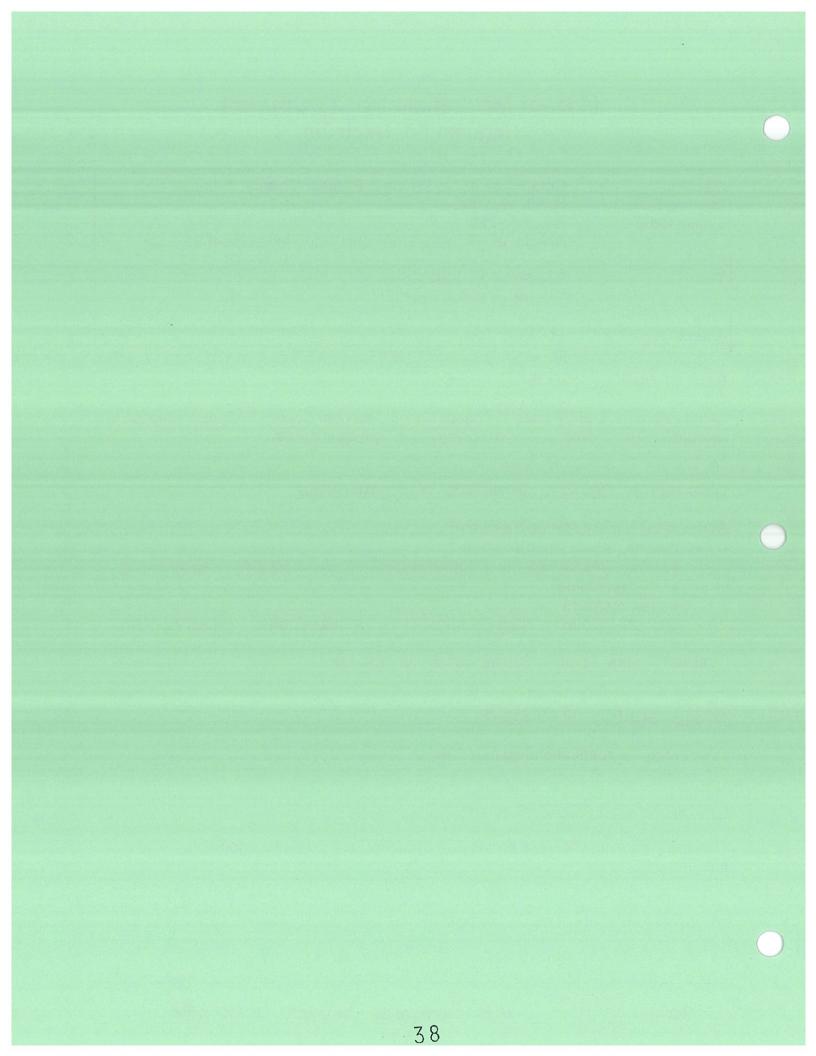

FOREST AND PRAIRIE PROTECTION ACT

WHEREAS many Alberta rural municipalities have large areas of green zone "Crown land" and white zone "developed land" within their boundaries;

AND WHEREAS most Alberta rural municipalities rely on volunteer fire services as their primary source of fire protection services;

AND WHEREAS volunteer fire services are mainly trained and equipped to deal with structure fires;

AND WHEREAS fires on Crown land or developed land may have an extensive duration and significant associated costs for equipment and services;

AND WHEREAS the Forest and Prairie Protection Act gives full responsibility to rural municipalities and the landowners for the costs of provincial assisted fire suppression;

AND WHEREAS municipalities and their landowners could face bankruptcy as a result of a major fire where the province assists with fire suppression.

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the Alberta Association of Municipal Districts and Counties urge the Government of Alberta to amend the Forest and Prairie Protection Act to remove-any responsibility from-municipal districts, counties and landowners (within the white zone) for the services, costs and expenses associated with provincial assisted fire suppression.

Background:

Municipal District of Mackenzie Council reviewed the concern brought forward by a rural resident (farmer) who had been charged for fire suppression by the province. The resident had not authorized the province to assist the municipal fire services.

Council attending a meeting where the Minister of Alberta Sustainable Resource Development was speaking left with the understanding that farmers would not be charged for fire suppression assistance from the province.

The issue has been raised informally at previous AAMD&C Conventions, primarily through the Reeve's meeting and through questions during the Ministerial Forum, but the AAMD&C has not received member direction on the issue, and thus has taken no formal action on the issue to date.

RESOLUTION NO. 5-01S was CARRIED AS AMENDED at the Spring 2001 AAMD&C Convention. The Resolution requests the Forest and Prairie Protection Act be amended to remove any responsibility from municipal districts and counties for the services, costs and expenses associated with fire suppression on Crown land.

This Resolution is to also remove the responsibility of provincial fire suppression costs for landowners within the white zone, thereby amending the Forest and Prairie Protection Act to remove all responsibility from municipal districts, counties and landowners on "developed land" (within the white zone).

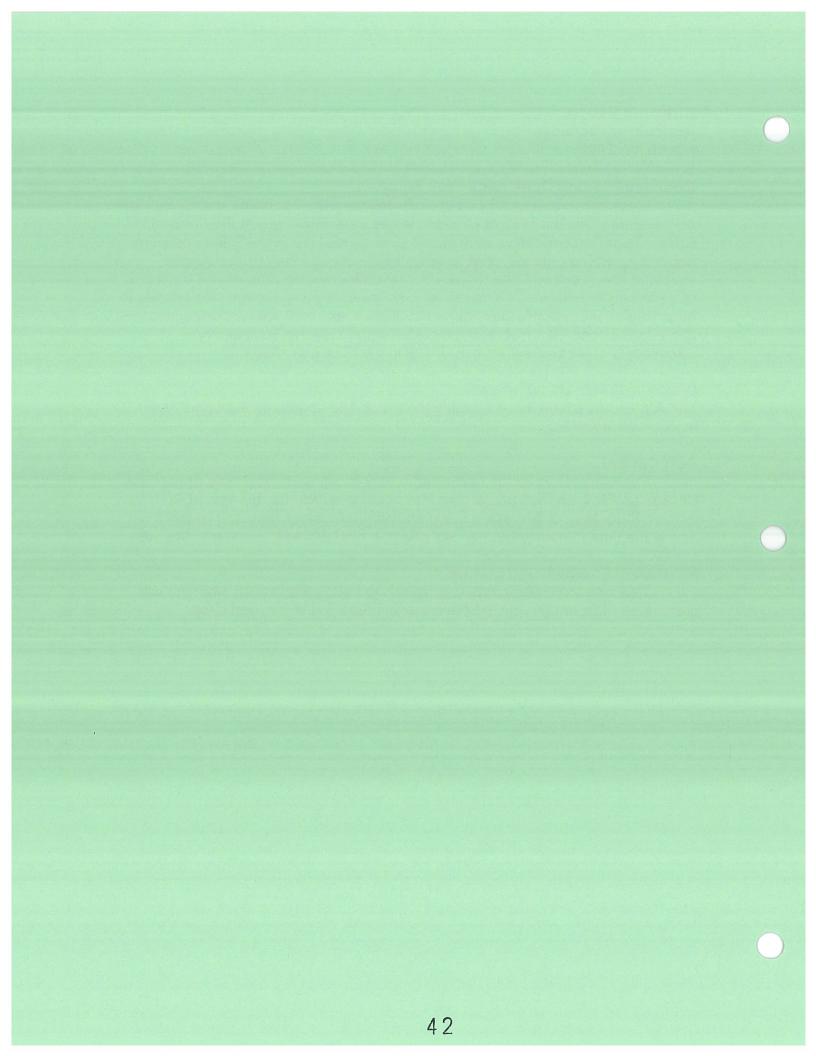

Recently appointed Executive Director of REDI, Randy Renauer, was in attendance at the meeting, and agreed that REDI could handle this.

Policy FIN018 (attached) has caused some differing opinions as to what was the intention and how to equitably determine the frontage charge to a commercial or industrial ratepayer. Administration has provided three options concerning the 100 Street road improvements.

Option 1 – Total Construction Cost \$2,950,000 for basic road construction, storm sewer, curb, gutter and sidewalks. The MD borrow the funds for either a 5 year or 10 year term and calculate the frontage charge for industrial and commercial areas at 30% of total cost. The attached schedule provides examples of the estimated annual frontage charge.

Option 2 – Construction Cost \$1,102,000 for storm sewer, curb, gutter and sidewalks. The MD borrow the funds for either a 5 year or 10 year term and calculate the frontage charge for industrial and commercial areas at 30% of total cost. The attached schedule provides examples of the estimated annual frontage charge.

Option 3 – Construction Cost \$560,000 for curb, gutter and sidewalks.

