C.A.O. Report to Council

August 12/08

This report is a brief overview of the County Business affairs and major projects. We are very busy because of the significant volume of projects and paper these generate but also because of tardiness of consultants and busy contractors.

1. Roads

Highway 88 Base Paving

This project has not been advanced for paving yet but this year Alberta Transportation is spending approximately \$20,000,000.00 on re-grading and bridge structures. Also to be discussed with Ed.

Highway 58 East Construction

It seems senior governments are making some progress on construction east of the Wentzel River and also the Wentzel River bridge.

Resource Road Projects

The 2007 projects are both substantially complete.

The 2008 Zama Access Road project is awarded and should start this month.

The 2009 applications are being worked on by EXH for Bluehills, 88 Connector and Zama City Access.

Most of our budgeted roads are in progress and I would be pleased to discuss anyone of them as you wish.

Airports

To be discussed by Council and provide direction to administration.

2. Buildings

Progress on our capital building projects is a bit slow and some renovations will depend on how council deals with the ambulance. We should hold building committee meetings in each area very soon to keep on track.

3. Inter-municipal Matters

4. Personnel

Our staffing situation is very stable and functioning at a reasonably high percentage, of course, some staff are performing higher than others.

We are also working on the AUPE agreement (See Finance Committee).

5. Finance

Generally our finances are in good order (see Joulia's Report) the challenge is to access our fair share of Provincial and Federal program dollars. This is very challenging as the Government keeps changing the rules and it seems ministerial ridings get preference. We are starting the application process for 2009 projects and will have a draft for council in September. If Council members have projects they wish considered please advise.

6. Forestry

There does not seem to be any visible improvement in the forestry sector. Hector's department has not responded to Footner's request for financial support in log hauling as of yet.

7. Oil and Gas

This sector seems very positive with a quite a few new developments. There is strong indication that new discoveries in North West Alberta and North East British Columbia are very significant. The Governor of Alaska in a public presentation indicated a desire to build a pipeline from Alaska to Alberta possibly coming thru at Rainbow Lake. We also have a pipeline proposal from Fort Nelson to Zama.

8. Health

There continues to be community concern about doctors especially in High Level area. As previously discussed council may wish to have a Doctor Strategy developed. The ambulance service will be dealt with in the council agenda. Health facilities are also of concern like clinic space, staff housing, and perhaps treatment facilities.



Attached are estimates "A" and "B" for La Crete airport.

- "A" was what we initially estimated.
- "B" reduces the sub-base from 300mm to 200mm and reduces the ACP from 100mm to 70mm.

The asphalt price has been kept at \$100 per tonne. With increased prices of materials over the past few months, this unit price is now approximately cost. From a construction cost perspective, there is no way that waiting will make the project more economical. Getting the project done yet this year is still possible and therefore needs to get underway soon. The decision makers need to consider the opportunities and options that become available to this part of the county once this facility is upgraded. Improved accesses to the county's communities has been focus and high priority of county council. This very cost effective improvement surely fits perfectly in line with the priorities that already exist. If I may echo your own words... its a no-brainer!



Government of Canada and Canadian Standards Association Partner to Improve Infrastructure

(from the Infrastructure Canada website, Wednesday, August 6, 2008) The Government of Canada and the Canadian Standards Association (CSA) have struck an agreement that aims to provide Canadians with infrastructure that is better planned and managed. Drawing on its expertise in standards setting and training, the CSA's Infrastructure Solutions Project will provide solutions to infrastructure challenges through the development of best practice guides, new standards, and training modules for the practitioners responsible for infrastructure. Canadians Got More per Bushel than US Farmers, Wheat Board Says

(from the CBC News website, Thursday, July 31, 2008) Prairie farmers earned a record \$7 billion from grain sold through the Canadian Wheat Board in 2007-08 — a 57 per cent increase over the previous year, the agency said in its annual report. According to Larry Hill, chair of the Winnipeg-based grain marketer, the earnings worked out to more than \$8.40 a bushel for high-quality spring wheat and more than \$12 a bushel for high-quality durum, after freight and handling expenses are paid. Meanwhile, malting barley sales were the highest they have been in eight years, at 2.4 million tonnes, with farmers earning \$5 a bushel. For more information click here.

Feds to Pay for Widening Deadly Stretch of Alberta Highway

(from the CBC News website, Tuesday, August 5, 2008) The federal government is spending \$100 million to widen a dangerous two-lane stretch of the Trans-Canada Highway through the Rocky Mountains. Prime Minister Stephen Harper announced the three-year project, which will twin a 14-kilometre stretch between Castle Junction and Lake Louise. Harper said the highway has an accident rate 17 times higher than the Alberta average. The first phase of expanding 10 kilometres east of Lake Louise, which began in 2005, is expected to be finished late this year. Alberta Potato Growers Affected by Potato Cyst Nematode Receive Assistance

(from the Government of Alberta website, Wednesday, August 6, 2008) Federal and provincial governments have announced an investment to help Alberta seed potato growers affected by Potato Cyst Nematode (PCN). The announcement of up to \$23.5 million includes up to \$14.1 million of federal and \$9.4 million of provincial support that will be available under the 2008 Alberta Seed Potato Assistance Program, through AgriRecovery. The program will help potato growers cover extraordinary costs not covered under other programs including disposal of genetic plant stock, disposal costs to destroy inventory and compensation for loss of export market. Assistance is also available under AgriStability, which covers larger margin declines caused by production losses. The initiative is costshared on a 60:40 basis between the Government of Canada and the Province of Alberta. For more information click here.

