Supported Independent Living in the Mackenzie Region

NWR FASD Society–Mackenzie Network Updated April 2013

Recognized need

- At present we have
- 54 adults suspected or diagnosed within our programs.
- 28 clients who need access to Supported Living Accommodations.
- 26 of the 54 are presently in some type of accommodations.
- ▶ 17 have been stable for 6 months or more.

What are the needs?

- ▶ 8 clients should have 24/7 support.
- 5 of those clients are in situations at present with natural supports, 1 is incarcerated and 2 are couch surfing
- The remaining 46 clients require check-ins and support with one or more daily living skills

What type of residences?

 Apartment building with security at the door and supervision and programming in the building

Why Supported Housing?

- Brain dysfunction makes decision making and executive brain function difficult
- Memory issues affect life skills/employment
- Parenting support
- Social support in community and small group settings
- Build community capacity to utilize the strengths and support areas of needs of these individuals

Why Supported Housing? (continued..)

- Burnout of caregivers, couch surfing, shelter or they are out of the children's services system
- Prevention of involvement with justice
- Safety
- Positive community involvement

Where would this be developed?

- At present we are working to have this type of residence in High Level.
- The residence needs to be in a community with access to supports such as mental health, counselling, appropriate programming

Providing Barrier Free supported living will:

- Provide supervised, safe housing 24/7
- On site supports, mentoring, advocacy
- Increase health, mental health and quality of life
- Support employment/employers
- Decrease use of emergency services
- Decrease involvement in justice system
- Provide parenting support on site

Mackenzie Housing – A Pilot Project

- 2008 Strategic planning session was held for Supported Housing
- ▶ 2009 Housing committee set up
- 2010 presentations were made to High Level Town Council and Mackenzie Housing at which support for the project was given
- 2012 Investor voiced interest in project

Mackenzie Housing – A Pilot Project

- 2012 A proposal was submitted to Mr.
 Oberle and Human Services
- 2012 Pilot project was supported by the CMC for FASD and Human Services
- January 2013 Start up funding received
- January 2013 Verbal confirmation that funding available for a 3 year pilot project
- March 2013 Program Developer Hired

The Pilot Project

- First of this type in the world
- Evaluation funding tied to project
- 3 year pilot project
- Investor willing to take risk
- Collaborations with all agencies and communites being sought

Future

- 31 youths who will be turning 18 in the next3 years
- 52 more youths in the next 10 years
- Possible total of 133 units needed by 2022 if our client numbers remain the same