Legislation Reference Municipal Government Act, Sections 391-409

Purpose

To provide for the implementation of frontage to be assessed in all commercial and industrial areas for the installation of road improvements such as curb, gutter, pavement, sidewalks and storm sewer.

Policy Statement and Guidelines

The Municipal District of Mackenzie No. 23 recognizes the need for a Local Improvement Tax to be charged for the upgrading of roads and streets in the industrial and commercial areas within the hamlets. This Tax is needed to supplement the annual budget approvals so that all needed improvements can be made in a more timely manner. The percentage of assessment assigned to frontage is to be the specified percentage of the total project costs defined below. Theses assessment costs will then be evenly distributed amongst the frontage as provided in the Municipal Government Act. The following frontage assessments are to be used:

- 1) A 30% frontage assessment will be assessed to the landowners for projects initiated by the Municipal District of Mackenzie No. 23. This will be charged in accordance with the Municipal Government Act Division 7.
- 2) A 100% frontage assessment will be assessed to the landowners for projects initiated by petition to the Municipal District of Mackenzie No.2 3.

RESOLUTIONS AT A GLANCE

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RESOLUTION NO. 1-02S

LAKELAND COUNTY

FOREIGN OWNERSHIP OF LAND

REQUIRES SIMPLE MAJORITY

WHEREAS Alberta Pacific Forest Industries Inc. is currently urging the Government of Alberta to amend the Foreign Ownership of Land Regulations, to allow their firm to purchase and control agricultural and recreational lands in Alberta;

AND WHEREAS consideration is apparently being given to amend the Foreign Ownership of Land Regulations or provide exemptions under these regulations to address the request of Alberta Pacific Forest Industries Inc.;

AND WHEREAS these amendments or exemptions would clearly change the intent of the regulations, and would substantially change the longstanding policy of the Government of Alberta on reserving all ownership of agricultural and recreational lands for the citizens of Canada.

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the AAMD&C urge the Government of Alberta to maintain and enforce the existing provisions of the Foreign Ownership of Land Regulations, reserving ownership of land to Canadian citizens, and to refrain from granting any exemptions or substantive amendments which would allow foreign-owned corporations to obtain ownership of agricultural and recreational lands.

THIS RESOLUTION WAS NOT SUBMITTED FOR DISTRICT CONSIDERATION.

RESOLUTION NO. 1-02S Lakeland County Foreign Ownership of Land

BACKGROUND INFORMATION:

During the last several months, Alberta Pacific Forest Industries Inc. has presented proposals to rural and urban municipalities throughout northern Alberta, regarding the need to provide long-term sustainability for the company's wood supplies. The company is proposing to achieve this through both long-term leases and land ownership, with a goal of obtaining 25,000 hectares of land in northeast Alberta.

Since Alberta Pacific Forest Industries Inc. is foreign-owned, the company is not allowed to purchase agricultural and recreational land, and is limited to twenty-year leases under the current Foreign Ownership of Land Regulations (enacted under the federal Citizenship Act and the Alberta Agricultural and Recreational Land Ownership Act). Therefore, the company has requested amendments to the regulations or exemptions from the regulations, to allow Alberta Pacific Forest Industries Inc. and similar companies to purchase and control agricultural and recreational lands in Alberta.

The long-standing policy of Alberta has been to reserve such lands for citizens of Canada, to protect and preserve our agricultural and natural heritage. Changing the regulations would allow for foreign ownership of land and would possibly result in the following:

- 1) Foreign corporate competition for agricultural land would have an adverse effect environmentally, socially and economically on traditional family farms, which are privately owned and operated agricultural production systems.
- 2) It would set a precedent to allow other foreign industries access and ownership of agricultural and recreational lands.

AAMD&C BACKGROUND INFORMATION:

The AAMD&C has no resolutions currently in effect with respect to this issue, and has not directly addressed issues relating to foreign ownership of land for many years.

RESOLUTION NO. 2-02S

SPRING 2001

STRATHCONA COUNTY

RECREATION FACILITY INFRASTRUCTURE

REQUIRES SIMPLE MAJORITY

WHEREAS municipalities have an aging recreation facility infrastructure that was put in place with assistance from provincial funding programs such as the Major Community Recreation (MCR) and Community Recreation/Cultural (CRC) Grants;

AND WHEREAS the Province of Alberta and the Alberta Recreation and Parks Association completed a Recreation Infrastructure Study which found that over \$500 million is required to rehabilitate this infrastructure framework;

AND WHEREAS funding from the existing Community Facility Enhancement Program (CFEP) and Community Lottery Board program is insufficient to address these needs and to save this recreation infrastructure from total collapse, particularly when spread over so many smaller, uncoordinated and unplanned community projects.

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the Alberta Association of Municipal Districts & Counties urge the Government of Alberta to review funding priorities so that funds can be made available to save the recreation infrastructure currently in place, before facilities are lost that could have been preserved through prompt action.

THIS RESOLUTION WAS NOT SUBMITTED FOR DISTRICT CONSIDERATION.

BACKGROUND INFORMATION:

Recreation infrastructure in most Alberta communities was built with the assistance of provincial grant funds. The Major Community Recreation Grant and the Community Recreation/Cultural Grant helped build the pools, arenas, curling rinks and halls that we have in the province today. Since those grant programs were available in the 1970's and 1980's, the facilities they helped to build are now growing old.

RESOLUTION NO. 2-025 Strathcona County Recreation Facility Infrastructure

BACKGROUND INFORMATION (CONTINUED):

In a study of the recreation infrastructure in Alberta (1997-2000), the Alberta Recreation and Parks Association found that there were 56 indoor pools, 49 outdoor pools, 238 arenas, and 137 curling rinks in Alberta. Of those facilities, more than 77% will be over 25 years old by the year 2005. The value of this inventory is well over \$500 million (current dollars).

The study found a variety of problems with these old buildings, such as permanent ice lenses under the floors of arenas, corrosion in many of the buildings due to humidity problems, roof and wall problems from over loading, and poor ventilation and insulation.

Many other issues are also impacting the future of this infrastructure. These factors include population migration, an aging population and new trends in recreation, and are influencing demands for recreation programming.

Funds are needed not only to address the decay found in many of these buildings but also to refurbish, replace and revitalize the opportunities they are designed to provide. If steps are not taken to save the viable infrastructure that is already available in many Alberta communities, the opportunities they provide now and the potential they would have if they were rebuilt for the future will be lost to the wrecking ball.

AAMD&C BACKGROUND INFORMATION:

The AAMD&C has no resolutions currently in effect which specifically call for increased funding to preserve recreation facilities. However, AAMD&C delegates have endorsed a number of resolutions in recent years which are consistent with the intent of this resolution.

- Resolutions 7-01S and ER2-01F urge the provincial government to increase the funding made available through Community Lottery Boards in support of, among other things, local recreation facilities.
- Resolution 8-01S calls for the Community Lottery Board program to be amended to allow funding of operating costs for recreational facilities.

RESOLUTION NO. 3-02S

SPRING 2001

STRATHCONA COUNTY

MUNICIPAL RECREATION/TOURISM PROGRAM REINSTATEMENT

REQUIRES SIMPLE MAJORITY

WHEREAS urban residents travel to rural Alberta to visit lakes, streams, trails, campsites and other tourist attractions;

AND WHEREAS the only tax base available to rural municipalities to provide services to these visitors is rural property tax;

AND WHEREAS several years ago the Province of Alberta suspended any new funding for the Municipal Recreation and Tourism Areas Program site development grants.

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the Alberta Association of Municipal Districts & Counties urge the Government of Alberta to reinstate some form of funding to assist rural municipalities in developing and operating minor tourist destination sites for the good of all Alberta residents.

THIS RESOLUTION WAS NOT SUBMITTED FOR DISTRICT CONSIDERATION.

BACKGROUND INFORMATION:

In the mid 1980's, the Province of Alberta consolidated a number of provincial programs into a single grant program designed to assist rural jurisdictions in coping with the influx of recreational users to a variety of recreational settings in rural Alberta. The "Access to Pothole Fisheries Program" and the "Reservoir Access Program" were two of the programs that were absorbed by the new initiative, first called the Municipal Recreation Areas Program and subsequently renamed the Municipal Recreation/Tourism Areas Program (MRTA).

RESOLUTION NO. 3-02S Strathcona County Municipal Recreation/Tourism Program Reinstatement

BACKGROUND INFORMATION (CONTINUED):

The terms of the grant initiative were simple. The Province would empower rural jurisdictions to construct a rural recreation area (usually a campsite) with a \$100,000 capital grant and would then provide an operating grant of \$20,000 a year for 25 years.

The program was very successful in providing rural jurisdictions with a means of coping with the influx of urban dwellers that were seeking to camp or picnic in the countryside, but in most cases were not being charged a cost recovery fee for the services they were getting. The provision of the capital grant and the associated operating funds relieved the fiscal stress caused by these urban demands on rural resources.