Provincial Sheriffs Expand Enforcement Powers

(from the CBC News website, Wednesday, August 6, 2008) Alberta sheriffs are to be given the same authority as other police to enforce impaired driving laws. Up to 105 sheriffs are to receive additional training and will be ready to step up enforcement of impaired driving laws starting this fall before the holiday season. Under the current rules, sheriffs are supposed to call the RCMP or municipal police when they pull over a suspected drunk driver. If such police are not available, the sheriffs can issue a 24-hour roadside suspension. For more information click here.

Parkland County and the Town of Stony Plain have joined together to provide the Stony Plain and Parkland Pioneer Museum with the opportunity to purchase a significant collection of artifacts from a museum located in Lodgepole. At a recent town council meeting, Stony council approved the donation of half of the museum's requested \$45,000, and during a special county council meeting Parkland councillors agreed to follow suit and donate the other half.

The County of Lethbridge and the Town of Coaldale have ratified the agreement that was reached through mediation pertaining to the Spruce Woods Country Estates Area Structure Plan located south of Coaldale. The agreement will result in the withdrawal of the town's appeal, which means the developer can now proceed with application to subdivide. Starting this month, the county and the town will begin developing an Inter-municipal Development Plan and hope to have it completed by December 31, 2009.

The Town of Bonnyville and the Municipal District of Bonnyville were recognized by the Alberta Municipal Excellence Network for their effort to include a community-based non-profit society in their partnership to build and operate the Bonnyville and District Centennial Centre. The Centennial Centre is a recreational/educational facility designed to meet the needs of both communities but operates at arms length from the two municipal councils.

Alberta Environment Releases Two Draft Documents for Stakeholder Consultation

Two draft documents on conducting environmental site assessments have been released by Alberta Environment for stakeholder consultation. The draft Alberta Environmental Site Assessment Guidelines (2008) are intended for use on a variety of sites. The guidelines provide information on Phase 1 ESAs, Phase 2 ESAs, soil and groundwater sampling, confirmatory investigations and reporting. The draft Soil Monitoring Directive (2008) updates and consolidates the Soil Monitoring Directive (1996) and Guideline for Monitoring and Management of Soil Contamination Under Environmental Protection and Enhancement Act Approvals (1996). The draft directive is designed for use at facilities operating under an Environmental Protection and Enhancement Act approval that requires soil monitoring and soil management. Please submit comments separately on each of the draft documents by September 15, 2008 to the contact indicated on the webpage.

FCM's Green Municipal Fund

The Federation of Canadian Municipalities (FCM) has launched a new Green Municipal Fund™ (GMF) financing opportunity for the remediation of brownfield sites. Up to \$20 million in lowinterest loans will be made available to municipal governments and their partners. Eligible applicants can request loans equivalent to 50 to 80 per cent of eligible costs. Applications will be considered as they are received. Each application will be individually evaluated on its own merits. Not all proposals will be funded. Applications will be evaluated and considered for approval within four to five months from the date they are received. The concrete has broken at the anchors of 4 of 5 bridge rail posts on the west rail and 1 of 5 on the east rail. 2 posts are missing anchor bolts on the west rail and 1 post on the east rail is not connected.

Recommendation: Consider replacing the timber posts with salvaged steel posts. The posts could be anchored to the top of the existing curbs with steel rods imbedded with Hilti Hit.

Other deficiencies:

Cap appears to be crushing at pile number 5 at abutment 1. Recommendation: Cap was

recently cored. Review coring report.

1 cracked strut. Recommendation: Replace strut.

Damaged approach rail. Recommendation: Replace 1 damaged section and 1 turndown end.

Install 2 missing bolts at 45 deg brackets. Caps not bearing on piles: Install shims.

RE: ZAMA WATER TREATMENT PLANT PROJECT CONCERNS

Further to our telephone conversation earlier today, I would like to reiterate the concerns that the County has regarding the Zama Water Treatment Plant project in general. Firstly, it is our perception that the costs associated with recent change orders or work requests are becoming excessive and are on the increase. We trust ISL to scrutinize these cost items diligently; however, it is our perception that ISL is accepting these items at face value.

Secondly, the fact that the CT's exclusion from the design drawings was not identified by ISL during your review of the design drawings for the plant; and this exclusion was only recently identified by County staff. We understand the fact that ISL has accepted the project post design phase, however, you have been in possession of these drawings for more than a year. Therefore, ISL should have identified its exclusion from the designs as it is regarded as being standard to these types of water treatment plants.

Thirdly, we have not yet received an incident report regarding the accident on site. This incident amplifies our concerns regarding the attention to safety at the construction site, especially by the structural contractors. We do however recognize significant improvement of the site and atmosphere since the Nason mechanical crew took over.

There is also a perception that there is a general lack to detail by ISL to this project. Your attention to the above concerns would be appreciated to ensure a trusting relationship with ISL. If convenient for you, I would be pleased to meet and discuss this and other projects ISL is managing for the County.







To establish crop damage rates for landowners adjacent to municipal construction projects.

Policy Statement

It is necessary to compensate landowners for crop damage if it is as a result of a municipal project construction.

Guidelines

Where municipal road construction extends beyond the right-of-way in a rural area there is usually crop damage to the existing land. Landowners shall be compensated as follows:

- 1. \$300.00 per acre for damage to cereal, pulse or seed crop
- 2. \$300.00 per acre for damage to seeded hay or pasture
- 3. \$50.00 per acre for damage to native land

Prior to working outside of the right-of-way the municipality shall enter into an agreement with the landowner.

There shall be no compensation for easements or right-of-way agreements within hamlet limits.

The purpose of this policy is to establish the rate of compensation Saddle Hills County will pay for the purchase of land and related improvements. These rates will be standardized across the County and are intended to be used in relation to infrastructure development/improvement.