In the early 1990's, the capital portion of this program was terminated and the operating funds were reduced by 50%. In the mid-1990's the operating funds were cut off entirely. Operating funds (at 40% of the original funding level) were reinstated after resolutions by the Alberta Association of Municipal Districts & Counties and Alberta Recreation and Parks Association focused on the problems created by the total loss of funds.

The Alberta Association of Municipal Districts & Counties should encourage the reinstatement of the MRTA Program, as it provides tax relief for rural governments beset by urban dwellers seeking outdoor recreation opportunities. These opportunities do foster spin-off service businesses like gas stations, food outlets and other forms of lodging that help diversify the rural economy. The financial commitment need not be large, as long as there is some process to direct funds to the most needy jurisdictions in the rural parts of the province.

AAMD&C BACKGROUND INFORMATION:

The AAMD&C has no resolutions currently in effect with respect to the MRTA program. A number of resolutions on this subject were brought forward to AAMD&C Conventions in the mid-1990's, however all of those resolutions have since lapsed.

Resolution No. 4-02S

MUNICIPAL DISTRICT OF TABER

BILL C-15B - CRUELTY TO ANIMALS

REQUIRES 3/5 MAJORITY

WHEREAS Bill C-15B, an Act to Amend the Criminal Code (Cruelty to Animals and Firearms) and the Firearms Act, will provide protection for animals from abuse and neglect;

AND WHEREAS current provisions within the Criminal Code of Canada already provide adequate regulations and penalties in this regard;

AND WHEREAS removing animal cruelty offenses from Part XI of the Criminal Code (property crime) will mean the loss of important "legal justification" and "colour of right" defenses, and will give impetus towards substantial and potentially unreasonable expansion of "animal rights";

AND WHEREAS the proposed re-definition of "animal" is too vague and will lead to unnecessary and frivolous nuisance lawsuits;

AND WHEREAS any person involved in the production of animals for food, food products, leisure, sport or research will be potentially exposed to such nuisance lawsuits.

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the Alberta Association of Municipal Districts & Counties urge the Government of Canada to revise Bill C15-B and the proposed amendments to the Criminal Code (Cruelty to Animals and Firearms) and the Firearms Act by inserting the following additional clause as section 20(2) of the Act: RESOLUTION NO. 4-02S MUNICIPAL DISTRICT OF TABER BILL C15B – CRUELTY TO ANIMALS

20(2) Exceptions: Necessary Measures. For the purpose of clause 20(1), no injury or serious physical pain is caused unnecessarily if it is a reasonable necessary means of achieving any of the following purposes:

- (a) identification, medical treatment, spaying or neutering;
- (b) provision of food or other animal products; .
- (c) hunting, trapping, fishing, and other sporting activities conducted in accordance with the lawful rules relating to them;
- (d) pest, predator or disease control;
- (e) protection of persons or property;
- (f) scientific research; and
- (g) disciplining or training of an animal.

ENDORSED BY THE FOOTHILLS LITTLE BOW ASSOCIATION OF MUNICIPAL DISTRICTS AND COUNTIES.

BACKGROUND INFORMATION:

Many Canadians have been shocked by displays of cruelty to animals by their owners as portrayed in the popular media. In response, the Government of Canada has introduced *Bill C-15B*, an Act to Amend the Criminal Code (Cruelty to Animals) and the *Firearms Act*.

According to information supplied by the Department of Justice, a premise for the tougher law is that all animals feel pain and are deserving of legal protection from negligence or intentional cruelty.

Specific changes to the Criminal Code will:

(a) consolidate provisions related to cruelty to animals and no longer treat offences as property crimes;

RESOLUTION NO. 4-02S MUNICIPAL DISTRICT OF TABER BILL C15B - CRUELTY TO ANIMALS

BACKGROUND INFORMATION (CONTINUED):

- (b) make it illegal to brutally or viciously kill animals;
- (c) raise the penalty for intentional cruelty to a maximum of five years imprisonment with no set limit for fines;
- (d) provide that anyone convicted of animal cruelty can be prohibited from owning animals for any period of time a judge considers appropriate; and
- (e) give judges the authority to order anyone found guilty of animal cruelty to pay restitution to the animal welfare organization that cared for the animal.

Although Alberta rural municipalities support legislation protecting animals from undue neglect and injury, in this case the possibility of frivolous nuisance lawsuits and unnecessary criminal charges as a result of this legislation will far outweigh any purported benefits.

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Provisions currently exist within Sections 444, 445, 446 and 447 of the Criminal Code of Canada that deal directly with the whole cruelty to animal issue. The current laws protecting the welfare of animals are sufficient, and have withstood challenges in the courts. The amendments to the Criminal Code that are proposed by Bill C-15B go far beyond the original intention of the Bill, specifically:

- (a) removal of cruelty to animal offences from the property crime classification, and creation of a new category of offence for animal cruelty, will give significant impetus towards substantial expansion of "animal rights"; and
- (b) the term "brutally or viciously kill animals" leaves too much room for interpretation. Although some leeway was allowed in the interpretation by including the word "necessary", the interpretation is nevertheless too broad for comfort.

AAMD&C BACKGROUND INFORMATION:

The AAMD&C has no resolutions currently in effect with respect to this issue. However, the AAMD&C Board has written to various federal Ministers in each of the past two years to express serious concerns with the proposed animal cruelty legislation. **RESOLUTION NO. 5-02S**

SADDLE HILLS COUNTY

AUPE SUCCESSORSHIP RIGHTS

REQUIRES SIMPLE MAJORITY

WHEREAS numerous Improvement Districts were incorporated in the early-mid 1990's by order of the Government of Alberta;

AND WHEREAS in spite of numerous ministerial assurances to the contrary, transitional language in the previous Municipal Government Act proved inadequate to save the new municipalities harmless from continuing provincial obligations;

AND WHEREAS although these recently incorporated municipalities have followed transitional instructions from the Department of Municipal Affairs to the letter, they have still been exposed to substantial negative financial implications;

AND WHEREAS these municipalities have incurred considerable costs to date in (thus far) unsuccessful efforts to resolve this issue;

AND WHEREAS prior promises from the Department of Municipal Affairs to resolve the issue and to cover all municipal costs stemming from this oversight have yet to be honoured.

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the Alberta Association of Municipal Districts and Counties urge the Government of Alberta to resolve the "AUPE Successorship Rights Issue" speedily, and at no cost to the affected municipalities.

ENDORSED BY THE NORTHERN ASSOCIATION OF MUNICIPAL DISTRICTS AND COUNTIES.

RESOLUTION NO. 5-02S SADDLE HILLS COUNTY AUPE SUCCESSORSHIP RIGHTS ISSUE

BACKGROUND INFORMATION:

No background information has been submitted by the sponsoring municipality in support of this resolution.

AAMD&C BACKGROUND INFORMATION:

The AAMD&C has no resolutions currently in effect with respect to this issue, and has not previously addressed the issue of union successor rights in any formal manner.

RESOLUTION NO. 6-02S

SPRING 2001 CARRIED COST

MUNICIPAL DISTRICT OF CLEAR HILLS

RIGHT TO OWN AND USE FIREARMS

REQUIRES 3/5 MAJORITY

WHEREAS the Government of Canada continues to interfere with hunting, trapping recreational target shooting, firearms collecting and historical firearms activities through federal legislation such as Bills C-17 and C-68 (Firearms Act), by imposing restrictive firearms and criminal legislation upon methods and tools used to carry out and enjoy this culture and these traditions;

AND WHEREAS the methods and tools used for these purposes are part and parcel of this historically established culture and heritage and thus not negotiable to control or regulation by government as prescribed in the Canadian Charter Of Rights And Freedoms (section #27 - General), which states that "This Charter shall be interpreted in a manner consistent with the preservation and enhancement of the multicultural heritage of Canadians.";

AND WHEREAS the federal legislation existing in C-17 and C-68 clearly infringes upon Canadians' rights and freedoms to life and liberty, violating Section 7 of legal rights in the "CANADIAN CHARTER OF RIGHTS AND FREEDOMS" by creating cumbersome, expensive absurd requirements for its citizens, and forcing hunters, trappers, recreational target shooters, firearms collectors and historical firearms activities to change their culture and traditions towards ideals maintained by the political elite currently in power.

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that that the AAMD&C urge the Government of Alberta to enact an Alberta Western Firearms Heritage And Historical Act which states in part:

RESOLUTION NO. 6-02S MUNICIPAL DISTRICT OF CLEAR HILLS FIREARMS

"Alberta residents shall have the right to own, enjoy and use firearms in a responsible manner, and no law shall infringe upon heritage, culture and other historical rights relating to hunting, trapping, recreational target shooters, firearms collectors and historical firearms activities, and if necessary, the Government of Alberta will legally challenge any aforementioned infringements and will, after a referendum, invoke the "notwithstanding clause" so described within the Canadian Charter of Rights and Freedoms with respect to any law which infringes upon the aforementioned western culture and historical heritage of individual Alberta residents."