POLICY:

- 1. a) The basic compensation rate for the purchase of land by the County will be \$750.00 per acre, excluding improvements.
 - b) Where the parcel (s) is more than half acre the County will pay \$750.00, if the parcel (s) is less than half acre the County will pay \$375.00.
- 2. Should the County require a landscape borrow for its purposes, a rate of \$150.00 per acre will be used. The land used for the landscape borrow will be the property of the landowner.
- 3. Should the county require borrow, for its purposes, on cultivated land a flat fee of \$500.00 per borrow will be paid in addition to the cost per acre for the land.
- 4. Compensation for other costs such as the relocation of structures, excluding fencing, will be paid based on actual quotes or as negotiated with the landowner.
 Example: To relocate grain bins for road construction the County may obtain quotes from private contractors, use its own forces or negotiate the relocation with the landowner.
- 5. Should the County be unable to purchase land at the rate established, administration will refer the offer to purchase to Council for the purposes of evaluating the project under consideration or the offer to purchase. Council may choose to cancel the project or vary the compensation package as deemed appropriate.

- a) at 3 ½ times the assessed value of the land for farmland parcel with no residence (assessed value divided by total acres times 3.5 = price per acre to offer). Includes GST.
- b) on farmland parcels containing a residence site assessment, an offer of \$500, total, including GST or (a), whichever is greater.
- c) on residential or commercial subdivided parcels, an offer of \$500, total, including (387).
- d) for unoccupied farmland parcels severed by roads or natural boundaries where separate title exists, clause (a) will be used.

Fencing

Payment to the Landowner - for a good 3 strand fence - \$2,200, per mile (\$1.100, per quarter section); payment made when fence is reconstructed which must be within one year, from the date of completed road reconstruction. Payment includes GST.


Payment to the Landowner - to remove fence and not replace - \$250, per mile (\$125, per quarter section), including GST.

No payment made for fences not suitable to contain livestock.

No payment to Owner - M.D. will remove fonce and give salvage to owner.





BACKGROUND / PROPOSAL:

The County currently obtains its gravel from the Moe Anderson pit. This pit will likely not be economically feasible for the County beyond 2008. As a result, administration has entered into preliminary negotiations with Wayne Mercredi to acquire gravel from him.

OPTIONS & BENEFITS

The alternatives would be to continue mining the Moe Anderson pit which would have a higher overburden volume or to use the gravel from the Fitler pit for this area. Both these options would be costly as the cost of gravel currently does not justify the removal of the future overburden volumes. The distances travelled from the Fitler pit to regravel the Fort Vermilion area would be too costly due to the hauling costs.

COSTS & SOURCE OF FUNDING:

The cost for the gravel from the Mercredi pit would be \$6.25 per m3, which would include royalty, overburden removal and reclamation. These three items cumulatively would exceed the cost that the County will pay.

The cost in 2008 would be a deposit for the gravel already stripped and to ensure the gravel source would be \$30,000.

BACKGROUND / PROPOSAL:

Mackenzie County Council requested that administration bring forward a bylaw to ban the use of any polystyrene (Styrofoam) products within Mackenzie County.

OPTIONS & BENEFITS:

Introducing a bylaw that bans the use of polystyrene containers allows the County to better regulate the use of non-recyclable products and to become a "greener" County. Anyone who commits a breach of this bylaw will first receive a written warning notice that a violation has occurred and will be given three months to rectify the issue. If they do not comply a fine of \$100.00 will be issued to them for the first offense, \$200.00 for the second offense and \$500.00 for the third and any future violations.

COSTS & SOURCE OF FUNDING:

Costs to be determined by Administration, funding can come from Emergency Services / Enforcement.

BYLAW NO. 680/08

BEING A BYLAW OF MACKENZIE COUNTY, IN THE PROVINCE OF ALBERTA,

FOR BANNING POLYSTYRENE FOOD SERVICE CONTAINERS

WHEREAS Section 7 of the Municipal Government Act R.S.A. 2000, Chapter M-26, and amendments thereto, of the Province of Alberta, provides that a Municipal Council may enact a Bylaw respecting the safety, health and welfare of people and the protection of people and property; and nuisances;

AND WHEREAS Mackenzie County desires to protect the natural environment, the economy and the health of its citizens;

AND WHEREAS discarded packaging from food, beverages and other products constitutes a significant and growing portion of Mackenzie County's waste. Regulation of such packaging, therefore, is a necessary part of any effort to encourage a recyclable waste stream and to protect the environment;

AND WHEREAS it is in the interest of the health, safety and welfare of all who live, work and do business in the County that, to the extent feasible, the amount of litter on the public streets, parks, public places and open spaces be reduced and that litter which does reach the natural environment be biodegradable. Existing landfill sites are rapidly approaching capacity and additional sites are increasingly unavailable. Reduction of non-degradable wastes entering the waste stream and encouraging the use of recyclable packaging further these goals;

AND WHEREAS replacing non-biodegradable food packaging with biodegradable packaging will further protect the public health and safety of the residents, the County's natural environment, creeks and wildlife:

AND WHEREAS the minimization of non-degradable, non-returnable and non-recyclable food and beverage packaging originating at retail food establishments with the County is necessary and desirable to reduce the volume of land-filled waste;

AND WHEREAS non-biodegradable and non-recyclable materials pose a challenge to any environmentally and financially responsible solid waste management program. Discarded food packaging constitutes a significant and growing portion of the County's waste stream. Regulation of food packaging is necessary to encourage a recyclable waste stream and to reduce the disposal of solid waste and the economic and environmental costs of waste management;

AND WHEREAS biodegradable and recyclable products offer environmentally sound alternatives to products currently used. Biodegradable products decay, causing less harm to the environment and the landscape of the County than products now in use. Use and recycling of those alternative products saves the cost of disposing of waste in landfills and the energy and other resources used in production of new products;

AND WHEREAS bioplastics are commercially available and scientific studies show that these materials biodegradable both in compost and in the natural environment and return their base constituents to the food chain, such material can be composted even if contaminated with food waste and sugar cane stock (also known as bagasse) is suitable for hot foods and beverages;

NOW THEREFORE the Council of Mackenzie County in the Province of Alberta, duly assembled enacts as follows:

SECTION 1 NAME OF BYLAW

This Bylaw may be cited as the "Banning Polystyrene Products and Food Service Containers".

SECTION 2 <u>INTERPRETATION</u>

Where there is a conflict between this Bylaw and any other Bylaw pertaining to polystyrene products and/ or food service containers in Mackenzie County, the provisions of this Bylaw shall apply.

SECTION 3 DEFINITIONS

Unless otherwise expressly stated, whenever used in this chapter the following terms shall have the meanings set forth below:

- a) "Affordable" means purchasable by the food vendor for same or less purchase cost than the non-biodegradable, non-polystyrene foam alternative.
- b) "ASTM Standard" means meeting the standards of the American Society for Testing and Materials (ASTM) International standards D6400 or D6868 for biodegradable and compostable plastics.
- c) "Biodegradable" means the entire product or package will completely break down and return to nature, i.e., decompose into elements found in nature within a

reasonably short period of time after customary disposal.

- d) "Compostable" means all materials in the product or package will break down into, or otherwise become part of, usable compost (e.g., soil-conditioning material, mulch) in a safe and timely manner in an appropriate composting program or facility, or in a home compost pile or device. Compostable disposable food service ware includes ASTM-standard bio-plastics (plastic-like products) that are clearly labeled, preferably with a color symbol, such that any compost collector and processor can easily distinguish the ASTM standard compostable plastic from non-ASTM standard compostable plastic.
- e) "County" means Mackenzie County.
- f) "County facilities" means any building, structure or vehicles owned or operated by the County, its agent, agencies, departments and franchisees.
- g) "Customer" means any person obtaining prepared food from a restaurant or retail food vendor.
- h) "Disposable food service ware" means all containers, bowls, plates, trays, cartons, cups, forks, spoons, knives and other items that are designed for one-time use and on, or in, which any restaurant or retail food vendor directly places or packages prepared foods or which are used to consume foods. This includes, but is not limited to, service ware for takeout foods and/or leftovers from partially consumed meals prepared at restaurants or retail food vendors.
- "Food vendor" means any restaurant, retail food vendor located or operating within the County.
- j) "Polystyrene foam" means and includes blown polystyrene and expanded and extruded foams (sometimes called Styrofoam, a Dow Chemical Co. trademarked form of polystyrene foam insulation) which are thermoplastic petrochemical materials utilizing a styrene monomer and processed by any number of techniques including, but not limited to, fusion of polymer spheres (expandable bead

polystyrene), injection molding, foam molding, and extrusion-blow molding (extruded foam polystyrene). Polystyrene foam is generally used to make cups, bowls, plates, trays, clamshell containers, meat trays and egg cartons.

- k) "Prepared food" means food or beverages, which are served, packaged, cooked, chopped, sliced, mixed, brewed, frozen, squeezed or otherwise prepared on the food vendor's premises or within the County. For the purposes of this bylaw, prepared food includes raw, butchered meats, fish and/or poultry sold from a butcher case or similar retail appliance. Prepared food may be eaten either on or off the premises, also known as "takeout food."
- "Restaurant" means any establishment located within the County that sells prepared food for consumption on, near, or off its premises by customers. Restaurant for purposes of this chapter includes itinerant restaurants, pushcarts and vehicular food vendors.
- m) "Retail food vendor" means any store, shop, sales outlet, or other establishment, including a grocery store or a delicatessen, convenience store or other than a restaurant, located within the County that sells prepared food.

SECTION 4 PROHIBITED FOOD SERVICE WARE

- 4.1 Except as provided in Section 6, food vendors are prohibited from providing prepared food to customers in disposable food service ware that uses polystyrene foam.
- 4.2 Except as provided in Section 6, food vendors are prohibited from offering for sale any disposable food service ware that is made from polystyrene foam.
- 4.3 All County facilities are prohibited from using polystyrene foam disposable food service ware and all County departments and agencies will not purchase or acquire polystyrene foam disposable food service ware for use at County facilities.
- 4.4 County franchises, contractors and vendors doing business with the County shall be prohibited from using polystyrene

foam disposable food service ware in County facilities or on County projects within the County.

SECTION 5 REQUIRED BIODEGRADABLE AND COMPOSTABLE DISPOSABLE FOOD SERVICE WARE

- 5.1 All food vendors using any disposable food service ware will use biodegradable or compostable disposable food service ware unless they can show an affordable biodegradable or compostable product is not available for a specific application. Food vendors are strongly encouraged to reuse food service ware in place of using disposable food service ware. In instances that food vendors wish to use a biodegradable or compostable disposable food service ware product that is not affordable, a food vendor may charge a "take-out fee" to customers to cover the cost difference.
- 5.2 All County facilities will use biodegradable or compostable disposable food service ware unless they can show an affordable biodegradable or compostable product is not available for a specific application.
- 5.3 County franchises, contractors and vendors doing business with the County will use biodegradable or compostable disposable food service ware unless they can show an affordable biodegradable or compostable product is not available for a specific application.

SECTION 6 EXEMPTIONS

- 6.1 Prepared foods that are prepared or packaged outside the County are exempt from the provisions of this bylaw.

 Purveyors of food prepared or packaged outside the County are encouraged to follow the provisions of this bylaw.
- 6.2 Food vendors will be exempted from the provisions of this bylaw for specific items or types of disposable food service ware if the Director of Emergency Services or his or her designee finds that a suitable affordable biodegradable or compostable alternative does not exist and/or that imposing the requirements of this bylaw on that item or type of disposable food service ware would cause undue hardship.