ENDORSED BY THE NORTHERN ASSOCIATION OF MUNICIPAL DISTRICTS AND COUNTIES.

BACKGROUND INFORMATION:

The sponsoring municipality has not provided the AAMD&C with any background information in support of this resolution.

AAMD&C BACKGROUND INFORMATION:

The intent of this resolution is consistent with two previously endorsed resolutions (Resolutions 15-98F and 12-01S) which both seek to prevent federal gun control legislation from coming into effect in Alberta.

It should be noted that the AAMD&C reviewed the proposal for an *Alberta Western Firearms Heritage and Historical Act* when the matter was first brought forward in early 2002 by the Responsible Firearms Owners of Alberta.

The AAMD&C's analysis indicates that this proposal would not have the desired effect of establishing a provincial right to invoke the notwithstanding clause with respect to federal gun control legislation.

RESOLUTION NO. 7-02S

SPRING 2001

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COUNTY OF TWO HILLS

TAX EXEMPT FUEL USER PROGRAM

REQUIRES SIMPLE MAJORITY

WHEREAS the Alberta Government is considering the elimination of the existing Tax Exempt Fuel User (TEFU) Program;

AND WHEREAS elimination of this program would effectively impose a substantial tax increase on Alberta municipal governments;

AND WHEREAS, unlike Alberta businesses, municipal governments in Alberta have not received any meaningful financial savings flowing from the implementation of the recommendations of the Alberta Business Tax Review Committee, but will instead experience a net tax increase if the TEFU program is eliminated;

AND WHEREAS provincial program adjustments and funding cuts over the past decade have made it increasingly difficult for municipalities to engage in rational long-term planning and effective budgeting on behalf of local ratepayers;

AND WHEREAS the elimination of the TEFU program would only add to a long list of negative and cumulative impacts that municipalities have absorbed as a result of provincial downloading and budget-cutting;

AND WHEREAS past experience suggests that cuts to programs that benefit municipalities are rarely if ever reversed when the Government of Alberta's financial health improves;

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the Alberta Association of Municipal Districts & Counties urge the Government of Alberta to maintain the current Tax Exempt Fuel User Program, and ensure that Alberta municipalities continue to receive at least the current level of financial savings available under the program.

THIS RESOLUTION WAS NOT SUBMITTED FOR DISTRICT CONSIDERATION.

RESOLUTION NO. 7-02S COUNTY OF TWO HILLS TAX EXEMPT FUEL USER PROGRAM

BACKGROUND INFORMATION:

The Tax Exempt Fuel User (TEFU) program provides tax exemptions and rebates on fuel used off-road for commercial purposes, or by municipalities and education institutions (again, off-road use only). Tax exemption numbers are issued for vehicles which are not required to be licensed or registered for on-road use (e.g. heavy machinery for road construction or logging), thus allowing these vehicles to use tax-exempt marked fuel. Alternatively, commercial operators, municipalities, etc. may apply for rebates of tax paid on clear fuel, for that portion of fuel used "off-road" by licensed vehicles.

The program currently provides benefits of some \$120-\$130 million per year: \$75-\$85 million accrues to users of Fuel Tax Exemption numbers, who are able to purchase taxexempt marked fuel; and \$45 million is paid out in the form of rebates.

In 2000, the Alberta Government's Business Tax Review Committee recommended that the TEFU program be amended, to eliminate the rebate portion of the program. Apparently, the Government is now considering the impacts of canceling the entire program.

Elimination of the TEFU program would effectively impose a substantial tax increase on Alberta municipalities. Rough estimates suggest that an average rural municipality receives approximately \$20,000 per year in TEFU rebates, and approximately \$90,200 per year in savings through the tax exemption portion of the program (average consumption of about 820,000 litres of marked diesel fuel each year, with marked diesel currently available at about 11 cents per litre less than clear diesel). The net impact of eliminating the TEFU program would therefore exceed \$110,000 per year in additional fuel tax burden for an average rural municipality.

AAMD&C BACKGROUND INFORMATION:

The AAMD&C has no resolutions currently in effect with respect to this program. However, the AAMD&C has met with Alberta Revenue officials to express concerns with the proposed elimination of the TEFU program, and has followed up that meeting with a formal letter reiterating the importance of this program to Alberta municipalities. **RESOLUTION NO. 8-02S**

COUNTY OF STETTLER

AMENDMENTS TO THE RAILWAY (ALBERTA) ACT

REQUIRES 3/5 MAJORITY

WHEREAS the Railway (Alberta) Act, Part 2 Operation of Railways, does not state that rail lines are to be used for the purposes of rail traffic only;

AND WHEREAS there are numerous instances throughout Alberta where rail lines are used solely for the purposes of long -term rail car storage;

AND WHEREAS long-term storage should be defined as including individual cars stored at the same location for greater than thirty (30) days;

AND WHEREAS the long-term storage of rail cars degrades the property of those persons living adjacent to these lines;

AND WHEREAS stored rail cars may contain substances that could be potentially hazardous to the health of Albertans.

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the Alberta Association of Municipal Districts and Counties urge the Government of Alberta to amend the Railway (Alberta) Act to state that railways shall not utilize rail lines solely for the purpose of long-term rail car storage.

ENDORSED BY THE CENTRAL ASSOCIATION OF MUNICIPAL DISTRICTS AND COUNTIES

BACKGROUND INFORMATION:

Grain elevator closures throughout Alberta have caused numerous rail lines to be abandoned. In some instances, however, the operators of the rail lines slated for abandonment have chosen strategic lines close to major industrial centres to be utilized for the purposes of rail car storage. This provides the operators with a significant amount of revenue with little public outcry, as the cars are being stored in rural areas as opposed to the urban or industrialized centres.

So today in rural Alberta, there are now entire lines that were once used for grain cars, that have now become storage yards for tank cars containing such things as butane, propane, anhydrous ammonia, etc. However, for residents living adjacent to these lines, the use and enjoyment of their land has been compromised. If a ratepayer is unfortunate enough to live along a "rail car storage", they are faced with the prospect of looking at kilometre upon kilometre of cars parked adjacent to their property, cars that are often smeared with graffiti. Adding to their stress is that the resident does not know what lies inside of the cars, or what potential health hazards could result if the substances were allowed to escape through an accident or an act of vandalism. While these cars are designated as empty, present regulations allow for up to 2% residual material to be left in the cars (approximately 2000 litres).

Rural municipalities facing this problem are looking for the Government of Alberta to provide leadership on this issue. Clearly, there have been winners and losers with respect to rail line closures throughout Alberta. It is bad enough that the winners received new grain terminals and industry that is still serviced by rail, while the losers are stuck with abandoned lines; now, some rural residents along abandoned rail lines are being subjected to living adjacent to a storage lot for rail cars.

AAMD&C BACKGROUND INFORMATION:

The AAMD&C has no resolutions currently in effect with respect to this issue. Although a number of previous resolutions have dealt with concerns regarding reclamation of abandoned rail lines, and maintenance of rail service in rural areas, no current resolutions have addressed the issue of utilizing inactive rail lines for storage of rail cars.

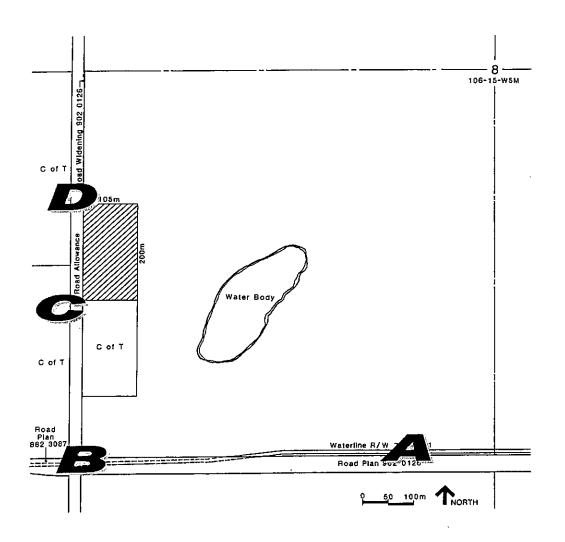


Property Location

RE: PROPOSED LAND USE BYLAW AMENDMENT: BYLAW No. 287/01

The purpose of this report is to provide the Municipal District of Mackenzie No. 23 with comments and recommendation on a proposed amendment to the existing Land-Use Bylaw that will allow for a rezoning of the property known as part of SW 8-106-15-W5M from Agricultural District 1 "A1" to Rural Country Residential "RC". The intent of the amendment is to allow for the subdivision of subject 5-acre parcel.