- 6.3 Disposable food service ware composed entirely of aluminum is exempt from the provisions of this bylaw.
- 6.4 Emergency Supply and Services Procurement. In a situation deemed by the County Reeve to be an emergency for the immediate preservation of the public peace, health or safety, County facilities, food vendors, County franchises, contractors and vendors doing business with the County shall be exempt from the provisions of this bylaw.

SECTION 7 LIABILITY AND ENFORCEMENT

- 7.1 The Director of Emergency Services or his/her designee will have primary responsibility for enforcement of this bylaw. The Director of Emergency Services or his or her designee is authorized to take any and all other actions reasonable and necessary to enforce this bylaw, including, but not limited to, entering the premises of any food vendor to verify compliance.
- 7.2 County facilities, food vendors, retail food vendors, and restaurants will be given three months from the effective date of this ordinance to comply with the provisions herein.
- 7.3 If, after the first three months of the effective date of the bylaw, the Director of Emergency Services or his/her designee determines that a violation of this bylaw occurred, he or she will issue a written warning notice to the retail food establishment that a violation has occurred, specifying a three-month time period for the food vendor to conform to the provisions of this bylaw.
- 7.4 The County, through legal representation, may seek any legal injunctive, or other equitable relief to enforce this bylaw.

SECTION 8 <u>VIOLATIONS AND PENALTIES</u>

8.1 If the Director of Emergency Services or his or her designee determines that a violation of this bylaw occurred, he or she will issue a written warning notice to the food vendor that a violation has occurred, and be given three months to conform to the provisions of this chapter.

Mackenzie County Bylaw 680/08 Banning Polystyrene Food Service Containers Bylaw

- 8.2 If the food vendor has subsequent violations of this bylaw, the following penalties will apply:
 - (a) A fine not exceeding one hundred dollars (\$100.00) for the first violation after the warning notice is given.
 - (b) A fine not exceeding two hundred dollars (\$200.00) for the second violation after the warning notice is given.
 - (c) A fine not exceeding five hundred dollars (\$500.00) for the third and any future violations after the warning notice is given.

SECTION 9 ADDRESS FOR SERVICE

- 9.1 Where an address for sending a notice, order, decision or other document is required, one of the following shall be used:
 - (a) if the person to be served is the owner of real property, the address maintained by the County taxation records for the purpose of issuing the tax notice for that property; and
 - (b) if the person to be served is the occupant of real property, the street address for that property.



Re: Alberta Health Services Board

Our municipality has been tracking very closely the changes which are being made with respect to the governance of the health system within our province. While the transition from a regional to a centralized model of governance is concerning, we accept that such change may provide certain efficiencies within the healthcare system. For this reason I write to you today, not to complain about the new form of governance, but rather to make you aware of our council's great concern over the composition of the new board.

According to the most recent news release issued by your government, an interim board has been established by political appointments. It is our sincere hope that your government will monitor very closely the decisions of this interim board as they are responsible only to your government and not to any electorate.

The most recent news release also indicates that the Minister of Health will establish a process to recruit additional members for a permanent 15-member provincial board of directors and CEO. In designing this process it is imperative that local communities have input into the members of this board. There can be little doubt that issues pertaining to the delivery of health services vary greatly across this vast province. As such the board must be comprised of individuals with an understanding of these issues. Also, in making board members' appointments connected to local communities the Government of

Alberta would be maintaining some element of the local connection which communities had with the former RHAs.

It is my sincere hope that the Government of Alberta is able to enhance the efficiency and effectiveness of health service delivery without unduly negating the connection between local communities and the health system. Our municipality would be more than willing, as many others would also be, to assist the Government of Alberta in achieving fair and accountable representation on the new Alberta Health Services Board.

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


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
1.0 Introduction

La Crete has a population of over 2,000 and serves a trading area of over 7,000¹. Urban centres of this size that serve broader regional population typically become service hubs for commercial and health services as well as recreation and leisure destinations. This can be seen in La Crete with the user market for the Northern Lights Recreation Centre.

As the community serves as a regional recreation and leisure destination, expanded service levels for population levels of 7,000 and beyond have begun to be considered. It is in this

regard that the La Crete Swimming Pool Committee has been struck, as a sub-committee of the La Crete Recreation Society, to determine the need for and feasibility of an indoor swimming pool in the community.

In response to the request for proposals sent out by the Swimming Pool Committee, the following proposal has been developed by RC Strategies and Architecture: ATB to assist in the committee in defining need for, and determining the feasibility of, the development of an indoor swimming pool in the La Crete community.



2.0 The Study Team

3.0 METHODOLOGY AND WORK PROGRAMS

As we see it the Swimming Pool Committee looks to our Study Team to provide:



- Confirm the aquatics and leisure program needs for La Crete and surrounding area, their prospective users and their needs/issues;
- Identify community program needs representative of youth, adult and seniors, and highlight the potential for inclusion within facility development;
- Identify the most cost effective means of facility development and operation, highlighting the potential for partnership sharing and independent operation responsibilities;
- Consider environmental options and costs, quality long lasting construction and energy sharing;
- Consider working with local contractors and businesses wherever feasible:
- Develop a site analysis and plan that includes architectural and concept drawings for a proposed facility layout that illustrates the most appropriate and cost-effective method for development;
- Determine and provide a comprehensive financial analysis, including capital development costs, operating costs and potential revenue recovery rates;
- Provide a long-range capital plan that identifies construction costs;
- Confirm the site location suitable for the development and exploring the benefits of attaching it to the existing facility or having it stand alone; and
- Recommend potential granting programs.

We expect that new initiatives and ideas will come forth and we also expect that prevalent issues regarding undersized and less than adequate spaces, facility competition (existing facilities) may come forth as community issues. While a flexible and evolving process of

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planning is prescribed, we propose a tentative work plan that follows two separate planning thrusts that work in parallel and are described on the following pages.

Planning Thrust 1

Regional Market Needs Assessment and Stakeholder Engagement Strategy that moves through a research and consultative process aimed at identifying program facility needs, developing a strategy aimed at meeting needs.

Planning Thrust 2

Concept Design that moves from qualitative and quantitative appraisals of existing infrastructure to concept development options and finally, chosen infrastructure, phasing and cost impacts:

Each thrust is designed to be co-dependent. For example, initial infrastructure assessments will be essential prerequisites in determining options available and discussed during stakeholder meetings. Similarly, infrastructure concept options can not be fully developed until there is sufficient consensus and "vision" amongst the client group.

At the latter stages of the process, and particularly during concept and strategy review stages, the two thrusts converge thereby enabling a strategy which not only presents the desired physical infrastructure but the methods by which each infrastructure component can be developed and operated into the future.

Task Descriptions...

Review of existing information

 The consulting team with undergo a thorough analysis of existing data resources including past planning documentation, background information on the client, local census data and industry publications so as to provide an overall context for the stakeholder engagement process and the project in general. This task will be initiated with a project start up meeting with client representatives.

Develop public and stakeholder consultative mechanisms

Working with the client group, the consultants will prepare schedules and formats to
engage all stakeholders in the planning process. This task will be completed through a
combination of email, telephone and personal (if necessary) meetings with client
representatives.

Public engagement

- A variety of methods will be used to ensure optimal stakeholder engagement in the needs assessment and review process. Once groups and stakeholders are identified in consultation with the client, we will engage in the consultative process using the following:
 - A public **household survey** will be sent to all households in the region (area to be defined by client) to gather input on aquatics and leisure needs of the general public.

What Women Want: Gender Differences in Public Opinion and Political Engagement in Western Canada

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The 2004-2008 Looking West Surveys include a wide range of public policy questions and measures of democratic participation and attitudes. This report offers a gender analysis of the opinions of western Canadians on key policy areas. Included are perennially important issues such as healthcare, education and taxes, local issues such as transportation and affordable housing, and questions of western identity and western alienation.

Women and men's public opinion differ the most on social and environmental issues because women feel stronger about government doing something to improve social programs and addressing concerns about the environment. At the same time, women's flagging political engagement means that their unique policy preferences do not receive the same public exposure as men's. As long as women remain more reticent than men to engage in political activity, their stronger opinions about social and environmental policy will not be reflected in public policy.

Key findings of the report include:

Public Policy Issues

Women and men share the same five top priorities in the 2008 Looking West Survey. The strength of support for the top four issues, however, varies substantially by gender. Women were much more likely to believe that improving the province's health care system, doing more for the environment, reducing greenhouse gases and reducing poverty in Canada were very important issues. The gender gaps in these areas were between 13 and 17 percentage points.

Local Issues

At the local level, however, there was some disagreement on which issues were the most important. Men and women both rated crime in the community as the greatest concern. Women were slightly more likely to say that reducing crime in the city was a very important priority. There was a large discrepancy in women and men's ranking of the importance of reducing homelessness and increasing the supply of affordable housing. There was a 10 to 12 percentage point gender difference on both of these issues with women leaning toward the compassionate side — in favour of increasing affordable housing and reducing homelessness.

Western Grievances and Democratic Reform

The results show that men and women share similar attitudes toward western alienation. Most westerners believe that the West is a distinct region; they are skeptical about the amount of money their province receives from federal transfers and are not satisfied with the way provincial interests are represented in Ottawa. The strength and uniformity of support for the notion that the West is not treated well by Ottawa indicates that political discontent in the West is an integral part of the political culture for women and men.

The greatest gender divergence, however, is on how western grievances can be best addressed. Fewer women agree with the statement that their province should economically separate from Canada. In Alberta, a majority of women believe that getting more western MPs in cabinet is the best way to address western political concerns while men are more likely to put their faith in Senate reform and giving provinces more power to make key policy decisions.

Democratic Engagement

When it comes to getting involved in politics, women are less likely to contact elected officials, donate to a political party, discuss issues online and volunteer for a political party. On the other hand, women are just as likely, if not more likely, to partake in protest activities like boycotting or signing a petition. The discrepancy between men and women's likelihood to contact elected officials and discussing politics indicates that women are not taking the opportunities to express their strong concern for social and environmental issues. It also points to a larger problem: women are less likely to make up those who shape the political agenda – elite party members and elected party representatives.

What does this mean for the inclusion of women in public policy-formation?

Academic research has shown that women's opinions toward public policy are becoming more distinct which makes the issue of women's political involvement increasingly important. The recommendations in this report are aimed to address the disconnect between women's unique public opinion, political participation and policy formation. First, female role models – mothers talking about politics at home and elected women in the most powerful positions of elected office – are critical for dispelling the myth that politics is an unnatural place for women. Second, political parties can reach out to women to encourage them to run for party executive positions and local candidate nominations so that women play a larger role in shaping the agenda of political parties and have an impact on policy outcomes.

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

Presentation to Edmonton City Council regarding the Edmonton City Centre Airport (ECCA) September 2, 2008

by -- D.A. Peterson, P.Eng.

The ECCA has a history of providing air service in the Edmonton area for the order of 50 years.

It was initiated to supply air transportation desires and needs in the Capital area.

It has the record of providing convenient and economical service, both commuter and longer distances, for nearly 40 years until the present restrictions were put in place.