RECOMMENDATION

MMSA staff recommends that the application to rezone the subject property, from Agricultural District 1 "A1" to Rural Country Residential "RC" be <u>TABLED</u> pending the submission of a soil/land evaluation report and a rural Area Structure Plan of the proposed development by the applicant.

DESCRIPTION OF SUBJECT APPLICATION

This bylaw amendment is pursuant to an application for rezoning submitted by Mr. Herman Banman of P.O. Box 177, La Crete, in November 19, 2001. The subject property is located 1 mile west of the Hamlet of La Crete (*see Exhibit A*). The quarter is currently under cultivation with the exception of a pond in the centre of the quarter and a low wet area in the north central portion of the quarter. There is an existing subdivided yard site along the west boundary of the quarter. The existing subdivision, to the north of applicant's farmstead, is located to the southwest corner of the quarter and south of March 6, 2002 Municipal District of Mackenzie No. 23 Paul Driedger, Director of Planning, Emergency, and Enforcement Services Page 2

the subject site. The applicant proposes to subdivide this 5-acre parcel into country residential lots (*see Exhibit B*).

The property adjacent to the *east* of the subject property is mostly wet and brush covered with the exception of two rural country residential subdivisions. The east portion of the subject property is under agricultural production. The east half of the quarter adjacent to the *south* boundary of the subject property is brush-covered while the west half is under agricultural production. To the *west* of the subject property is a quarter that is entirely under agricultural production with a farmstead in the southeast corner. To the *north*, the adjacent property is mostly under agricultural production, with the exception of Lake Tourangeau to the northeast of the site (*see Exhibit A*).

OBSERVATIONS AND COMMENTS

1. The General Municipal Plan

Part 2 (Development Strategy) of the General Municipal Plan (GMP) of the Municipal District of Mackenzie No. 23 restates the commitment of the Municipal District to "maintain the rural character of the municipality". The GMP however maintained that *it would be the desire of the Municipal District to accommodate the growth of multi-lot country residential developments through a strategy that will manage growth to the benefit of residents.*

Furthermore, Section 3.8 of the GMP allows for the subdivision of land for multi-lot country residential purposes on the following conditions:

- 1. The proposed subdivision is not on "Better Agricultural Land";
- 2. The proposed subdivision is located on poor agricultural land and/or locations that would not interfere with farming operations;
- 3. The proposed subdivision is adequately serviced;
- 4. The proposed subdivision is compatible with the capability and characteristics of the natural environment, and the surrounding land uses; and
- 5. The multi-lot country residential developments are located in the vicinity of a forest-based industrial activity (see pp. 33 & 34 of the General Municipal Plan).

The subject application, in its present form, has not met conditions 1, 2, 4, 5, as listed above. The Canada Land Inventory (CLI) soil classification for the subject site indicates that 100% of the property for which application for rezoning is being made falls within the class 3c soil category (*see Exhibit B*). (Class 3c soils are soils with moderate limitations such as, low temperature or poor distribution of rainfall during the cropping season, which may restrict the range of crops or may require special conservation practices). The Land Use Bylaw of the Municipal District of Mackenzie No. 23 defines "Better Agricultural Land" as "land considered to possess Canada Land Inventory rating of (1), (2), (3), and (4)."

MMSA Staff's Opinion:

MMSA Staff is of the opinion that Council should require the applicant to submit a soil evaluation/assessment report by a qualified soil scientist/agrologist. If the report - with data of laboratory soil tests - indicates a significant deviation from current CLI classification such that the soil could be termed "poor agricultural land", Council may then review the application for possible approval.

2. Subdivision of Land Classified as "Better Agricultural Land"

The first objective of the Municipal District's Land Use Policies is the preservation of "Better Agricultural Land" for *extensive* and *intensive* agricultural land uses. Notwithstanding this objective, subdivision of land may still be allowed where a property is considered to be on "Better Agricultural Land", but only in cases <u>where no reasonable</u> <u>alternative exists</u>, and on a *discretionary basis*.

However, the types of land uses for subdivision that may be allowed, at the discretion of the Development Officer, includes and are limited to:

- 1. Highway Commercial;
- 2. Rural Commercial;
- 3. Agricultural Industries;
- 4. Public Uses and Utilities;
- 5. Resource Extraction Industries;
- 6. Uses that have unique property requirements; and
- 7. Recreational uses." (See p. 13 of GMP)

MMSA Staff's Opinion:

The use for which the rezoning application is being made is not included in this list. Based on an evaluation of current information submitted to Council, it would be a contravention of some of the objectives of the General Municipal Plan if the rezoning application were allowed to succeed in its present form.

3. The Need to Avoid Future Land Use Conflicts

One of the objectives (Section 3.7) of the General Municipal Plan is that developments in the rural-urban fringe area be based on the *assurance that it would not cause any unnecessary problems in the future.* This implies that the Municipal District is required to evaluate land use proposals to:

a) Ensure compatibility with present and future land uses in the fringe areas and their impact on urban land uses,

- b) Identify future urban growth areas through constant review of hamlet area structural plans, and
- c) Discourage the premature conversion of agricultural land to non-agricultural uses.

MMSA Staff's Opinion:

MMSA Staff is concerned that the piece-meal parcelling out of fringe agricultural land for residential development, if not harmonized with the Hamlet's vision for future developments, may create compatibility and servicing problems in future.

<u>MMSA staff is of the opinion that the Hamlet of La Crete should review its Area</u> <u>Structure Plan/Community Plan to include fringe areas. This should be harmonized with</u> <u>the rural area structure plans of new and potential rezoning applications in the fringe</u> <u>areas to avoid future land use compatibility problems.</u>

The Hamlet Area Structure Plan/Community Plan (prepared by a qualified professional) should redefine fringe areas based on a 10 – 25 years projection of "lots-need" data for the Hamlet of La Crete. It should also establish land use and development patterns, lot servicing, access considerations, open space plans and standards, and set new minimum distance and lot coverage standards for all fringe area developments.

4. Rural Area Structure Plan

The proposed subdivision is to be located about 1.6 kilometres from the Hamlet of La Crete. This is less than the minimum distance of 3.2 kilometres required for allowing rural country residential developments from a settlement the size of the Hamlet of La Crete. Even where such a development is permitted, it would require a rural Area Structure Plan. (See LUB's "Additional Requirements" for Rural Country Residential District "RC" zones).

MMSA Staff's Opinion:

MMSA Staff is of the opinion that, to complement our recommendation in section 3 above, the applicant should submit a rural Area Structure Plan, showing the plan of subdivision, lot servicing, plus accesses and egresses to and from the site.

CONCLUSION

Based on the review and analysis of available information, MMSA staff is of the opinion that the proposed amendment does not meet all the requirements of the Municipal District's General Municipal Plan. Our conclusion is based on the following observations:

- a) The subject property is on land presently classified as "Better Agricultural Land";
- b) The proposed rezoning could create problems for any future expansion plans by the Hamlet of La Crete;

- c) The proposed rezoning could create future land use compatibility problems;
- d) Without a prior requirement by Council for applicant to provide and maintain services and accesses to the subject site, the Municipal District could be liable for upgrading these facilities in future if they pose environmental problems or health risks to residents;
- e) A rural Area Structure Plan is required for rural country residential developments. The rural Area Structure Plan should indicate – among other things - the connections of its roads with existing Hamlet of La Crete's highway/road system

Finally, MMSA Staff observed that multi-lot country residential subdivisions could help to reduce the demand for large lot country living- a practice that is considered an unsustainable use of land in the urban fringe. However, multi-lot country residential subdivisions in the fringe areas should follow a revised master plan (i.e., Community Development Plan) representing the pattern and structure of development for the Hamlet and its fringe areas.

It is therefore recommended that the proposed bylaw amendment be **tabled** until an independent soil evaluation report and a rural Area Structure Plan of the proposed development are submitted to Council for further consideration.

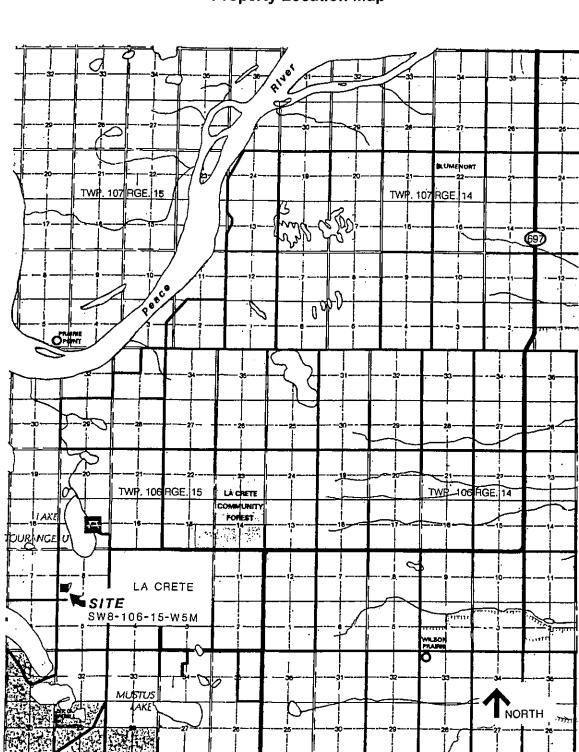
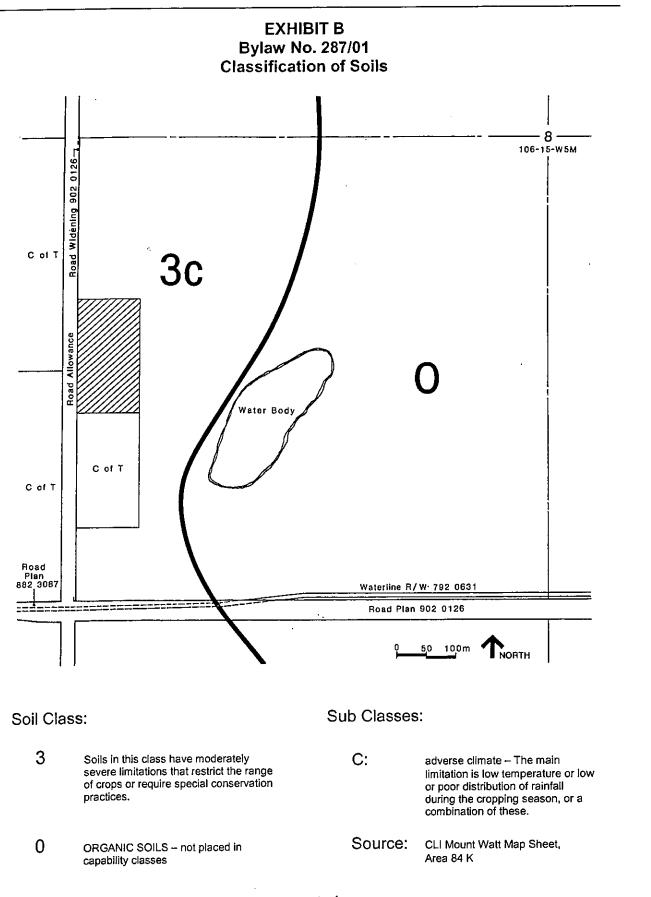

BACKGROUND / PROPOSAL:

An application was received to re-zone part of the NW 32-110-19-W5M from Agricultural District 1 "A1" to Rural Industrial District "RM1" to accommodate a contractors business (helicopter service). The subject property is located approximately 8 kilometers north of the Town of High Level on the west side of Highway 35. The location is directly south of the High Level Airport in line with the flight path and within the airport vicinity protection area.

DISCUSSION / OPTIONS / BENEFITS / DISADVANTAGES:

The area that is to be re-zoned consists of a shop and house and the applicant would like to run the helicopter business from this location. The proposed rezoning will not take any existing farmland out of production. 80% of the quarter section is rated as CLI 4 while the remaining 20% is CLI 5 with the proposed parcel approximately (16.76 ac) classified as CLI 4. There is an existing subdivision on the subject property (located on the north end immediately adjacent to the proposed re-zoning). The quarter section is also bisected by Highway 35 resulting in residual parcels that are to small for extensive agricultural operations.

The applicant has obtained approval from the following governing bodies to operate at the proposed location:

NAV Canada

Review:

- Transportation Canada
- Alberta Transportation

Alberta Transportation issued a permit under the Highway Control Regulation authorizing the development subject to approval from Municipal District of Mackenzie No 23.

C.A.O.

Dept.

Transport Canada has no objection to this project and no requirements.

NAV Canada has no objection however the applicant must comply with the following actions.

 Since the operation will be almost directly below the approach to runway 31 and within the YOJ MF (High Level mandatory frequency area), where pop ups could be a concern, the operator must comply with the CARS MF (Canadian Aviation Regulation MF) procedures. Since the operator may not have contact with FSS (Flight Service Station) on the ground, broadcast procedures may have to be used and aircraft may have to exit the approach path area laterally prior to commencing en route flight.

Nonetheless, NAV Canada cannot control if the applicant does or does not comply with Transport Canada's regulations, action can only be taken if the applicant is sited for not abiding by the regulations, upon which the complaint would be investigated by NAV Canada.

NOTE: This information pertains to a potential development permit on the subject site for a helicopter business.

Further, the subject property is located in a "Control Zone" which is controlled by NAV Canada, who has direct control over the take-off and landings of all flights for the High Level. Therefore the applicant would have to contact the Flight Service Station (FSS) at the High Level Airport in order to conduct a flight from the helicopter pad.

CONCERNS

Review:

The operation will only operate during daylight hours (sunup to sundown), the same time as other aircraft (fixed wing) takeoff and landing from the airport. There will be a total of 3 helicopters stationed at this location with approximately 3 flights per day (takeoff and landing), excluding takeoff's for maintenance of required.

The present location for the helicopter business is at the High Level airport where the applicant is renting space for his business, a site inspection was conducted and the current location of the business seemed to be at a very suitable location and appropriate for this type of business.

By allowing the development of an aircraft business outside the approved airport facilities established for this type of business is not proper planning. In discussion with the Town of High Level they are proposing to develop more lots north of the existing airport facilities to allow for businesses to establish at the airport.

The purpose of this report is to provide the Municipal District of Mackenzie No. 23 with comments on the proposed amendment to the <u>Municipal District of Mackenzie No. 23 Land</u> <u>Use Bylaw</u> regarding NW1/4-32-110-19-W5M in the Municipal District.

Agency staff understands that the owner wishes to rezone the NW ¼ of Section 32 from Agricultural District 1 ("A1") to Rural Industrial District ("RM1") to accommodate a Contractor's Business on the subject lands in the form of a Helicopter Operation. The property fronts the west side of Highway 35, approximately 4 miles north of High Level and 1.06 miles south of the Airstrip. The Quarter Section was recently subdivided under plan 022-0818.

The following comments are provided for the consideration of Council.

1. The MD's General Municipal Plan attempts to protect better agricultural land, defined as that having a rating of Class 1 through 4 in accordance with the Canada Land Inventory. Classes 5 through 7 are considered poorer agricultural land.

The Quarter section contains approximately 80% of the land rated as Class 4 and the other 20% rated as Class 5. However, the proposed parcel, approximately 6.78 ha (16.76 ac) within NW1/4 of section 32 is classified as CLI Class 4. Approximately 20% of the area classified as Class 5 is actually organic soils and should not be considered for farming. The Quarter is already bisected by Highway 35, and the resulting residual parcels are probably too small for extensive agricultural operations. In addition, the Quarter section (160 acres) is normally taken as the minimum size for a viable extensive farming operation.

Section 3 (f) of the General Municipal Plan provides:

"Where better agricultural land is severed by a physical feature and as a result cannot be easily farmed, the development of this land may be allowed for non-agricultural purposes, provided that there are no conflicts with adjacent agricultural uses."

Given the policies of the General Municipal Plan and the characteristics of the subject Parcel and Quarter Section, Staff is of the opinion that the site should not be regarded as better agricultural land.

- 2. The subject quarter section was the subject of a previous subdivision application, removing 4.04 ha parcel of land adjoining the northern road allowance, which was approved March 11, 1998 and the plan was recently registered as 022-0818.
- 3. The proposed amendment would rezone the 6.78ha (16.76 acres) of the quarter section from Agricultural District 1 "A1" to Rural Industrial District "RM1".

The purpose of Agricultural District 1 "A1" is to provide for the conservation of land for a wide range of agricultural purposes, to minimise the fragmentation of agricultural land, and to limit non-agricultural land uses to those which are not likely to interfere, or be incompatible with, agricultural land uses.

The general purpose of the Rural Industrial District "RM1" is to accommodate industrial buildings and uses which are deemed better suited to rural rather than urban areas.

4. MD23 Land Use Bylaw High Level Airport vicinity protection area regulation:

2(2) <u>All development within the High Level Airport Vicinity Protection Area will</u> require a development permit

2(5) The Development Officer is not precluded by this regulation from attaching any other conditions in accordance with the Land Use Bylaw to a development permit.