The commuter service can be restored with coordination of operation with the Edmonton International Airport (EIA) for longer distance and international travellers.

Modern commuter airplanes have reduced noise and emissions than the 50 year old planes that developed and supplied superior travel service from ECCA for considerable years.

There are examples of coordinated service throughout North America locations including Toronto, Vancouver, New York, Chicago, others and internationally at London, Berlin, Moscow, Paris and others.

The ECCA is ideally located and has the record of improving travel service for commuter and fly-on travellers if the decision is made to take full advantage of the location and record attributes.

The attachment 'donx' describes how the ECCA could be redeveloped for cordination of this area's air service.

The result would be sensible commuter service and increased transfers to the EIA for continuing travel with LRT service to NAIT and to the airport.

The ECCA is not a competitor of the EIA but a useful part of the air transportation system for commuters and others.

Both airports should be managed and developed with that objective.

It appears that this decision is not supported by the present air management. The purpose of this presentation is to show the advantages and opportunity there is in active and vigorous management of the air transportion system that is here.

Edmonton... Alberta and British Columbia have taken a major step toward full implementation of the *Trade, Investment and Labour Mobility Agreement* (TILMA), agreeing to special provisions that will extend the agreement to municipalities, academic institutions, school boards and the health sector (MASH).

Starting April 1, 2009, the MASH sector will open up procurement opportunities, beginning at \$75,000 for goods and services tenders and \$200,000 for construction projects. This represents a further opening of tendering contracts from current rules governed through the pan-Canadian *Agreement on Internal Trade* (AIT).

"Participation of the MASH sector is critical for Alberta and B.C. to fully realize the benefits of the TILMA" said Ron Stevens, Deputy Premier and Minister of International and Intergovernmental Relations. "Increased competition for purchasing contracts means our hospitals, schools, colleges, universities and municipal governments will be able to get the best possible price for the goods and services they need."

When Alberta and B.C. signed the TILMA in 2006, both governments agreed to a two-year transition period so each province could consult with its MASH sector before extending coverage under the TILMA. In 2007, Alberta held province-wide consultations with more than 200 MASH sector representatives and associations and continued discussions with these groups until an agreement was reached.

"We are pleased to have been involved in the consultation process on TILMA and to have had the opportunity

to bring the concerns of our membership forward. We believe the revisions that came out of this collaborative process better meet the needs of local government and we hope that other provisions will follow suit," said Don Johnson, president of the Alberta Association of Municipal Districts and Counties.

The special MASH provisions also include an exemption for non-discriminatory municipal land-use bylaws.

"Ine Alberta Urban Municipalities Association is now satisfied that municipal concerns which the Association raised on behalf of its members have been addressed in the negotiation process regarding the MASH provisions," says AUMA President Lloyd Bertschi.

Between now and April 2009, the TILMA will be amended to incorporate the new MASH provisions. Alberta will work closely with MASH stakeholders to assist with the transition and implementation of the new provisions. 

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Fort Vermilion Route Sign Background Information

The Boats

Tall tales remain of the over one hundred and sixty years of navigation on the Peace (1788-1952). We can keep these memories alive by naming streets, avenues and other routes after the boats.

- 1. Canoe Birchbark canoes, dugouts and rafts were the first vessels used on the Peace.
- 2. Scow A flat bottomed boat used to carry freight and either pushed with a pole, like a raft or towed by a tug boat.
- 3. S.S. St. Charles Built by the Oblates at the St. Augustine Mission in Shaftesbury, this was the first steamer with passenger accommodation to serve the Upper Peace. It was launched in 1903, sold in 1911 and ended its service in 1914.
- 4. S.S. Peace River This sternwheeler steamboat was built and launched by the Hudson's Bay Company at Fort Vermilion in 1905 and plied the Peace until 1912 or later.
- 5. S.S. D.A. Thomas "This latest and greatest of the steam-powered sternwheelers was built and launched from the West Peace Shipyards, May 31, 1916". It operated until 1921. A return trip Peace River to Fort Vermilion was \$35. In June 1930, the boat was taken over the Chutes and following minor repairs at Little Red River Post, it continued to Fort Fitzgerald where it was dismantled.
- 6. Weenusk In 1921 the Hudson's Bay Company (HBC) commissioned the building of this motor tug with two barges to handle freight along the Peace. It was replaced around 1940 by the Weenusk II which was the first steel tug to be built in Edmonton. The HBC operated it until 1951. "Weenusk" means ground hog in the n-dialect of the Cree language (Swampy Cree).
- 7. 'Russian Navy' Michael Rachyba's scow with side paddlewheels was launched in 1930 and provided inexpensive service for 8 years.
- 8. M.B. Watson Lake The last of a line of vessels to provide commercial service on the Peace was the Watson Lake. Its final Peace River run was September 21, 1952, after which it was shipped to Fort McMurray for use on the Athabasca River's Waterways North run.
- 9 Buffalo Lake Launched in June 1930 by the HBC, the Buffalo Lake was a gas motored double deck passenger and freight boat. It proved too costly and luxurious for the times so in 1938 it was grounded, the top deck removed and converted into a scow.
- 10 M.B. Beaver A paddlewheel boat called *The Wolverine* was converted to a propeller drive and renamed the Beaver. O'Sullivan and Stigsen's tug, the M.B. Beaver was built around 1942. It was captained by Jack O'Sullivan with Art Bourassa the first engineer. A return ticket first class to Fort Vermilion with meals and berth included was about \$30.00 plus tax.

The Posts

Fort Vermilion's history is connected with that of a continuous series of fur trade posts that were built down and upstream from the current Fort's location. The fire of early adventurers, explorers and traders can be rekindled through the names of these posts otherwise long forgotten.

Boyer's Post - Charles Boyer of the North West Company (NWC) established this post in 1788 near the mouth of the Boyer River. Mackenzie's party visited the site in 1792. It was also called 'Old Establishment'.

Aspin House - Also known as Fort de Tremble, this was the next NWC post to command the trade, operating between 1792 and 1798. Built by John Finlay, it was also referred to as Finlay's Post and New Establishment'.

LaFleur's Post - Established 1798/99, this NWC post dominated the trade until the amalgamation of the NWC with the Hudson's Bay Company (HBC) in 1821. The HBC continued to operate the post, known also as Fort Vermilion until it was relocated sometime between 1828 and 1830. Fort Vermilion II, at our current location, remained a Bay stronghold until independent traders began operating in the late 1800's. The Bay was entrenched in the community until 1988 when it sold its northern stores to a North West Company formed by a coalition of former Bay employees.

The People

Fort Vermilion does not have enough routes to consider a fair representation of historical family names. The names Tardiff, Pritchard and MacRoberts were decided at an earlier time likely noted in the records somewhere. Compared to La Fleur, Bourassa, Lizotte and many others these place names are decidedly more contemporary. After careful consideration and recognizing that there are many ways to look at this, we are posing the following names for consideration. A brief profile is provided for each.

MacLeod- Sergeant MacLeod established the first Royal North West Mounted Police headquarters at Fort Vermilion when he arrived February 3, 1908. MacLeod married Isabella Simpson in 1911 and they had two children before her death in 1916. MacLeod left the Fort in 1917. The proposed street name honours the NWMP and the first member to be posted at the Fort.

Hamman - Dr. Hamman practiced medicine in the Fort from 1924-1948. When needed, he served the surrounding outposts and encampments by walking, dog team, horse and sleigh or buggy. He kept neither office hours nor account books and gave of himself unsparingly. He was forced to leave the north due to illness, having contracted tuberculosis, quite prevalent in northern communities. "Dr. Hamman received commendations from Premier Lougheed for his service in northern Alberta and Premier Getty for service to the Province."

The People (Continued)

Bourassa - In 1846, the first Roman Catholic Missionary visited Fort Vermilion. His name was Father Bourassa. The Bourassa name sees prominence through other legendary persons in the Fort's history. Johnny Bourassa was an interpreter and a farmer who owned much of the land in today's hamlet. It stretched west from the current Northern Store to the Anglican Church and up to the Forestry Office and the surrounding subdivision. His son, Louis, was awarded the "Order of the British Empire" in 1935, for his service in delivering "His Majesty's Mail". Louis was also a pilot on the steamboat D. A. Thomas. Another son, Thomas was a farmer and trader and later served as an interpreter and Special Constable with the RCMP. He supplied the dogs and horses the RCMP needed for transportation. Three classic dove-tailed log houses built on land owned by Bourassa family members remain in Fort Vermilion, two along the river, and another, the Visitor Log House is now located at the Community & Cultural Complex.

Pritchard - Pritchard Place is the current name for a cul de sac off current 50th Avenue or the proposed Canoe Crescent. Walter Pritchard was an Administrator at St. Theresa Hospital. The Pritchard family owned the Old Bay House from 1970-1982.

MacRoberts - MacRoberts Crescent is the current name for 45th Avenue East. It is really a cul de sac, hence the suggested name MacRoberts Close or Place. The MacRoberts moved to Fort Vermilion from Little Red River Post in 1950. Lewis served in World War I and he was a trapper. Estella MacRoberts was recognized for her work as an enumerator and polling station official. She was a long-standing Secretary for the Board of Trade and performed many paralegal duties as a Justice of the Peace, Notary Public and Marriage Commissioner.

Tardiff - 'Skinner' Tardiff was born at Fort Vermilion in 1910. Following some years as a trapper, he went to Wood Buffalo National Park to help establish a herd of bison from Wainwright. He worked for Revillon Freres and later joined others in establishing a store at Fifth Meridian. He later took up farming and repair work. For a time he was a storekeeper at Warrensville and a mechanic for the Canadian National Railway. He and his wife Dorothy retired to Fort Vermilion.

Other Names:

Aurora - The rippling, dancing colourful *aurora borealis* perform spectacular shows especially on clear winter nights. Sightings in the region number about 300 per year compared with 160 between Peace River and Edmonton and 30 further South.

Lovers' Lane - A local name for the beautiful aspen lined lane leading from Tardiff Avenue to Bicentennial Highway 88.

Devils' Hill - On the north facing valleyside at the hamlet's east end was a popular toboggan run known locally as Devils' Hill.

Diamond P - The Peace River Trading and Land Company operated the Diamond P Stores one of which was located at Fort Vermilion. It later became the Diamond P Hall, site of many social functions and concerts. The hill behind the hall was known as the Diamond P Hill.

Providence- The Sisters of Providence arrived in 1900 to provide teaching and nursing services to the people of the area. They served until 1968 when the Residential School closed and hospital administration was transferred to the lay people. The last Sister left in 1973.

Mission - St. Henri's Roman Catholic (RC) Mission, founded in 1866, began its formal ministry in 1868 and saw permanent establishment in 1876. The first RC church was built in 1899, the year Treaty 8 was signed at Fort Vermilion. With the arrival of the Sisters of Providence in 1900 and with the construction of facilities by the clergy and parishioners, the educational and medical needs of the community were addressed.

Bannock - A staple food of the trapper and a traditional favourite to this day, the name has Scottish roots.

Tower - Fort Vermilion's first ferry served the residents of North Vermilion and Fort Vermilion before roads led to the settlements. A cable was strung across the Peace by way of the island and the ferry was guided from one side to another by the cable. The road up the hill, north of the ferry tower was known as 'Tower Road'. This road also led to the site of the first Fort Public School.