2(6) A development permit for a development within the Protection Area may only be issued if the proposed development conforms with the Regulation and the Land Use Bylaw Schedule 1: The High Level Airport Vicinity Protection Area consists of the land described below:

In Township 110, Range 19, West of the Fifth Meridian Northwest Quarter, Section 32

Schedule 3: Land Use in Relation to Noise Exposure forecast Areas:

The proposed contractor's business is located within the 25-30 NEF contour area of the Schedule 2 High Level Airport Vicinity protection Area Land Use District Map

1(c) "P", where it appears in one of the NEF columns in Table 1 opposite a particular land use means that the land use is not allowed and prohibited in that NEF Area is permitted by this regulation, thus, such a use is neither prohibited nor is a development permit for a development involving that use to be made subject to any condition under Table 2 of this Schedule in this regulation.

Nonetheless, this would not prevent the Development Officer from placing certain conditions, such as compliance with Transport Canada's regulations and Alberta Transportation's conditions, upon a development permit if the application was to proceed to that stage.

If Council is mindful to allow this rezoning, the following development issues may also be considered:

1. Comments Related to the Potential Development of the Subject Site The applicant did obtained comments from the following governing bodies, in order to operate at the proposed site:

- NAV Canada
- Transportation Canada
- Alberta Transportation

After review of the letter sent to Mr. Roch Dallaire by Mr. Peter Prescott, the Safety and Design Specialist from NAV Canada, to the Applicant, it was noted that the application does not interfere with the equipment and approach to the runway, <u>if the applicant complies with regulations set by Transport Canada – Canadian Aviation Regulations MF Procedures</u>.

Nonetheless, Nav Canada cannot control if the applicant does or does not comply with Transport Canada's regulations, action can only be taken if the applicant is sited for not abiding by the regulations, upon which the complaint would be investigated by NAV Canada.

NOTE: this information pertains to a potential development permits on the subject site for a helicopter business.

Further, the subject property is located in a "Control Zone" which is overlooked by NAV Canada, who has direct control over the take-off and landings of all flights for the High Level,

therefore the applicant would have to contact the Flight Service Station (FSS) in the High Level Airport in order to conduct a flight from the helicopter pad.

Alberta Transportation issued permit no. 2002-14-047 to the applicant, under the Highway Control Regulations authorising the development, but placing certain conditions, as shown on the permit, that must be complied with. One of the conditions states that:

One of the conditions states that

This permit is subject to approval of Municipal District of Mackenzie No. 23

Therefore consent from the above three governing bodies does not preclude the automatic approval of said development by the MD of Mackenzie No. 23, the application must also comply with the Land Use Bylaw.

2. Previously, it was said that the definition of Contractor's Business was removed from the Land Use Bylaw, and further review noted that the use was removed from the Agricultural District 1 (A1) but still remains as a discretionary use listed in the Rural Industrial District 1 (RM1).

The definition of Contractor's Business is as follows:

"Contractors Business" means the use of land or buildings for a contractor's operation such as a building contractor, an oilfield-servicing contractor or another similar type of contracting operation.

It is the opinion of the Mackenzie Municipal Services agency that the proposed development of the subject site, a helicopter business, does not fall under the above definition. A more appropriate definition would be that of a "Private Helicopter Business".

Further, the Airport Authority for the High Level Airport made remark about safety concerns due to the close proximity of the proposed location of the 'helicopter business', as it is in the direct line of flight for the airport. The NAV Canada personnel, stationed at the High Level Airport, reiterated the same safety concerns. It is recommended that those concerns be verified.

3. Recommendations Regarding the Potential Development of the Subject Parcel It is recommended that the applicant provide further information regarding:

- The hours of operation
- The extent of the business operation; including but not limited to
- The number of flights

Staff of Mackenzie Municipal Services Agency feels that the proposed development of the site, into that of a helicopter business, could potentially jeopardise the safe movement of aircraft over the subject site. This matter could however be dealt with in detail at the development permit stage.

Final Comments Regarding Land Use Bylaw Amendment 297/02:

Based on the foregoing, it is recommended that the MD Council pass By-law No. 297/02 rezoning the subject parcel from Agricultural District (A1) to Rural Industrial District (RM1).

A BYLAW OF THE MUNICIPAL DISTRICT OF MACKENZIE NO. 23 FOR THE IMPOSITION OF AN OFFSITE LEVY

WHEREAS, the Municipal Government Act, being Chapter M-26.1 of the Statutes of Alberta enables Council by Bylaw to provide for the imposition and payment of an off-site levy in respect of land to be developed or subdivided;

AND WHEREAS, an off-site levy may be used only to pay for all or part of the capital cost in respect of land that is to be developed or subdivided as per Section 648 of the Municipal Government Act,

NOW THEREFORE, the Council of the Municipal District of Mackenzie No. 23, in the Province of Alberta, duly assembled, hereby enacts as follows:

- The Municipality, in its discretion may impose an off-site levy at either the subdivision or development stage. The off-site levy shall be imposed on lands to be developed within the Hamlet boundary limits of Fort Vermilion, La Crete, and Zama, which are governed by the Municipal District of Mackenzie No. 23.
- 2. Fees for such off-site levy charges are set according to Schedule "A" of this Bylaw.
- 3. The Council of the Municipal District of Mackenzie may enter into an agreement in respect to payment of an off-site levy.
- 4. In the absence of an agreement for the payment of an off-site levy, where an owner of land proposes to construct a development, the payment of the off-site levy shall be made prior to the issuance of a development permit.
- 5. When land is to be redeveloped or re-subdivided and no previous off-site levies have been collected under this Bylaw or under any previous Bylaw, the off-site levies shall be due and payable if there is an increase in the intensity of lots. Such payment is to be made in accordance with Schedule "A" of this Bylaw.

6. Notwithstanding Schedule "A" of this Bylaw, an off-site levy of \$1,000.00 per lot for Fort Vermilion, La Crete, and Zama may be imposed upon land that is defined in an Area Structure Plan/Community Development Plan, is not subdivided, and is being sold by the Municipal District of Mackenzie to a developer forming part of the purchase price of the said lands.

Legislation Reference | Municipal Government Act, Section 18

Purpose:

To provide guidelines for the cost of infrastructure for new industrial development.

Policy Statement and Guidelines

Council for the Municipal District of Mackenzie recognizes that there remains a vast undeveloped area within the municipality. Appropriate infrastructure such as gas, electrical and telephone lines are not always readily available to new development in outlying areas.

Definition:

For the purpose of the policy, the following shall mean:

1. Industry - industrial, commercial and confined feeding operations.

Guidelines:

Although Council's goal is to encourage industrial development, due to budget constraints it is not feasible for the Municipal District to provide infrastructure for industry. Therefore, the following principles shall be implemented:

- 1. The Municipal District of Mackenzie shall not be responsible for providing infrastructure of any kind to outlying areas for the development of industry including utilities, roads, etc.
- 2. The development of infrastructure is primarily the responsibility of the property owner.
- 3. Council, at its discretion, shall consider road requests from industry on a case-by-case basis.
- 4. This policy does not apply to residential and farm development.

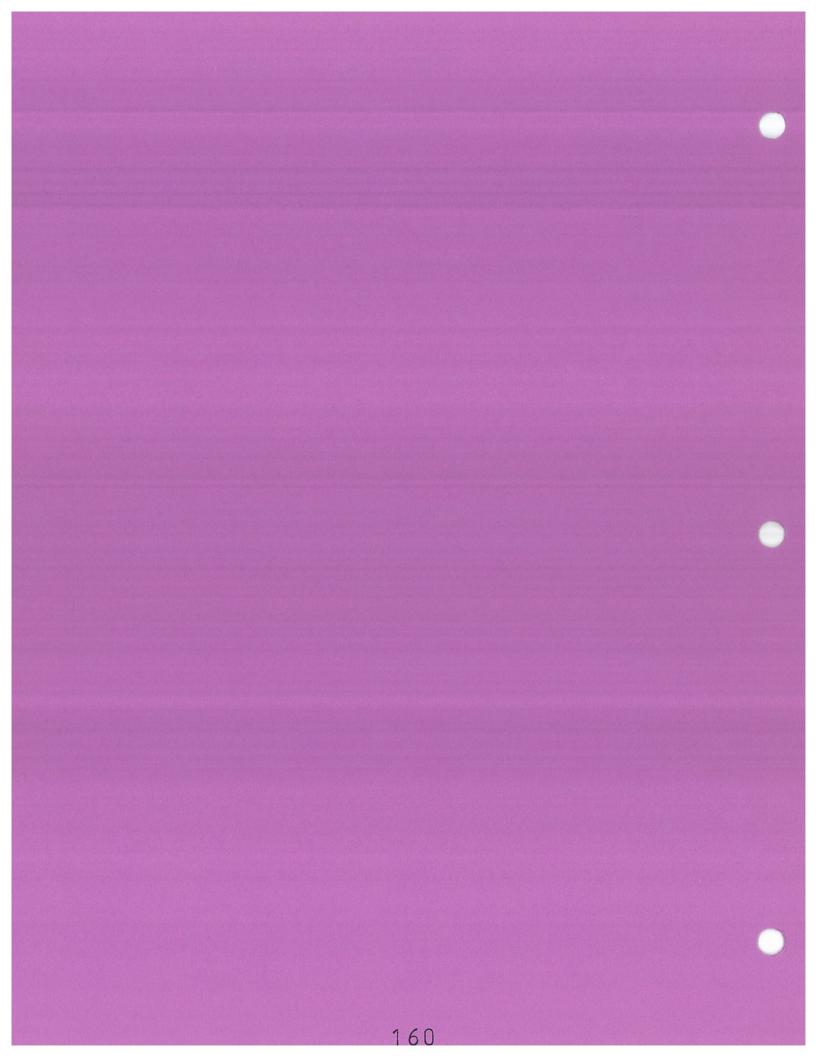

Policy Statement and Guidelines

Council for the Municipal District of Mackenzie recognizes that a process should be in place to provide guidelines when acquiring engineering services within the municipality. Council has determined that the supply of these services will be separated into two distinct areas, hamlet and non-hamlet.

In keeping with past decisions and discussions the guidelines will be established as follows: Drefered

- a) In hamlet areas the work is to be performed by GPEC Consulting Ltd.⁴until Budget 2004 is approved by Council.
- b) In non-hamlet areas the work is to be performed by EXH Engineering Preferred Services Ltd. until Budget 2004 is approved by Council.
- c) Projects with an estimated value of more than \$1,000,000 will be treated individually. The need for engineering services will be advertised and the most suitable firm will be selected, by Administration, from the proposals submitted. This selection will be taken to Council for ratification.
- d) The appointment of the two firms listed in sections a) and b) shall be reviewed annually until budget 2004 is presented and approved. As part of that budget process a selection process will be undertaken to select a firm, or firms, for a further three year period for the hamlet and non-hamlet areas.

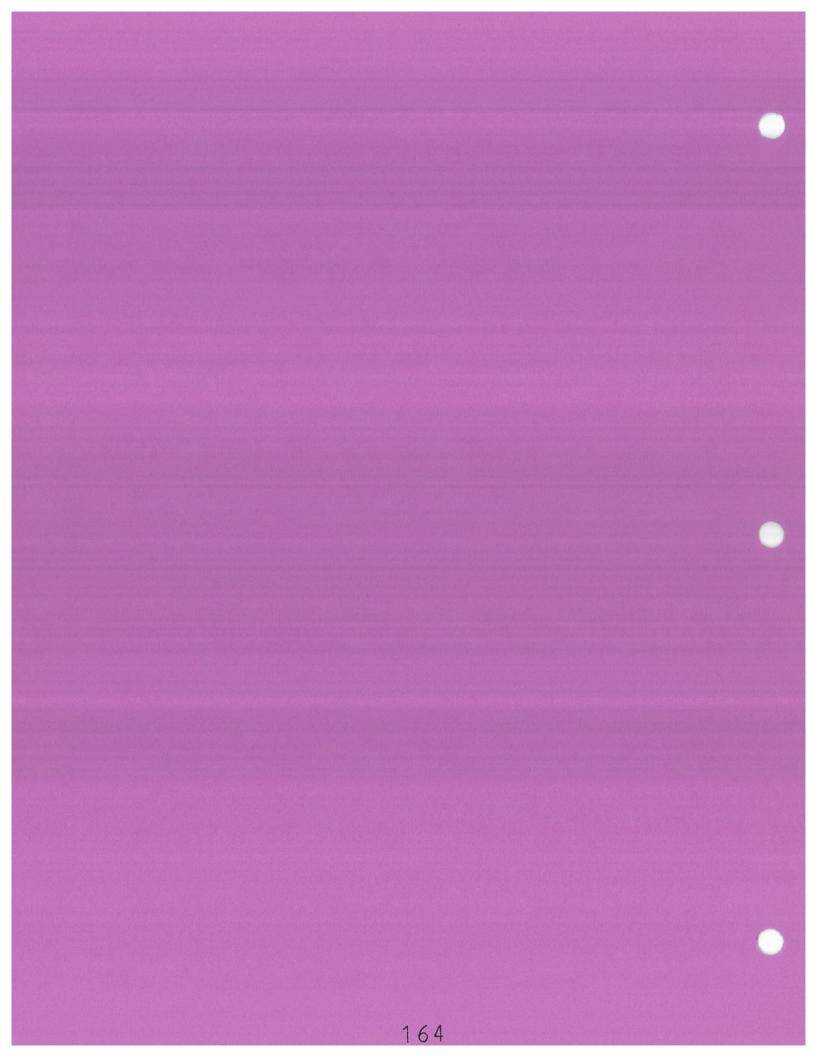

At the February 8, 2002 Special Council Meeting, Council briefly discussed the options regarding the Alberta Transportation maintenance shop in Fort Vermilion. Currently, La Prairie Group occupies the shop. As previously discussed, Alberta Transportation is willing to sell the shop to the M.D. There is an existing lease agreement with La Prairie Group which expires in May 2004. BACKGROUND / PROPOSAL:

The issue of establishing a Transfer Station has come to the table a number of times. The last recommendation by Council was to allow administration to negotiate a deal for land in the vicinity of the existing Transfer Station. Since then administration purchased property from a landowner whom later backed out of the deal. Mainly because with the current land use bylaw a Transfer Station would need to be at least 300 meters from any other development, with that condition engage the land deal any longer. The land owner has returned the money to the municipality, which then was placed in the Buffalo Head Prairie Transfer Station Reserve.

DISCUSSION / OPTIONS / BENEFITS / DISADVANTAGES:

A new proposal has been discussed with the Buffalo Head Prairie Co-op Board in leaving the existing Transfer Station where it is, since the existing site can be grandfathered into its current location, much like the Transfer Station which is located in La Crete.

The Buffalo Head Prairie Co-op at this time proposes to sell a portion of its land (approx. 0.8524 acres) to the M D of Mackenzie in exchange for twice the land value in area (approx. 1.7048 acres) on the west site and south side of the Co-op boundaries. The west side would consist of a 30 foot strip which they want as a wind buffer, and the remainder land value to the south of its property. This way they would have room for future expansion.

BACKGROUND / PROPOSAL:

During the budget process different parks were requested by ratepayers and brought before Council. One was a new park in Blumenort, one was a new playground on the west side of La Crete and the third one was an upgrade to the playground at the Fort Vermilion Complex.

The park in Blumenort was referred to the Campground Task Force. The playground in La Crete and the playground equipment upgrade at the Fort Vermilion Complex were also referred to task force for review. No money was set aside during the budget process for these projects. It was mentioned that funds could be taken from the parks and recreation reserve at any time once a project was approved. There is a total of \$135,137 in unallocated funds in the Recreation Parks Reserves.

DISCUSSION / OPTIONS / BENEFITS / DISADVANTAGES:

The terms of reference for the campground task force does not include playgrounds at all. For parks and playgrounds to be included, the terms of reference would need to be revised. This issue needs to be resolved.

With the large amount of development occurring in La Crete, the topic of playgrounds needs to be addressed. The La Crete Community Development Plan (LCCDP) includes playground areas on the west side of La Crete that would be very suitable for this purpose. The Planning Department has been working on revising the LCCDP and has proposed playgrounds that will coordinate well with the proposed walking trails. Currently there is development bordering one side of the proposed playground location on the west end of La Crete. The La Crete Community Development Plan will be presented to Council at a later date for amendment.

To Whom It May Concern:

I would like to address the subject of playgrounds.

I am a mother of two young children living in Fort Vermilion. I find that there is a lack of safe playground equipment for preschoolers in this hamlet.

The St. Mary's playground is a great place but it is for older children. There are many gaps and difficulties the younger children cannot overcome without help. My boy fell through a gap while trying to get to the entrance of the slide on his own and ended up with a bump on his head and a bloody lip, not to mention a fear of the slide.

The Comlpex playground is a little more suited to younger children but I feel the equipment is unsafe. The baby swing seats are appropriate but the chains with which they are held are old and often repaired with bits and pieces of wire. The slides are a favorite among children but the sides are too low and a child can easily fall off if they get hung up partway down the slide. The metal on the slide gets very hot in the summer sun and the top platform makes most parents nervous of a fall as they watch their child loading onto the slide. There is an older wooden platform and monkey bars that has given many a splinter. And the teeter-totters are fine except for the heavy metal bar under the seats. This can cause an injury when a child pulls it down on top of them.

In the future, I would like to see a safer, more appropriate playground for preschoolers in our community. Possibly by renovating the Complex playground with more modern safer slides, a swing makeover, a few more playground items suitable for preschoolers and a bench or two for watching parents. I believe that if the Complex playground were improved, the community would gain much more use out of it.

I appreciate your time and consideration on this matter and look forward to seeing your recommendations come into action in the near future.
